**RECEIVED COMMISSION.**—Mr. E. H. Dewar, of Fortune Cove, is in receipt of the notice of the appointment of his son, Robert, as Lieutenant. Dewar enlisted as a private at the outbreak of the war and saw fifteen months active service in France and Belgium, winning his sergeant stripes on the field. While acting in this capacity he was severely wounded, and has since been convalescing in England. On his return to duty he qualified as lieutenant and when last heard from was on leave preparatory to returning to France.

**INTERESTING VISITOR.**—Private Charles Hebert, of Dorchester, N.E., returned soldier, who was wounded in the Third Battle of Ypres, on June 13th, 1916, has arrived in the city on a visit to his aunt, Mrs. Frank Loughran, King Street. Private Hebert enlisted in the 55th Battalion and was afterwards drafted into the 35th. At Ypres he was blown up by a shell, and his leg broken above the ankle. He went the usual round of the hospitals and arrived at his home, in Dorchester on January 23rd. He spent three months altogether at the front before he was put out of commission.

**RED CROSS WORK.**—The ladies of Mount Albion Red Cross held what they call a "pay night" at the home of Mr. Boswell Jenkins. Both young and old came in large numbers till every room was filled to overflowing. Luncheon was served by the young ladies and a collection was taken up which amounted to \$11.50 to be spent buying yarn and other comforts for the boys at the front. The evening was very pleasantly spent, between work, music, singing and gramophone selections when everybody returned to their homes feeling that they spent a most pleasant evening through the noted hospitality of Mr. and Mrs. Jenkins.

**SHE SAW JOFFRE.**—A young Charlottetown lady, at present in Montreal, in a letter to a friend in this city, gives some idea of the enthusiasm with which General Joffre was received in that city last Sunday. She says, in part: "This is a big day in Montreal. We thought we had a big time at the celebration of the Battle of Ypres, but it was nothing to the reception they gave General Joffre. He came in on the 11 o'clock train and Peel Street and the square were packed solidly with people. We got as far down as the Windsor Hotel, and could hear the cheering and see the tops of the helmets of the guards as they came along. Then we 'shinned' through the crowd up to Sherbrooke Street and stayed there till they passed by. We were determined to see him, and we did too, twice, right up close. He is certainly great. One man had a large bouquet of red roses and he ran right on, under the noses of the Guards' horses, gave them to the General and came back shouting 'I touched him anyway.' After they had passed an old truckman said to me, 'Did you see Joffre?' and when I said yes and asked him if he had seen him, the tears actually rolled down his cheeks, as he said sadly, 'No, I was too far away; and the poor old soul was not more than three feet from him. A major, one of the original Princess Pats, was taken from the Royal Victoria Hospital in an ambulance to see the General and the great Joffre went over and saluted him. It was fine."
