**EXAMINES HOSPITAL PLANS**—Yesterday evening Mr. James Paton returned from Toronto, where he attended the exhibition of the American Hospital Association to inspect all that is newest and up-to-date in hospital equipment to assure that the new Prince Edward Island Hospital shall be in the forefront in this respect as in others. He also went over the proposed plans carefully with the very best men in Toronto who are connected with hospital building, collecting much information regarding ventilation, heating and other matters connected with the proposed new hospital. Mr. Paton was in contact with experts such as Messrs. Harkness and Anderson, who have given special study to the manufacture of material to lessen the noise in hospitals. Govan and Ferguson, the architects for the proposed new hospital, have completed the plans and will be here with them in person towards the end of this week.

**TRADE BOARD MEETING**—A council meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held at 4:30 yesterday afternoon in the Board of Trade Rooms. President Tweedy presided. Owing to the absence of Mr. Higgins, Mr. R. L. Cotton was acting Secretary. The entire time of the meeting was taken up with a discussion of the curtailment of the late train service. The Board, it was complained, is handicapped in the work in this regard by lack of support from the public, who for the most part do not seem to realize the importance of this service or the injustice done to the business of this province by its removal. Contrary to common opinion, Prince Edward Island is almost the only place where reduction in train service for the fall and winter months has taken place. It was shown that with the present single train service anyone leaving Boston on Friday morning could not reach points on the Eastern line such as Mount Stewart or Souris until Tuesday evening. An actual case was cited where a party left Woodstock, New Brunswick at 7:30 Saturday morning and did not reach Charlottetown until 7:30 Monday night. Another complaint was cited of an order which reached here yesterday afternoon on the Hochelaga for supplies to be sent on the Aramoor which left last night. This caused great inconvenience in preparing the supplies at such short notice, whereas with a late mail train running the letter would have reached here the evening before, in ample time to fill the order. It was finally decided to hold a meeting Friday evening at 8 p. m. to Premier Stewart, Mr. E. W. McKinnon, the Senators and the federal members should be invited and the matter discussed.

D., being in command. Upon conclusion of their training, the men will engage in the Canadian Artillery Association Competitive Tests and a good showing is to be expected.

On Wednesday and Thursday the Court of Appeal of the Supreme Court heard the appeal case of William B. MacNeill of Summerside against Robert W. Stewart of Brudenell. This case concerned a promissory note, given in payment for Jay Copper Shares and cashed by Mr. MacNeill, who brought action to recover the amount. Last June the jury gave a verdict for the defendant Stewart, which is now being appealed. The arguments were concluded yesterday and the court adjourned until Nov. 9th when briefs will be presented and the case decided. The Chief Justice and Mr. Justice Saunders heard the case.
