Poultry Jottings

It is apparent that there will be shortage of brooder coal next baby chick season. It is so serious that the Coal Controller's Office warns that, unless poultry raisers fill in application forms as soon as possible and place their orders with coal dealers, they may not be able to get brooder stove coal later on. They should place their order on one and take delivery as soon as their dealer has coal.

Six hundred coal application forms have been sent out from the office of the Poultry Service, Charlottetown, to brooder stove owners. Get busy! Fill them in! Place with your coal dealer! Should your dealer be unable to supply you, contact Box 39, Charlottetown. Many enquiries are being received regarding the Monster Poultry Meeting to be held in Charlottetown Friday, Sept. 21st. Indications point to a large crowd being present. Reservations have already been made for the principal speakers. It is expected that thirty people intimately connected with poultry from Toronto, Quebec, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, will be present.

Grading station operators should be on hand one hundred percent. It has been suggested that owners of grading stations give their graders a holiday in order that they may attend. The address by Prof. Snyder is certainly one that will do much to both entertain and instruct those who have the quality of P.E.I. poultry products under their control.

Poultry producers will be there by the score. Make Sept. 21st a day for contact with your poultry friends. Come Early!

Andy Christie, Kingston, New Hampshire, U.S.A. was a visitor at the poultry service office this week. He has done more perhaps than any other breeder to improve the breed of New Hampshire. He has hatched 50,000 laying hens—hatches baby chicks to the tune of five or six million per year. He is a busy man but always has time for chat. For some time he has been a member of the P.E.I. results too. His catch would make any P.E.I. producer's head spin with envy. "Andy" also had time to visit several poultry farms. One thing noticeable was the crowded brooder houses upon many of our farms—instead of brooder houses being used to house the chicks throughout the growing season, they are used to house the birds. We have already a number of up-to-date poultrymen using range shelters. They are a "Must have" for poultrymen.

International Semi-finals May Begin Sept. 11

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—President Frank Shaughnessy, of the International Baseball League, said today that if the top four clubs in the league could be persuaded to their present order the four-out-of-seven Governors' Cup semi-final playoffs would start at Montreal and Newark Sept. 11.

Montreal, which already has clinched the pennant, will be host to the fourth-place team, currently Baltimore, in the first two games Sept. 11 and 12. The teams then will go to the park of Montreal's opponent for three games Sept. 14, 15 and 16, returning to the Royals' stadium for the sixth and seventh games, if needed, Sept. 18 and 19.

Newark, now the second-place club, would be host to the team finishing third, a position Toronto now holds, for the first two games if the present standings prevail. If weather does not interfere, the clubs will fly to Toronto for the next three games in Maple Leaf Stadium Sept. 13, 14 and 15. They would return to the original site for contests Sept. 16 and 17, if needed.




