**THE TRAINS YESTERDAY.**—The P. E. I. R. line was considerably blocked by snow yesterday and under the circumstances the trains got through in good time. The trains from Murray Harbor and Georgetown did exceptionally well and arrived in Charlottetown about 10 o'clock. The train from Souris, however, was delayed somewhat by snow and freight work and arrived in the city about three hours late. 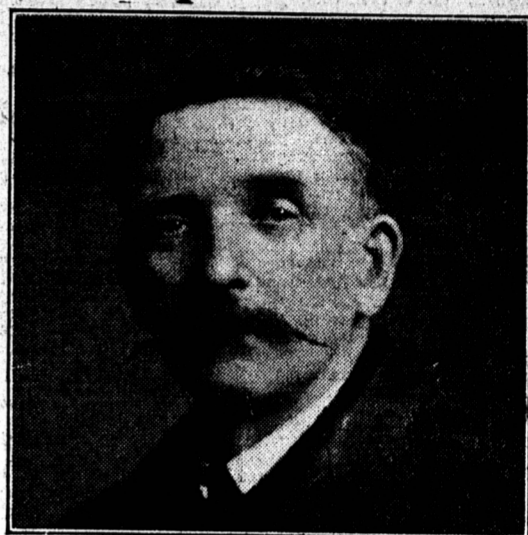
