NEW OFFICE.—E. H. Beer, a life long resident and well known business man of Charlottetown, where he was formerly the senior partner in the Beer & Weeks Furniture Establishment, has opened an Investment Office in the rooms formerly occupied by Mr. Dennis in the Morris Block.

WORTH TRYING.—Now that fur farming and the raising of Karakul sheep have become such important industries in this province, it is up to some of the local breeders to introduce the Angora goat. This animal supplies the mohair, which is becoming so valuable. In 1908 the price ranged between 22 and 25 cents per pound, while in 1913 it reached as high as 34 cents. The weight of the fleece varies from 2 to 12 pounds and in some sections the animals are sheared twice a year. When the fleece is allowed to grow twelve months it averages about ten inches in length. Last year upwards of five million pounds were produced in the United States, and in addition to this a quantity of about two million pounds is imported annually. The Angora goat is very valuable not only for its fleece and its flesh, which is considered a delicacy, but on account of the fact that it is one of the best weed-destroyers the farmer can have. They do well on poor land, so long as it is dry, and range over country which will not support any other kind of farm animal.

THE YOUNG PRINCE CLEVER WITH SKIS.

CHIRSTANIA, May 20.—The little Crown Prince Olav, like every Norwegian boy, is striving to become the champion ski jumper of the world. He is as clever as any boy of his age at the sport, and is so enthusiastic about it that he attends all the big contests.

PRESENTATION OF PRIZES.—Last night the winners of the League of the Cross bowling handball, basket ball and billiard competitions were presented with the splendid trophies and other prizes that were competed for. Congratulatory speeches were delivered by the Rev. J. S. McDonald, Spiritual Director of the sodality, and others, after which delectable refreshments were served.

SAVINGS BANK.—According to a statement of the balance at the credit of depositors in the Dominion Government Savings Banks on the 30th. April, which has been issued by the Finance Department, withdrawals from the bank in Charlottetown during April were greater than deposits. The amount deposited during April at the Charlottetown bank was \$22,743.25, bringing the total amount deposited up to 30th. April last to \$1,931,644.55. But during the same month withdrawals had been made to the total amount of \$38,701.97, leaving the balance at the credit of depositors on April 30th, at \$1,892,942.58.

SWIMMING SEASON OPEN.—What appears to have been the first premeditated swim of the season took place yesterday when two boys, dressed in the regulation tights, went into the briny off Victoria Park. They declared the water was just lovely, although while making the declaration their teeth chattered suspiciously. Several other swimmers had occurred previously by persons who, in moments of absent-mindedness or otherwise parted from their coats or tumbled over the wharf, but it is understood that the boys above mentioned officially opened the swimming season.

BESSIE CROOK.—There is lying at present at Pownall wharf a large three-masted schooner, the Bessie Crook, from Barbados, British West Indies. She has brought a considerable cargo of molasses for Messrs Caywell Bros., city, and the wharf was yesterday the scene of much activity, as puncheon after puncheon of the golden juice was lifted out of the hold of the vessel. The Bessie Crook is a fast sailer, with comparatively new rigging and an imposing bowsprit. One of her life boats is equipped with motor and is a neat and trim little craft. The Crook had a pleasant voyage from Barbados and arrived in this harbor in first-class condition.

LOBSTERS PLENTIFUL.—Reports from many sections of the coast indicate that lobsters are unusually plentiful this season. At Tignish the catches have been so large that the factories were unable to handle them. At Cape Traverse also good catches have been made and a future of the fishing there is that bait is plentiful. At Rustico lobsters are plentiful but the fishermen are handicapped by the scarcity of bait. At St. Peter's lobster catches have been exceedingly large, some of the boats taking eight and nine hundred at a haul. At this point also bait is scarce. From the east end of the Island the same story comes of big lobster catches, especially in Souris. The fishermen are jubilant over the prospects of the season's harvest.

MONTREAL, Que., May 19.—The international good roads congress, the first to be held in Canada, opened in the Arena yesterday afternoon at 3.30. The Lieutenant Governor of province of Quebec, Premier Sir Lomer Gouin, and Mayor Mederic Martel welcomed the 600 delegates attending. Lectures on road building will be on the programme this evening, and during the week the delegates will be taken over the New York state line and will be shown through Mount Royal tunnel. Nearly 300 manufacturers of road-making machinery have exhibits at the congress. A banquet to the delegates will take place this evening.

OIL FEVER IN CALGARY.

CALGARY, May 20.—Dingman oil well spotted 30 feet in the air yesterday and it is estimated that 100,000 gallons of oil were blown out.

## SORDID STORY IN POLICE COURT

AMHERST, May 19.—Pleading guilty to acts that may carry a penalty of fourteen years in penitentiary with lashes on the bare back Octave Gallant appeared before the recorder yesterday morning as the principal in one of the worst cases ever tried here.

Incest is the charge against him and the chief witness is his sister, Mary Gallant, who has kept house with him for ten years, seven in Amherst at their home on Mission Street.

The case was brought to the attention of Chief Carter by Rev. Father Brown who received an anonymous letter acquainting him of the circumstances. Gallant was committed to trial before the County Court on May 26th next and stays in jail in the meantime.

He is a man of fifty-two and a laborer employed at the C. Works. He came to Amherst from Springfield seven years ago, after having kept house with his sister, who is thirty-five years old, in Prince Edward Island and New Glasgow. So far there have been four children in his family. One is half-witted and the other deformed, while two have died.

When told the nature of his offense Gallant displayed scant comprehension of its gravity, but readily admitted his culpability.

SENSATIONAL CASE WILL BE TRIED.

GREENSBURG, Pa., May 18.—A lively public interest is manifested in the trial of Dr. Martin E. Griffith, the Monessen physician, who is alleged to have inflicted wounds on William L. Robertson, a music teacher which resulted in his death February 14. The case was called in court here today for trial.

The case is one of the most sensational in the history of this country. Robertson had been giving music lessons in the Griffith home. Dr. Griffith returned home unexpectedly and admitted slashing Robertson. He then ordered him removed to the hospital of which Dr. Griffith is one of the staff. The case in many respects parallels the Cudahy case in Kansas City. Robertson was expected to recover, but had a relapse.

The settlement at Monessen is divided. Dr. Griffith is physician and surgeon for the Pittsburgh Steel Company, and has an extensive practice. Robertson's home was in Clarksburg, W. Va., where his widow and several children are living.

ROGERS AS HIGH COMMISSIONER

OTTAWA, May 20.—Hon. Geo. F. Perley is leaving soon to attend the inter-parliamentary union convention in Stockholm. Hon. Dr. Beland and he are the Canadian delegates. There is some talk of Perley for High Commissioner in London but who ever fills it temporarily, ultimately it is likely to go to Hon. Robert Rogers.

MRS. ATKINSON TO BE RELEASED ON BAIL.

HALIFAX, May 20.—Upon application to Mr. Justice Graham in the Supreme Court yesterday afternoon, bail for Mrs. Atkinson, in custody at Sydney, was fixed at \$5,000. The application was made by H. Mellish, K. C., counsel for the defendant.

CANADIAN FISH

Shipping Frozen Fish Proves Successful in Britain

The experiment of introducing frozen halibut from the Canadian Pacific coast on the Grimsby market, and thence into the markets of Great Britain, has proved so successful that by the time the second consignment was due to arrive the first delivery had all been disposed of, and orders were in hand for more. And when the second consignment arrived, traders were so anxious for supplies that, although there was treble the quantity available, its disposal before another lot could keep up a continuous supply, was a certainty. And, owing to the success of the trade, it has been found necessary to supply some of the larger distributing centres with supplies direct from Liverpool.

With the halibut consignment came to hand 125 cases of frozen salmon from the Canadian Pacific coast, its appearance at Grimsby creating quite as much trading interest as did the first lot of halibut. For frozen fish its condition was perfect, and those merchants who took trial samples for their customers, expressed their appreciation of the fish and the opinion that it would doubtless have a ready sale in the country, particularly as there was now no Scottish or English salmon available.
