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GERMANY SUPPLYING ARMS AND MUNITIONS TO IRELAND.

Ship Load of Rifles and Artillery Seized in Grangemouth. Two Ship Masters Arrested. All Ships Between England and Germany to be Searched.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 26.—The British Government issued orders today that all ships plying between Germany and the United Kingdom be thoroughly searched as a result of the discovery of arms destined to Ireland in a vessel from a German port.

ARMENIANS TO BE ARMED FOR SELF PROTECTION

Allies Will Arm 40,000 Armenians to Protect Themselves from Turks. Lloyd George Attributes Turkish Crisis to United States.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 26.—The Allies will arm 40,000 Armenians for self defence against their Turkish oppressors, Premier Lloyd George announced in the House of Commons late today. The Premier expressed the hope that France would undertake the Armenian mandate. He reiterated that the Turkish crisis was precipitated by the delay on the part of the United States in ratifying the peace treaty and by America's refusal to accept the mandate for Armenia.

Sir Arthur Currie Welcomed in N. Y.

NEW YORK, March 26.—25 Canadians resident in New York accorded a rousing welcome tonight to General Sir Arthur Currie who commanded the Canadian Corps in France, when he spoke as the guest of honor before the Canadian Club at a dinner in the Biltmore. General Currie sketched the history of the corps citing instances of conspicuous heroism, dwelt on the fighting qualities of the Canadians as brought out in the war and paid a high tribute to the Canadian people for the courage with which they were facing the after war problems.

Gun With Range of 150 Miles

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 26.—The British Government is in close touch with the French Government with regard to the recent French invention of a gun said to have a firing range of 150 miles. Premier Lloyd George stated in answer to a question in the House of Commons today.

Litvinia and Esthonia Agree

(Special to The Guardian.) BRUSSELS, March 26.—The Lithuanian and Estonian governments have agreed to a treaty of friendship and alliance. The treaty was signed in Brussels and is subject to ratification within two weeks, under which Esthonia will evacuate the occupied districts leaving them under control of the Lithuanian government.

Workmen Now Under Communists

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, March 26.—A Westphalian workmen's army entered under control of communists, a Berlin despatch, quoting the Frankfurt Zeitung said today. Supreme command will be exercised by the federation of Red soldiers.

\$15,000 for Veterans From Tag Collections

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, March 26.—A total of \$13,840 was secured in yesterday's tag days for the Army and Navy Veterans in Canada. This satisfactory amount together with an additional thousand dollars approximately, which the result of special canvassing is expected to bring in, secures the veterans' organization practically the full \$15,000 which was the estimated amount the collection would realize.

Britain's Birthrate Greatly Increased

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, March 26.—Nature is making good Great Britain's war losses to her population. Statistics here today show births registered during last quarter of 1919 were 223,569 against 114,760 deaths. Births gained 48,202 over previous quarter and 61,794 over corresponding quarter in 1918.

CANADA HAS ACCEPTED WARSHIPS FROM BRITAIN

A Light Cruiser and Two Torpedo Boat Destroyers as Nucleus of New Canadian Navy. Cruiser 45,000 tons with Speed of 30 Knots.

OTTAWA, March 26.—The light cruiser and the two torpedo boat destroyers which Canada is to receive as a gift from the British Government will be of the latest type in the world's naval classes. These vessels will serve as the nucleus of a fleet until such time as a permanent naval policy is formulated for Canada.

Big English Loan to Assist Belgium

(Special to The Guardian.) BRUSSELS, March 26.—The British Government has announced that it is offering a loan of five million pounds sterling to assist Belgium in the reconstruction of the devastated districts of Belgium.

Don't Want Wilson for Third Term

MONTREAL, March 25.—After two days of discussion which at times became somewhat embittered, the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada at their fourth annual convention here agreed tonight to adopt a definite bonus plan which fixes a maximum of \$2,500.00 and a minimum of \$1,000.00 subject to no deduction and payable to 100 per cent of the Canadian forces.

AN ECONOMIC CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN PARIS SOON

No Reply Received from United States to Invitation to Send Delegates. Purpose is to Extend Allied Aid to Poland and Austria.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, March 26.—No reply has yet been received from the United States to the invitation to send representatives to the International Economic Conference to be held in Paris or Rome in April, before the next meeting of the Supreme Council in San Remo. The correspondent learns that the conference will be a sequel to decisions of the Supreme Council held recently in London following Premier Lloyd George's contention that reconstruction of Europe requires international rather than allied co-operation.

EX-CROWN PRINCE REFUSES TO EXPRESS AN OPINION

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, March 26.—Former Crown Prince William, telegraphing in reply to a message asking for his views on the crisis in Germany says he regrets he is unable to say anything. Like his father, the former Crown Prince is known to view the present conditions as his exile of one year and one half has not changed his opinion, according to those who have conversed with him, that the German people are not yet ready to align themselves among the Democrats.

Blame Lloyd George and the Miners

(Dom. Press Special.) LONDON, March 26.—Miners federation today decided to re-open negotiations with government in an effort to arrive at a peaceable settlement of the men's demands for increased wages.

Polish Peace Still Uncertain

(Dom. Press Special.) WASHINGTON, March 26.—Polish peace proposals to Soviet Russia contain a provision that the pact must be ratified by an elected Russian assembly, according to summary made public by the Polish delegation here today.

More Trouble Brewing in Fiume

(Dom. Press Special.) ROME, March 26.—Important events are expected soon in Fiume. The national council under Gabriele D'Annunzio has determined to proclaim a republic. It was reported today on reliable authority.

Biggest Fish Catch Landed in Halifax

(Special to The Guardian.) HALIFAX, March 26.—Four hundred thousand pounds of fresh fish, said to be the largest catch ever brought to this port by a single vessel, was the cargo of the steam trawler Venosta which arrived this afternoon from the Banks.

Extend Limit to Aid Returned Men

(Special to The Guardian.) OTTAWA, March 25.—The time limit in which financial assistance may be given out of the Federal unemployment fund has been extended to April 10, in the case of men without dependents and to April 24, in the case of men with dependents.

Ebert Government Has Resigned

(Dom. Press Special.) BERLIN, March 26.—The cabinet of Gustav Bauer formed yesterday, resigned today. Majority Socialists advised President Ebert to order Herman Muller who was Minister for Foreign Affairs to form a new cabinet.
