OFFICIAL SABBATH-BREAKING.

The official Sabbath-breaking of a few days ago was so flagrant, so wide-spread, so defiant of the Christian sentiment of the country, that to let it pass unrebuked would seem to be consenting to, if not condoning the offence. For our pastors, our churches, our Sabbath Alliances to submit in silence would almost inevitably bring about a repetition of the act, and further and more frequent repetitions until the Canadian Sabbath, now a venerated institution, would become degraded to the level of Chicago, or the Paris Sunday.

Under representative institutions, our Governments, Parliaments, Premiers and officials are the servants of the people. What they do officially is done presumably on behalf of the people and in obedience to the popular will. We know very well that what was done on Sunday last was not done by consent of the people, was in fact an outrage upon the moral sense of our people. But there is an old proverb that "silence gives consent." Do not our pastors, our churches and church courts owe it to themselves and to the people whose religious destinies they guide, to denounce the wrong and show to the world that they are not consenting parties to the most shameful, public and official act of Sabbath-breaking ever perpetrated in Canada?

Millions did evil and he restrained them not. Defeat, the capture of the Ark of the Covenant, the utter destruction of his house and his own neck broken were the swift and terrible results. Shall it be said that our rulers may do evil in our name and that a Christian electorate, holding the power of political life and death over the offenders, will do nothing to restrain them? Will not even rebuke them? If so what are we but consenting parties to the wrong, taking upon ourselves the responsibility for what is done in our name? Is it not possible that we can make our sense of wrong and outrage so clear to our rulers that they will not dare to repeat this flagrant offence in our midst? We believe that it is, and if this is to be done the time to speak is now, and let the trumpet give no uncertain sound.

Both parties in Canada have sinned in regard to violation of the Sabbath, but let it not be said that because this last notorious and defiant violation of both the moral and the civil law is the act of Liberal rulers that it shall therefore be condoned. The time was when Liberal leaders were very strict in holding their opponents to observance of the sanctity of the Sabbath. The writer remembers an impressive scene in the Canadian Commons long ago when with business of some importance before it Sir John Macdonald kept the House in session till after twelve o'clock on a Saturday night. At that time Alexander Mackenzie, Edward Blake and a number of their followers rose with solemn dignity and left the House at midnight. We seem to have another order of Liberalism now which officially knows no Sabbath. It is for Sabbath loving Liberals to say whether or not they are prepared to sink the Sabbath in their party allegiance, or to restrain their leaders within the bounds of decent Sabbath observance.

Shall we open the shop, the factory, the office, the theatre on Sunday and abolish

the day of rest? Shall the men on our railways and steamboats be compelled to work seven days of the week? Shall the Decalogue and the statute law of the land be set aside together at the bidding of the foreign millionaire at his pleasure? Shall our rulers in our name go forth on the Sabbath and bow, hat in hand in gracious and humble welcome to the foreign invader of the Canadian Sabbath? These are the questions of the hour, and they are pressing for an answer. What shall the answer be—the silence that gives consent, or the outspoken rebuke of a Sabbath loving people?

The Chicago Tribune quotes a deliverance of the late President McKinley, at the dedication of a soldiers' and sailors' home in Cleveland, in 1894 in which he touched upon the subject of anarchy. It derives a sad interest from the tragedy in which the good President met his death at the hand of an Anarchist assassin. We quote:

"With patriotism in our hearts and with the flag of our country in our hand there is no danger of anarchy. . . . Anarchy flees before patriotism. Peace and order and security and liberty are safe so long as love of country burns in the hearts of the people. . . . Liberty to make our own laws does not give us license to break them. Liberty to make our own laws commands a duty to observe them ourselves and to enforce obedience among all others within their jurisdiction. Liberty, my fellow-citizens, is responsibility, and responsibility is duty, and that duty is to preserve the exceptional liberty we enjoy within the law, and for the law and by the law."

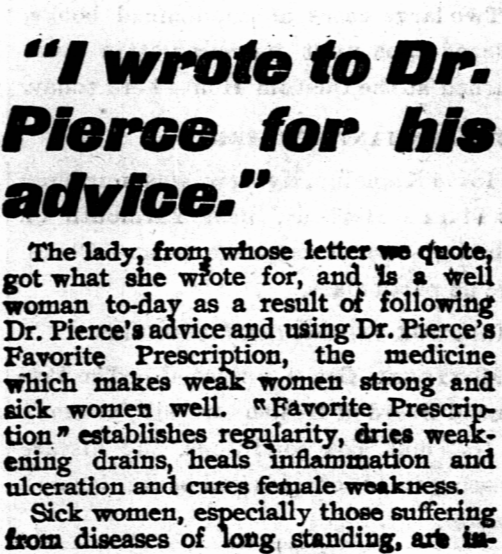
