Statistics of the Old Glory auction held in New York the latter part of November are now available. 407 horses of all kinds were sold for \$127,395 spot cash. While this is a much lower average than has prevailed for several years, yet considering the premium on cash it is encouraging to horse owners and shows that their product still brings ready money.

Not a single horse was passed out of the ring. Every horse brought a price; some of them of course not very great, but there was a buyer for every animal.

The foreign contingent present included Charles Martenz, Arthur Snoeck and Jerome Vanderwedge of Belgium, and William Belberg of Malmo, Sweden. Representatives were also present for buyers in Italy and Germany, showing the interest that is being taken in American trotters in Europe.

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Annual Meeting The Can. Amateur Athletic Union

(Canadian Press)
OTTAWA, Dec. 9.—The existence of professional hockey, football teams in Quebec and Ontario thwarted negotiations for an alliance between the Dominion Football Association and the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, but while the alliance is definitely out of the question at the moment efforts towards some arrangement in the future will be continued.

This was revealed at the annual meeting of the Union here today, by James I. Morkin of Winnipeg, President, who gave a report of the negotiations carried on by committees from the two sport bodies during the past year. Judge J. A. Jackson of Lethbridge, headed the A. A. U. committee, and Sam Davidson of Winnipeg headed the D. F. A. committee. Morkin said negotiations had reached the stage where terms had been agreed upon except for a few minor differences regarding fees for registration cards.

A letter had been received from Davidson saying the Football Association could only enter into an alliance on the distinct understanding they would have the privilege of playing amateurs and professionals with and against one another and of allowing professionals in other branches of sport to play amateur football. "That puts us right up against the wall" said Morkin. "We could go no further." Davidson had later explained, Morkin said, that as far as football clubs in the west were concerned the alliance could be effected. If entered into, however, it would have resulted in professional clubs in Ontario and Quebec breaking away and, in a time of financial stress, the D. F. A. could not risk this. The report was received by the meeting, but, on the suggestion of L. A. Johnson, of Winnipeg, was not adopted pending disposal of the Saskatchewan resolution to amend the rules to permit professionals in one branch of sport to play as amateurs in another. If adopted the resolution might enable the A. A. U. to meet, at least in part, the teams of the Football Association.

23 SILVER FOXES STOLEN, 40 OTHERS ARE POISONED IN RAID NEAR WATERFORD

LONDON, Ont., Dec. 9.—In what is believed by provincial police to have been the first raid of its kind in Western Ontario, 23 silver foxes were stolen Monday night from the Townsend Silver Fox Farm, Ltd., near Waterford, in Simcoe district, while 40 others were apparently poisoned. Tuesday morning the bodies of 40 of the valuable animals were found strewn about their inclosures. The loss to the fox farm is estimated at several thousand dollars.

Inspector H. Gardner, divisional head of provincial police said the raid, if not the first, was on the largest scale ever perpetrated in Western Ontario. Serg. N. A. Scott

of London left the city to direct the investigation. Provincial Officers Shipley and Taggart of Simcoe will assist him.

Unless the robbery was handled by a large clique, police are of the opinion the marauders will have difficulty in marketing the valuable fox furs. One or two individuals attempting to sell so many of the pelts would be open to suspicion, police said. It is also thought that the other 40 were poisoned by the raiders with the intention of securing the animals without difficulty. Apparently it failed to take effect rapidly enough, with the result that they were left to die in the pens.

Wolverines Come Through With Shut-Out Win

Abbies Outplayed In Halifax Last Night To Lose 2-0 In Hot Battle.

HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 9.—Wolverines tonight chalked up their first victory in the Maritime Hockey League by defeating Charlottetown Abegweits, the leaders, 2-0. Abegweits still held the leadership, however, with two games to the good.

Both goals were scored in the second period. Gordon Kennedy netted the first on a pass from Moshier three minutes and 28 seconds after the opening. Second tally was banged in by Moshier just four seconds before the period ended.

Strengthened by Frankie Graham, star defenceman with the champion Dalhousie Rangers last season, Wolverines tonight showed their best form since league began. They had been beaten twice by Charlottetown and once by Moncton Hawks, and the odds were against them when they lined up on the ice before the leaders.

The Wolverines played almost perfect hockey to register their initial league triumph of the season. After a shaky first period, in which he all but stumbled over loose rubbers on more than one occasion, Leo Sargent played unbeatable hockey in the Wolverine cage, but the real Wolverine strength was in the Frankie Lavigne—Frankie Graham, defence. Graham, making his second appearance on skates this season and his debut as a member of the Wolverines was a standout. His checking, particularly his blocking and clearing, was perhaps the best exhibition seen here this winter, and with "Frenchy" Lavigne playing another of his "extra good" games on the other side, the local defence was a solid wall that the speeding Abbies penetrated on rare occasions only.

Wolves Defence Outstanding

Graham and Lavigne crushed rush after rush. They hammered the Abegweits forwards into submission, took care of loose rubbers and fed the "valley line" time after time for perfect "breaks" up the ice. Moshier in his outstanding performance of the season, was easily the best forward on the ice. He scored one goal from a face-off in front of Bubar and fed Gordon Kennedy a pass out for the initial counter of the evening.

Spotty Game

While fast and interesting at times, the game was spotty most of the way. Even when trailing by two goals, the Abegweits elected to pay defensive hockey and ragged the rubber unmercifully every time they lost a man, via the penalty route. Abegweits put on a desperate rally in the last five minutes as the game was fast drawing to a close. Tommy Oliver skated the length of the ice, disregarded the rubber when near the Halifax defence and sailed into Lavigne, with stick held high. Lavigne crashed to the ice, scrambled to his feet closed in on his bigger opponent and dealt the Islander with two socks, right and left, to the whiskers before the referees stepped in. Both were given minor penalties. There was lots of loose hockey, but also lots of team work. The Abegweits teamed up well on several occasions, fighting to get in close to Sargent, but unable to penetrate the Graham-Lavigne barrier except on rare occasions. When they did get through Leo Sargent slid out to make spectacular saves. The Abegweits opened fast and in the first five minutes came close to scoring on loose rubbers. Sargent stopped everything that came his way, but seemed to have trouble smothering the rubber and there were many anxious moments for the Halifax fans until Sargent "straightened out" his goal tending.

Start To Click

Moshier and the Kennedy brothers started to "click" after about three or four minutes and there after practically dominated the play while on the ice. Moshier was never seen to better advantage, while the Kennedy brothers teamed up well with their team-mate of other years. The Lawlor-Lennon-Shields line failed to get going, except in the last ten minutes of the game when Lawlor and Lennon staged some nice passing bouts. After three minutes and twenty eight seconds
