of his patients, but those of the sanatorium and community at large as well. It has been stated, the benefit accruing from the treatment of early cases is greatest, not merely to the individual patient or patients, but principally and in a much larger and broader sense, to the community at large.

The principal object to be attained here, however, is not merely to smooth the patient's pillow, but, if these cases are properly selected, may serve to remove a focus of infection from family and society.

The second consideration: How best to obtain the largest results from the limited material, is even more far-reaching in importance than the actual work within the sanatorium.

It is in order that the good results obtained by sanatorium treatment shall prove really worth while, it should be supplemented by intelligent, systematic work outside of the sanatorium.

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IN MEMORIAM

MRS. RODERICK HOGEN.

The death occurred at South Shore on Feb. 4th, of Mrs. Roderick Hogen, in the 52nd year of her age. She was the widow of the late Roderick Hogen. She was the mother of twelve children, seven of whom survive her.

On Friday morning, the 5th inst., Glen Martin was visited by the messenger of death, and claimed as its victim, one of its young men, Samuel John Martin, son of Mr. Kenneth Martin.

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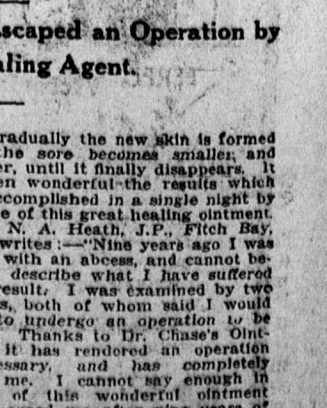
