SHIPPING EGGS BY PARCEL POST.

FREDERICTON, Feb. 28.—York County farmers have started to ship eggs by the new parcel post service.

The regulations call for all the shipments of eggs to be labelled as such and the first arrived at the post office yesterday, having been shipped from Taymouth.

WILL FIND OUT HOW MUCH FRANCE BENEFITS

PARIS, Feb. 28.—A commission for the study of the economic consequences for France of the opening of the Panama Canal was formed a few days ago. It was composed of ten officials from various state ministries, all of them familiar with the different phases of the government service and with the requirements of the French merchant marine. The commissioners, after discussing it, will draft a report to the French government on the steps necessary to gain the fullest utilization of the canal by French commerce.

SATISFACTION OVER LEITH BURGHS ELECTION

LONDON, Feb. 28.—Cable-Commenting on the Leith Burghs election the Manchester Guardian says while the division between the two candidates gave a majority of 3,300 for Home Rule, the general mood, absurdity and annoyance were more than counterbalanced by renewed satisfaction at seeing it proved that an attempt to bully and browbeat Englishmen and Scotchmen into voting against Home Rule had failed. At almost every bye-election the vote for Home Rule increased since the pistol of civil war has been flourished at Great Britain's head. It is now clear that if the Liberal and Labor party would refrain from wasting their strength against each other they would remain in control another five years.

IN MEMORIAM

The death occurred Saturday morning of Dr. Earl Robins, at the home of his father Mr. Thomas Robins, Central Bedeque, after a prolonged illness following an attack of pleurisy two years ago.

The deceased was a graduate of Baltimore Dental College and had practised his profession for a number of years in Charlottetown where he was well and favorably known. Last summer he visited Boston for medical treatment but receiving little benefit returned to the Island in the autumn and resided at his old home in Bedeque until his death. He was 38 years of age and leaves his father and mother to mourn the death of their only child of a family of six.

The funeral takes place this afternoon at 2 o'clock from his father's residence to the Methodist Church, thence to the Lower Bedeque Methodist Cemetery.

KANSAS CITY, Feb. 28.—The sequel to a romance of an orange wrapper was terminated at the Blossom House when Miss Mollie Moran, of Taylorville, Ill., were married by of Visalia, Cal., and C. Allen Peden, the Rev. C. E. Ruhl, of the Mount Washington Methodist Church.

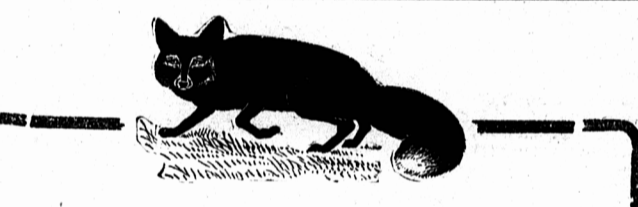
