

The Guardian learns that a great many were returned signed during the services and that the returns next Sunday will show a splendid response from the citizens generally.

**WORD FROM THE FRONT**—Mr. Fred White, of Alberton, stepson of Mr. Thomas Wilkinson, now of Charlottetown, has written home stating that he was in the battle of Neuve Chappelle, with the Princess Patricia's, when they so greatly distinguished themselves. He was within 25 yards of the Germans when they broke and as they saw these formidable troops "fix bayonets." Mr. White escaped without a scratch.

**YOUNG PEOPLE MEET**—The Young People's Society of the First Methodist Church held a very enjoyable social Friday evening in Hearz Memorial Hall. The President, Mr. W. T. Welner occupied the chair. The young men provided the evening's entertainment, consisting of several contests, choruses, solos by Prof. Barlow, harmonica selections by Mr. Athol Burns, mysterious trio by Messrs. Fridman, Beer and McEwen. The demonstration by the Philadelphia Pop Corn Corporation, assisted by their sympathy orchestra was very amusing and made the hit of the evening. The singing of Auld Lang Syne brought a very pleasant evening to a close.

**HOW "MOVIES" ARE MADE**—Mr. Frank Hines, late of the Thousand-er Players, New York, arrived in Charlottetown Saturday. Mr. Hines is making a tour of the United States lecturing and demonstrating on the making of moving pictures. Mr. Hines is travelling in the interests of the Thanhouser Company and has, besides visiting the larger cities, visited St. John and Halifax, just before coming here. He will appear at the Prince Edward Theatre to-day, Tuesday and Wednesday and will deal with a different subject each night. He will speak to-night on the making of a "trick" picture. Mr. Hines gives a vaudeville act, the only one of its kind in Canada, an English eccentric act in which he uses nothing but his own compositions in songs, etc. This is the first tour of this kind ever made and Mr. Hines will very likely have interested audiences at his novel and instructive lectures.

**PATRONAGE OF ST. JOSEPH**—Yesterday, the feast of the Patronage of Saint Joseph, was the occasion of special celebrations in Saint Joseph's Convent chapel. In the morning at 7 o'clock High Mass was celebrated by Father G. J. McLellan, D. D., Spiritual Director of Saint Joseph's Sodality, when a large number of the members of the Sodality received Holy Communion. In the evening at 7 o'clock a sermon was delivered by Father Poirier, of Saint Dunstan's College, who in a masterful manner dealt with the life and virtues of Saint Joseph. After the sermon twenty new members were received into the Sodality by the Spiritual Director, Father McLellan. This was followed by Solemn Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament celebrated by Father Poirier, assisted by Father Joseph Gallant as deacon and Father Leo Hierrel as sub-deacon. **MORE THAN MILLION NOW IN THE FIELD**  
LONDON, April 22.—During the battle of Neuve Chappelle in the month of March, as much ammunition was expended as was used during the entire Boer War, according to a statement made in the House of Commons yesterday by Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd George.

The Boer War lasted for two years and nine months.

**MORE THAN MILLION IN FIELD**  
Speaking in the manner in which the Government is dealing with the question of war equipment, Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George announced that while Great Britain had started in the war on the assumption that the expeditionary force would consist of six army corps, the country now had more than six times that number of men in France.

**WILL STUDY RUSSIAN TRADE FOR CANADA**  
LONDON, April 22.—Comradin Just, lately Canadian Trade Commissioner at Hamburg, who was detained there for six months and recently exchanged for the German representative in South Africa, leaves for Russia on Friday to study trade conditions there on behalf of the Canadian Government. Just expects to remain in Russia for about four months.

**GERMANS TRIED TO LAND IN ENGLAND.**  
LONDON, April 22.—F. T. Jane, a well known naval expert, addressing a meeting at Liverpool last night said that it was not generally known that the Germans tried to land an expeditionary force in England and that it was the British navy that made them go back to their harbor again. The navy saved the country and there was never a word of it in the newspapers.

**ITALIAN SENATOR TELLS OF VON BUELOW'S "CONFESSION."**  
ROME, April 21.—The Messagero today publishes an interview with Senator Riccardo Carafa, which gives a pessimistic forecast of the outcome of the negotiations between Italy and Austria.

The newspaper says the Senator, who is a frequent caller at the house of Prince Von Buelow, the German Ambassador to Rome, makes the statement that he heard from the Prince a "confession" which was substantially as follows:  
"Unfortunately the Italian-Austrian conversations are not proceeding satisfactorily. Their future will be followed by a rupture between Rome and Vienna. This will be regretted by Germany. I am sorry to affirm that in this sad eventuality Germany will do her duty to the end by the side of Austria."

Continuing, Senator Carafa declares that he repeated his conversation to Premier Salandra, who did not seem surprised at it. On the contrary, he said to the Senator:  
"I am delighted that the paramount interests of our country will proceed with our duty against all our antagonists."

An official statement issued today by the Italian Government says that Senator Carafa asked for an interview with Premier Salandra, saying that he wished to be present at the Prime Minister's memorandum of a communication with "perhaps appeared to the Senator more important than it really was."

Premier Salandra, the statement continues, simply undertook to transmit the picture to the Foreign Office. That department, on a private courtesy, entertained Senator Carafa in a few minutes conversation without "making him any concrete statement of any kind."


Senator Carafa, the Government communication continues, "would have acted more correctly, and more patriotically, if he had maintained a complete reserve regarding a conversation on such a delicate subject accorded him in consideration of his position."

**PRESIDENT SUSPENDER**  
NONE SO EASY  
MADE IN CANADA

Officers and Representatives.—  
I am pleased to meet you again in quarterly session, at the close of a term in which Temperance the world over has made more rapid progress than in any like period in history. The splendid example of Russian and France is now being accentuated by our mother land in great voluntary movement, for total abstinence during the war, at the call of our beloved Sovereign King George the fifth and in which he has been enjoined by his Cabinet, War Lords and important officers of state. Already our own Province is offering his loyal response to this call. At an immense and enthusiastic gathering held in the Drill Shed on Sunday last, the movement was most auspiciously inaugurated, supported by His Lordship Bishop O'Leary, our leading Protestant Clergyman, the Hon. Premier Mathieson, the leader of the Opposition Hon. John Richards, almost the entire Legislature and the most prominent military and business men of our City. This appeal to the loyalty and patriotism of our people will I am sure meet with a noble response, and mark another notable advance in temperance reform.

I regret that the Amendments to the Prohibition Act, as asked for by the Provincial Alliance and the united temperance forces of the province, have not been accepted by the Legislature. The Government has however introduced a number of Amendments, some of which are very desirable, and which will tend to increase the effectiveness of the Act. The amended Act, if reasonably supported by those upon whom rests the real responsibility of enforcement, would prove a powerful factor in wiping out the illicit sale of intoxicants and reducing drunkenness and crime in the land. The ungenerous attacks made upon some of the best temperance workers in the province, by speakers on the floor of the Legislature, will tend to raise doubts as to the extent of the sympathy we may have reason to expect. In this let us hope for the best, give all credit where credit is due, and when the day of reckoning comes let us not forget that "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty." Whether we are Liberal or Conservative, we can make no mistake in electing temperance men to make our laws and to control their enforcement.
