HALIFAX, March 14—Sydney Millionaires cleared the last hurdle in defence of their Maritime senior hockey crown here tonight by turning back Halifax St. Mary's 5-3 to take the best-of-seven final series 4-1.

The champions, who bested Moncton Hawks in last year's final, returned to the Cape Breton steel city to open a best-of-five series with the winner of the Pembroke Lumber Kings-Cornwall Calumets Ottawa district series Monday night. They play the second game in Sydney Wednesday.

The Moneybags dropped only the first game of the series with Halifax and came on to take the second home game and the next three here.

Tonight's game, played on a faster sheet of ice than any previous played in Halifax in the series, broke fast with both clubs making end-to-end dashes in the first. Sydney slowed badly in the early minutes of the second and Halifax went to pieces momentarily in the third but came on in a last-ditch effort in the remaining minutes.

was 34 when he essayed the feat of recapturing the crown from Jeffries, after losing it to Bob Fitzsimmons. For the better part of 23 rounds, Corbett piled up an overwhelming lead against Jeffries. Had it gone the limit of 25 rounds there was never much doubt in anyone's mind he would have been declared the winner.

"But Corbett made one mistake in the 23rd round. After putting up one of the greatest fights of his career he left an opening cornering off the ropes and Jeffries stowed him away. Three years later Corbett tried it again but lost it in 10 rounds.

"Oldest of the ex-champions to try a little comeback and fall was Fitzsimmons. 'Ruby Bob' was 40 when he went after Jeffries in their second fight. It was a spectacular and successful enough affair Fitzsimmons made, but it was confined to the early rounds and the burly Jeffries knocked him out in eight.

"Jeffries himself was out of the ring five years and 35 years of age when he made his ill-fated attempt as a 'white hope' against Johnson and was knocked out in 15 rounds with Corbett in his corner. Thus the man who had thwarted comebacks by two of his predecessors knew how it felt to meet defeat that day in Reno in 1910.

"Then there was the memorable effort of Dempsey in 1927 in Chicago. The chance was there for the old Mauler, then 32, but he missed the boat against Tunney on the famous long count and that was the end of the trail.

"So, there is still an opportunity for Louis to make history if the present tangle ever is straightened out. At the worst he always certain of a fat purse if he ever decides to become the sixth heavyweight to try to rescue the heights."

Sport Echoes From Prince County

Navy Defeats All Stars 10-5; Move Into City League Finals With S D U

Founding out a well earned 10-5 victory over the Summerside All Stars, Walter Lawlor's Navy pucksters moved into the City Hockey League playoff finals in the second and final game of the semi-final series at the Forum last night before one of the biggest crowds to be seen at a City League contest this year. The Navy took the round by a total of 15-8, having won the opening game here last Tuesday night by a 5-3 count, with the victory giving them the right to meet Saint Dunstan's University for the City League title.

Being definitely outplayed by the Steele-coached Westerners in the first period, who outscored them 2-1, the Navy came back stronger in the second frame to knot the score at 4-4 at the end of that time, and launching a terrific onslaught in the final canto, outshot the visitors 6-1. Allie Carver ran wild to bang in five of the six goals, three of them coming in a minute and 21 seconds of play, with his linemates Wally Sheppard and Bubby Dowling garnering two assists each on the play.

Having a two goal deficit to make up as the result of last week's defeat, the All Stars really wallowed into the Tars in the first period to outplay them nearly every inch of the way. Forcing the attack into the Navy zone the All Stars hammered away at the opposing net almost incessantly for the first ten minutes of play and except for some really stellar goaltending on the part of Johnny Davis they should have shaken more goals than you could shake a stick at. Gay finally broke through goalie Davis' armor at the 11:16 mark when he combined on a nice passing play in front of the net with Grady and Oatway. Continuing their pressure attacks, Summerside scored again about five minutes later when Oatway banged in Woodside's pass from a scramble in front of the net, with the tally putting them on even terms with the Tars. Pulling a really pretty breakaway about 90 seconds later, however, Bubby Dowling picked up a loose puck near centre ice to race right in on goal, feint Foy out of position and pot a neat backhand shot from a hard angle as he went past the net. The counter ended the scoring for the period.

Opening up fast in the second period the Navy knotted the score at 2-2 after a minute and 22 seconds of play, when Ted Strain made an open break from his own blue line to pot a well executed goal, but the All Stars again came driving back to the attack to see Oatway and Woodside team up for the second time in the game to pull a passing attack inside the opposing blue line, Oatway potting Woodside's pass.

Both teams battled it out hard from then until midway in the frame when the Tars got the upper hand to bang in two goals in two minutes and 36 seconds of play. Wally Sheppard got the first on a play with Carver at 10:00, the latter carrying in from the opposing blue line to drive a hard shot at Foy who kicked it out only to have Sheppard wing in the rebound. Johnny Higon got the second on one of the smartest plays of the night when he broke from the blue line to make a nice pass to Joey LeClair at centre who carried in on net to slip it back over to Higon who banged in a hard shot that hit the far corner of the net. The tally put the Navy one goal to the front for the first time in the game. The play really

roughened up for the remainder of the period with four men cooling their heels in the penalty box in the last six minutes of play. Both teams were playing one man short when Grady knotted the score at 4-4 in the last second of play when he clicked on a passing play with Oatway inside the blue line during a Summerside gang attack.

Getting the jump on their opponents right from the start of the final period, the Navy turned into a regular field-day for goals, outshooting their opponents 8-1. Higon started the ball rolling at 1:35 when he slapped in a rolling puck from considerable distance out which went through a maze of sticks and skates into the net. It was not until about seven minutes later that Carver started on his wild scoring spree to bang in five goals. He got the first when he picked up a loose puck halfway in from the blue line to drive a hard shot past Foy, notching his second about 40 seconds later on a smart play with Dowling and W. Sheppard from a faceoff from the right of the opposing net. He repeated the procedure again about the same space of time when he and Dowling again pulled a play from a faceoff, this time to the left of the net.

Then Summerside countered again at 16:53 on a smart passing play with Syl Bernard from the blue line in, only to have Carver shoot two more goals before the game ended, the first on a passing attack with Wally Sheppard, and the last on a nice breakaway solo from centre ice. This period also got really rough towards the latter part of the game, with both teams only playing three men out on one occasion, with five men taking a trip to "sinners row" during the frame.
