METAGAMA AT ST. JOHN WITH WOUNDED MEN

ST. JOHN, March 6.—The C. P. R. liner Metagama arrived last night after a rough passage. She has on board besides 21 officers and 137 sailors, most of whom are wounded, about 425 other passengers. The big liner docked at 8 o'clock and the passengers will land in the morning. The only officer to leave the ship last night was Captain Fred F. May, of the 26th Battalion, in the second contingent. Captain May was buried when a shell exploded in a dugout in which was his job Dubus, who was with the 22nd was completely buried and only rescued after great difficulty by a rescuing party. Captain May was buried all but one arm and soon extricated although he was suffering from shock. Speaking generally of the Canadian forces, Captain May says that already they have won the reputation of being the gamest in the lines.
