Mr. A.F. Arsenault In Budget Debate

Wholesome Tonic to The Fulsome Praise Of Liberal Members Ad- ministered To Government By Conservative Member For Third Prince.

Continued from Yesterday's Guardian
Teachers Still Waiting.

Eleven years have passed, and the teachers will have to wait at least another year, because the Commission has reported that these recommendations must not all be implemented until a plebiscite has been taken. So the Government has a good excuse; they may hope that the teachers will remain quiet for another year at least. But let me suggest, if some of the recommendations are to be implemented this year, such as the appointing of a Board of Education, that I, on behalf of the French-speaking element of this Province, would have a request to make. We know that the Acadian people in this Province constitute about one-sixth of our population; that we have now about fifty or sixty French schools. If we have not got the money, we have the children; which, after all, is a greater asset. (Applause.) So I would ask the Premier to see that an Acadian, or at least a man who would be able to understand the French language and could advise in conducting the French schools throughout the Province, will be on this Educational Board.

The subject of Prohibition has been very much discussed during the present session, and I do not intend to weary the House by repeating what has been said in this connection. The insinuation has often been made, however, that we are hardly Christians on this side of the House, because we do not profess to believe in Prohibition. It is assumed by some hon. members on the other side that they represent "the right-thinking class" in this Province. In this connection I just want to read the words of a great Liberal Premier: "How can I, who drink good wine and bitter beer every day of my life, in a comfortable room and among friends, coolly stand up and advise hardworking fellow-creatures to take the pledge?"

This, no doubt, shocks the hon. member from Rustico. But those words were uttered by no less a man than William Ewart Gladstone, Prime Minister of Great Britain and the "Grand Old Man" of British Liberalism. His words, I think, touch the point of the whole matter. The trouble is that we want Prohibition for the other fellow.

It was the boast of our good Premier in his address on the Budget that the Temperance Alliance would undoubtedly have passed a vote of approval of the present administration in its enforcement of the Prohibition law, but that they did not do so lest they should be accused of political partisanship. Yet they were met on that occasion, according to their own advertisement in the press, to consider ways and means for a "better enforcement" of the law. I do not think those statements agree very well.

Scott on Temperance

When I ventured to state, on a former occasion, that some of the members of the Temperance Alliance would take a drink, the hon. member from Rustico (Hon. Mr. LePage) jumped to his feet to ask me if I was making an insinuation. I made no insinuation, Mr. Speaker; in fact, as I told the hon. member at the time, I may have been paying them a compliment. Let me read the words of another great man on the question of Temperance vs. Prohibition. I am reading now the words of Sir Walter Scott:

"Know, foolish Saracen," replied the Christian without hesitation, "that thou blasphemest the gifts of God, even with the blasphemy of thy Father Ishmael. The juice of the grape is given to him that will use it wisely, as that which cheers the heart of man after toil, refreshes him in sickness and comforts him in sorrow. He who so enjoyeth it may thank God for his wine-cup as for his daily bread; and he who abuseth the gift of Heaven is not a greater fool in his intoxication than thou in thine abstinence."

Those are words from sage men; and when we venture to express opinions that coincide with the views that these men have expressed, we are accused of not being in line with the right-thinking element—of being, in fact, in a class by ourselves. The better thinking people, accord-

COURT OF APPEAL AND EQUITY—The Court of Appeal and Equity met yesterday morning in the Supreme Court Chambers when judgment was delivered by His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson in the appeal of Ernest Crosby vs. The Estate of the Late William Carpenter. Judgment was delivered in favor of the appellant, Ernest Crosby for \$1,582.80, without prejudice to his rights under the will of the late Wm. Carpenter and costs of the appeal and the costs before the Master of the Rolls. Judge Arsenault also delivered judgment concurring with his Lordship. Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. SUPREME COURT—The Supreme Court opened yesterday with Chief Justice Matheson and Justices Hazzard and Arsenault on the Bench. In the morning the application of Alan McDonald for certiorari was heard, an appeal resulting from a conviction by Mr. Geo. J. Tweedy, Magistrate under the Prohibition Act. Mr. J. J. Johnston, K. C., appeared for the applicant, and Mr. R. N. McNeill, K. C., for the Crown. Judgment was reserved to be rendered this morning. The second case was that of the City of Charlottetown, vs. L. P. Tanton, respecting an appeal from a judgment of Judge Stewart of the Queen's County Court. Judgment had been given in favor of the respondent for moneys, claimed by the way of refund of amount paid under protest for taxes. Messrs. J. D. Stewart, K. C., and K. M. Martin, appeared for the appellant, and Mr. W. E. Bentley, K. C., for the respondent. The latter had not completed his argument when the court adjourned.
