**REFUSING A GIFT**

A defensive error gave South a beautiful chance in today's deal—but he gave it right back!

East dealer. Neither side vulnerable.

♠ A 9 2  
♥ K  
♦ Q J 6  
♣ A J 10 7 5 4

The bidding: East South West North Pass 3 Pass 6 ♠ (1) Pass Pass Pass

North had good support for his partner's preemptive opening, but his leap to the slam was nevertheless inexcusable.

West, however, apparently felt that his side could not have two aces, because after he had opened the heart ace and seen dummy, he shifted to the singleton trump!

It can be presumed that South breathed a sigh of relief at the opponents' failure to collect a diamond trick immediately. Winning the spade shift in his own hand, he led the club eight to the ace and ruffed a club, then entered dummy with a trump and returned the club jack.

As may be seen, East could have made everything simple for the enemy by covering this lead with the club king, but he was not so accommodating; he plays low without any revealing hesitation.

Thereupon, declarer went into a long "huddle." Was the club king going to drop on this trick, if he ruffed or should he let the jack ride, discarding a diamond? As he explained later, South finally decided that West's failure to shift to diamonds at the second trick would have been incomprehensible except for his possession of a sure club trick and stopper, and on that reasoning, South now ruffed the club jack, expecting the king to fall. It is unnecessary to say that he was severely disappointed.

South's decision was extremely questionable! If West had held the king-queen of clubs, in addition to the heart ace, surely he would have opened the club king to establish a trick in that suit, while he retained control of hearts.

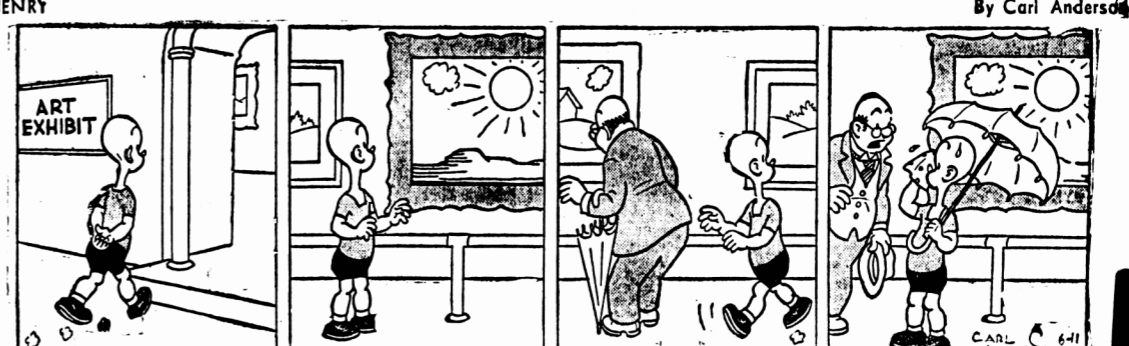
