record attendance and a curriculum of great interest. The purposes of the School are to develop. Natural Science, but not this only, collateral studies in fact all the studies incidental to pedagogic development. "The only doctrine we promulgate is, The world is Beautiful and it is Good to Live," Hearty applause marked the appreciation of the audience.

Professor Andrews was the next speaker. His eyes are open and compliments on our improved buildings, streets and institutions were forthcoming. It takes one a back to think that creameries and cheese making institutions are the outcome of science. We are prone to attribute our blessings, our industries to—well I nearly said the present administration—but we certainly do not think back far enough to thank the microscopist or bacteriologist for these institutions so valuable to us and to our development.

The learned doctor warmly advocates forestry. With the aid of science the knowing the helpers and deterrents to fertility in the soil we can quadruple our present crops. He tendered thanks for the cordial welcomes. (Dr. Bailey finds it according to his own words impossible to make a speech. He could however express his gratification on the visit of the school to Charlottetown as it was his first visit, every corner of N. S. and N. B. he had traversed, 1400 feet below and 2700 feet above the surface. Our Island represents in its soil the highest or newest phase of geological strata. He was anxious to discover the promoting influences of the wonderful fertility of the Island. He will not have as great a chance as elsewhere of helping his geological co-students as the Island has few rocks, but matters of interest are not wanting everywhere. Dr. Anderson here mentioned that as an outcome of the rural schools established in the west of the Island is the planting of trees in public places and around farms and homesteads.

A rousing song by Mr. Barlow caused all hands to move and in concert too, expressing great pleasure.

Mr. Seaman extended YMCA privileges. He announced that the Summer School was open to the public on payment of a small fee. He intimated that the first lecture would be on Thursday next by Prof. Hanna of Kings College N. S. Subject Japan. The lecture would be illustrated. The enrolment fee had been partly paid by the City Council leaving only a fee of \$1 to be paid by any citizen who wishes to enjoy the privileges of the school outside its excursions.

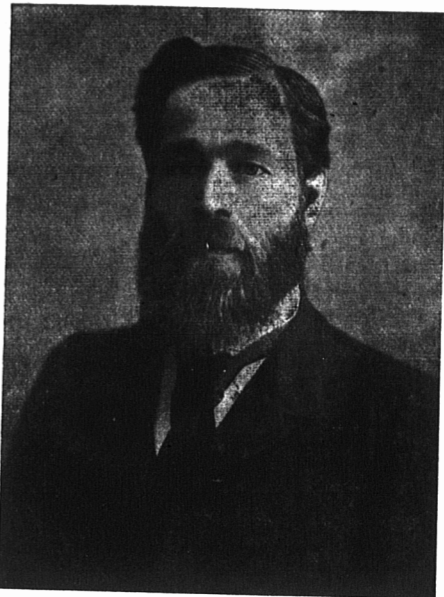

ARMIES ARE NOW FACE TO FACE

Across Laik River—Russians Eager to Fight Kuroki—Togo Again Busy—Stakelberg's Retreat—Chefoo Hears of a Russian Naval Raid and More Terrible Explosions at Port Arthur.

FROM RUSSIAN QUARTERS.

Head quarters of General Count Kellors' Nint Kai July 12—(Special)—The opposing armies are nearly facing each other on the heights across Laik River, ready to engage in a death grapple.

COLLISIONS EVERY DAY.

A correspondent who visited Kellors' quarters says the Russians have become hard fighters. Hardly a day passes without a collision with the advance posts of the Japanese army.

WANT TO FIGHT KUROKI.

The Russians are anxious to fight Kuroki, whose men are entrenched on the other side of the river.

TOGO REPORTS TORPEDO WORK

TOKIO, July 12—(Special)—Admiral Togo reports that at midnight of the 11th his torpedo boats approached the boom which blocks the entrance to Port Arthur and attacked guardship Diana. The result has not

been ascertained but the Japanese boats returned undamaged.

REPEAT STORY OF KAI CHOW.
