ing up to 27 feet of water can enter with safety; smaller vessels can ascend the East River above Charlottetown, 10, and even 18 miles, while good-sized vessels have been launched at the head of the river. Vessels can anchor close to the wharves, the anchorage being excellent over all the harbor. Near the river there is over one mile from its mouth. The usual depth of water for anchorage is 30, 40 and up to 60 ft, the rise of the tide being 3 1/2 feet at neap tide.

Queen Square, in the heart of the city, seems to be the focal point of the life and activity of the capital. In the centre, stand the legislative and other public buildings, surrounded by green sward with gay-colored flower beds; a sparkling fountain and band-stand, from which splendid concerts are given on summer evenings, adding to the attractiveness of the spot. Then, along the sides of the squares are grouped the principal mercantile and banking institutions. The streets that lead off are spacious and leafy thoroughfares that give the town a most attractive and inviting air. Most of the buildings are of frame, but there are also many substantial structures of brick and stone. One of the most imposing is St. Dunstan's Cathedral, a large building of grey stone situated at the head of George Street, in the centre of the town. Its two towering spires are

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From the capital we proceed to the east end of the island; passing through the charming little village of Tracadie on the north shore, where the white sandy beaches offer the best of bathing and the wild fowl that dwell in the reeds and long grasses of the surrounding marshes and ponds bring to the heart of the huntsman. Morrell River, our next stop, is a delightful spot in which to camp. Low banks are well-wooded and there are numbers of springs of pure cold water. The surrounding country abounds in trout pools and the river itself will bring many a thrill of joy to the ardent angler. This next village nestled on the brow of the hill overlooking St. Peter's Bay is St. Peter's, a quiet little town, where the spirit of peace seems to dwell. We pass through a number of tiny villages before reaching Harmony, a picturesque little place in the midst of a network of rivers, and inside of half an hour we have arrived at the town of Souris, on Calville Bay, an old Acadian settlement, where many French are still to be found. Steamers leave from here for Pictou, N.S., and the Annapolis Islands, which are populated by Acadian fishermen, and where the quaint old-world life on the islands will be found most interesting. From Souris we take the best to Georgetown, a quiet old-fashioned place with grassy fields and a tranquil shore, and from this most seaside town, fishing and shipping provides the chief means of livelihood.

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
