WILL OF ROBERT MUTCH.

Who Died at Gallas Point on Sept. 18th, and Recently Probated.

WILL OF ROBERT MUTCH. Died Sept., 18th.

1.—I give and confirm to my son Benjamin Mutch the farm now in his possession comprising about one hundred acres at Gallas Point known as the McInnis farm, to hold to him his heirs and assigns to his and their use forever.

2.—I also give and bequeath to my said son Benjamin the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars cash.

3.—To my son Wellington Mutch I give all the property at Eldon at present in his possession together with the house, land and premises recently in possession of Mrs. McRae, my sister-in-law, to hold to him and assigns to his and their use forever.

4.—I also give to my said son Wellington the sum of two thousand dollars cash.

5.—I give and confirm to my son Charles Mutch the farm on Lot forty nine purchased from Mellish, at present in his possession to hold to him his heirs and assigns forever.

6.—I also give to my said son Charles the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars.

7.—To Bella Mutch, widow of my deceased son Stewart Mutch I give the use of the dwelling house in which she now resides, also the barn nearest the dwelling house in which is the cow and horse stable, together with about twenty acres of land surrounding the same lying between the road running through the farm and Cavanagh's line the same to have a frontage on said road of about five hundred yards and extending back to Cavanagh's line about two hundred and seventy yards to hold the same until her son Robert Percy Mutch attains the age of twenty one years provided she remain unmarried. Should her said son Robert Percy die before attaining twenty one years of age then I direct that the property shall be sold and the proceeds distributed under the provisions hereafter contained and it is my will, and I further direct that my said daughter-in law shall have the right to pasture her two cows, one horse and six sheep during the summer season on the remaining part of the farm formerly occupied by my said son Stewart Mutch on such parts of said farm as shall be allowed by my executors herein after named.

8.—The farm recently occupied by my son Stewart, I give to my grandson Robert Percy Mutch on his attaining twenty-one years of age to hold to him from and after that date and to his heirs and assigns forever, subject nevertheless to the payment to his sisters Annie Maud Mutch, Birdie May Mutch and Muriel Grace Mutch of the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars each, the same to be paid within five years after he attains his majority, and also subject to a maintenance on said farm of his mother the said Bella Mutch for the term of her natural life, provided she remains unmarried. Provided further that if he and his mother shall not be able to live together agreeably on said farm, then I will and direct that she shall be at

liberty to reside elsewhere and in such case my grandson shall during her widowhood pay her the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars per annum, payable half yearly during her widowhood. Should the said Bella Mutch marry again before my said grandson attains twenty-one years of age, then I direct that the dwelling house, outbuildings and lands of which she is to have the use during the minority of her said son, shall be taken possession of by my Executors and used by them under the direction herein contained regarding the remainder of the farm. The remainder of the farm recently held and enjoyed by my said son Stewart, I direct shall be worked and controlled by my Executors until my said grandson attains twenty-one years and the profits annually derived therefrom after payment of the expenses of working and managing the same, I direct shall be divided equally amongst my several children and the heirs of any deceased child; the heirs of any deceased child taking the share to which the parent would have been entitled while living. Should my grandson, Robert Percy Mutch, die before attaining twenty-one years of age it is my will that said farm recently in possession of my said son Stewart, shall be sold by my Executors and out of the proceeds of the sale thereof I direct that the sum of five hundred dollars shall be paid the widow Bella Mutch (if unmarried) and the sum of three hundred and twenty five dollars to each of the daughters of my son Stewart who shall be then living and the residue of the proceeds of the sale thereof I direct shall be divided equally amongst my several children and the heir of any deceased child (the heirs of such deceased child taking the share to which the parent would have been entitled if living.) Should the said Bella Mutch marry, it is my will that all provisions made for her under this my will shall forthwith cease and be at an end.

9.—I also give to the said daughters of my son Stewart Mutch the sum of five hundred dollars each, to be paid to them respectively on their attaining twenty one years of age.

10.—To my son Frank I give the farm at present in his possession (part of the homestead) comprising about one hundred and seventy acres to hold to him, his heirs and assigns to his and their use forever. I also confirm to him all the farm stock, farming implements and household furniture thereon, except my horse, sleigh buggy and harness which latter I direct, shall form part of the residue of my estate.

11.—I also give to my son Frank the sum of two thousand five hundred dollars cash.

12.—To my son-in-law Nathaniel Gay I give the sum of five hundred dollars. To my daughter Elizabeth Gay I give the sum of five hundred dollars for her own sole and separate use and benefit and not to be subject to the debt interference or control of her husband.

13.—To each of the daughters of Elizabeth Gay the sum of five hundred dollars to be paid to them on their attaining twenty-one.

14.—To my grandson James Alexander Anderson, Orwell, I give the mortgage which I hold from his father on the farm at Orwell together with whatever interest may be unpaid at the time of my death to hold to him his executors, administrator and assigns but subject to the payment thereout of the sum of two hundred

and fifty dollars to each of his sisters Ethel and Isabel. I direct that my said executors shall before assigning said mortgage to my said grandson see to the payment of the said several sums.

The residence of estate and effects not herein before specifically mentioned I direct shall be converted into money by my executors and after payment of all charges and expenses incidental to the winding up of my estate shall be divided equally amongst all my children and the heirs of any deceased child or children, (the latter taking only the share to which the parent would be entitled if living) share and share alike.

I appoint my sons Benjamin and Wellington the executors of this my last will.
