

ADVOCATES GENERAL STRIKE ON DAY McNAMARA'S TRIAL

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 1—Addressing a meeting of laboring men yesterday, William D. Haywood, one of the most prominent leaders in the death of former Governor Steunenberg, of Idaho, advocated a general strike throughout the United States on the day the McNamara brothers are brought to trial in Los Angeles for the alleged complicity in the Los Angeles explosion.

LONDON PRESS ON PEACE MEETING

TORONTO, April 29—J. Herbert and Mrs. Tritton of London, England, arrived in the city from Indianapolis, where Mrs. Tritton, who is President of the World's Young Women's Christian Association, attended a convention of that body. Mr. Tritton is a prominent banker in London and at the head of the Liberal and free trade party in that city.

In regard to the question of reciprocity, Mr. Tritton stated that his party in England is unanimously in favor of lower duties anywhere and everywhere, and believes that what makes for the welfare of Canada will directly or indirectly benefit Great Britain. Mr. Tritton is in close touch with the commercial expansion of this country, and recognizes that a further incentive to the development of trade along north and south lines is not only desirable but inevitable. Regarding the Canadian banking system Mr. Tritton spoke in glowing terms. He said, too, that he was surprised to find so much smoke in this city. London had dealt with this problem by passing and enforcing a law compelling all chimney shafts on factories and breweries to consume their own smoke. He declared that the annual number of togs had thereby been reduced from 55 to 11.

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SIR CHAS. TUPPER WRITES AN OPEN LETTER

MONTREAL, April 30—The Gazette tomorrow will print an open letter from Sir Charles Tupper addressed to the Hon. W. S. Fielding. Sir Charles begins by saying that being nearly ninety years of age he thought that he was out of public life, but as Mr. Fielding found it easier to misrepresent and disparage him, than to reply to the unanswerable speech Mr. Sifton he feels compelled to notice some of the remarks made by the Minister of Finance. He cannot accuse Mr. Fielding of lack of courage in denying that he had addressed or advocated annexation to the United States, and then proceeds to allege that when in 1868, after Joseph Howe had exhausted every means of defeating Confederation and decided to make the best of it, Mr. Anand, then proprietor of the Halifax Morning Chronicle, proposed to Mr. Howe to apply to the United States. Mr. Howe rejected the proposal with scorn but Mr. Fielding remained with Mr. Anand and supported those who hunted Howe to his death and drove him to an untimely grave.

In 1872 the opponents of Confederation were unable to elect a single member to oppose the Government of which Mr. Howe and himself were members. In 1886 when Mr. Fielding carried the Province in a desperate attempt to break up the union, Sir Charles went out to Canada in the following year and cured him of his folly by obtaining the support of 16 out of the 21 members for the Government of Sir John A. McDonald. Sir Charles then discusses the fisheries question, quoting Sir Allen Aylesworth as to the permanent value of the modus vivendi arranged by Mr. Chamberlain and himself. Proceeding he pointed out that Sir John A. MacDonald's espousal of reciprocity was entirely due to the necessity of fighting the continental free trade ideas of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. He charges Mr. Fielding with misstating his position in the House, when Mr. Fielding brought in his tariff of 1897. Briefly the contention of Sir Charles is that the Fielding tariff he condemned, and the condemnation he (Tupper) cites referred to an entirely different thing from the Fielding tariff finally passed, Mr. Fielding having amended the first tariff along the lines Sir Charles indicated must be followed.

Of the present arrangement Sir Charles says: "I am opposed to your agreement with the United States because Mr. Bayard in 1886 assured Mr. Chamberlain and myself that the policy of the Democratic party was to remove soon as they were able the duties on all the articles in your agreement, and President Taft now sees that he can only secure his reelection by the same policy. We owe nothing to the Republican party, and would gain everything without any entangling alliance, which will, I fear, end in the destruction of British institutions in Canada."

IN MEMORIAM. There departed this life on April 20th, at Riverdale, Lot 30, one of

the pioneer settlers of that part of the country in the person of Joseph Osborne, who emigrated to this Island from Buckinghamshire, England about sixty-five years ago, coming out as the groom with the once famous horse "Saladin." Mr. Osborne was an upright, honest man, whose word was as good as his bond, his warm hearted kindness and his bright cheerful disposition will long be missed in the neighborhood. He was very proud of being an Englishman and was a special type of his countrymen. He loved to talk of his early days in the Old Country and well remembered the Coronation of our late beloved Queen Victoria. Truly he loved God and honored the King. He was a life long Conservative and a staunch member of the Church of England. He was laid to rest beside his mother in the People's Cemetery, Charlottetown on April 22nd, when the funeral services were read by Rev. Mr. Murphy of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown. His wife predeceased him by eight months. Mr. Osborne was in his 84th year and leaves to mourn two sons, William on the homestead and Thos. in Bangor, Maine, besides several grandchildren and great grandchildren.—Com.
