YOUTH TRAINING BILL PASSES THIRD READING IN HOUSE

OTTAWA, May 18-Labor Minister's tonight obtained third reading of his youth training bill in the House of Commons. The bill provides for the present youth training, under which courses for unemployed young people are financed by the Dominion and Provincial Governments, for a period of three years. The bill also provides for three annual appropriations of \$1,500,000 by the Dominion.

signed Montreal's new "Golden Book" and received an address of welcome in the "Hall of Honor." Aldermen and their wives, church dignitaries, judges and Victoria Cross holders were present. In all the Royal Couple shook hands with 156 persons during the day.

"Ticker tape floating through the air added a new touch to the parade as Their Majesties moved past Place d'Armes where they heard "God Save the King" being played on the organ of Notre Dame Cathedral.

Franciscan Monks in their brown cassocks, Dominican Fathers in white robes, red-sashed canons and black-robed priests were massed in the square before the Church and raised their voices in a sort of chanting cheer as the Queen waved and His Majesty saluted.

There were another 100 Monks and priests massed in front of historic St. James Basilica on Dominion Square as the couple passed the square the thousands there scurried like mad down side streets to catch another sight of

them further along the route. Montreal's Protestant children had their chance to greet Their Majesties when they drove around inside Molson Stadium.

Veterans Line Streets

During the long tour of the city 18,000 war veterans wearing light blue berets with golden crowns helped line the streets. Montreal's two noted regiments, the Black Watch and the Royal Victoria Rifles were along the line with all the other units of the Montreal garrison and a score of bands.

At one point they passed a group of Knights of Columbus, looking colorful in silk hats and black capes lined with scarlet. Shriners wearing fezzes shouted a salute, hundreds of nurses in spotless white lined the fronts of city hospitals, thousands of boy scouts, girl guides, sea scouts and wolf cubs were on hand.

In Mount Royal Park 3,500 Wolf Cubs were massed. The King and Queen waved to them as their soprano voices blended with the deeper shouts of those around them.

There must have been at least 50 different parish cadet corps in
