DEER IN THE MONCTON STREETS

MONCTON, N. B., Aug. 14.-(The meteoric appearance and dramatic disappearance of a large deer caused a great deal of excitement on Main street today. The animal entered the city at the north end, crossing the width of the town, pursued by children, and finally found its way to Main street. Bewildered by this abrupt debut into the business life of the city, the animal fell on the pavement, and, arising, dashed into a china store. The latter was heavily stocked with glassware and crockery ware, but the animal ran the length of the shop, breaking only one espidor, and leaped through a window at the rear and then continued on towards the river. Quite a crowd pursued it, but the animal was too fleet, and easily distanced its pursuers.

BANK OF ENGLAND RATE INCREASED

LONDON, August 15.-(The directors of the bank of England, after a prolonged discussion, today raised the bank's discount rate from four to four and a half per cent, owing to the monetary situation on the continent and in New York, and the anxiety of American houses to place finance bills which is taken to indicate possible gold shipments to New York in the near future.

The recent foreign competition for the gold shipment evidently helped the directors to arrive at their decision, and the usual demands for Egypt as well as South America must be met before the year end. The reserve was sufficiently depleted without such a demand from New York as experienced last year.

BUBONIC PLAGUE IN SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, August 18.-(Special) Five cases of bubonic plague, four of which were fatal have been discovered in the past week among arriving foreigners near Chinatown.

SEVERE STORMS VISIT SUSSEX

SUSSEX, N. B., Aug. 14.-(Sussex was visited by a terrific thunder and lightning storm this morning about 2 o'clock. From all directions received from the surrounding country it would appear that the storm was local in its severity. The lightning was very vivid and was accompanied by terrific crashes of thunder which greatly intimidated any of the nervous temperaments. No rain fell until the storm was nearly over, when it commenced with great fury, accompanied by a high wind.

HOLIDAY FOR THE PREMIER

OTTAWA, Aug. 15.-(Sir Wilfrid Laurier left this afternoon for Charlevoix Mills Quebec, where he will be the guest of the Shawingian Fish and Game Club. The Premier will enjoy a brief and well earned holiday, and from the cares of state will turn to piscatorial delights. Hon. Jacques Bureau, Solicitor General, accompanied the Premier. On Wednesday next Sir Wilfrid will go to Quebec City. He will return to Ottawa next week. It is understood that he will go to Toronto for a few days during the exhibition.

Before leaving Sir Wilfrid attended a meeting of the Government at which a couple of hundred critics of a routine nature were put through. The resignation of Judge Clements of Essex, was accepted. Judge Clements is retiring from the Bench to go into private life. A leave of absence was granted the sheriff of Dawson to come out for the winter.

BRITISH PEERS WERE STARTLED

LONDON, Aug. 15.-(The Earl of Mayo is an innovator of a bold type. The house of lords has ever been remarkable for its punctilious observance of conventions in the matter of dress, and the Marquis of Clanricarde, whose whole history shows that he is not afraid of running counter to public opinion or to that of his noble colleagues, has never dared to appear in the upper chamber except in a tall hat and frock coat, although it must be admitted that the latter garment sometimes concealed a waistcoat of such vivid coloring that the lord chancellor's robes were cast into the shade by it.

BIG DOCKS AND TIMBER BURNED

SAULT STE MARIE, Aug. 10.-(The docks the Dominion Lumber Company, of Blind River, and the lumber piled thereon, was destroyed by fire during the early hours of this morning. About three million feet in all were burned, mostly pine which was owned by several companies. The total loss will likely amount to one hundred thousand dollars, but not a cent can be secured as to the amount of insurance held by the firms interested.

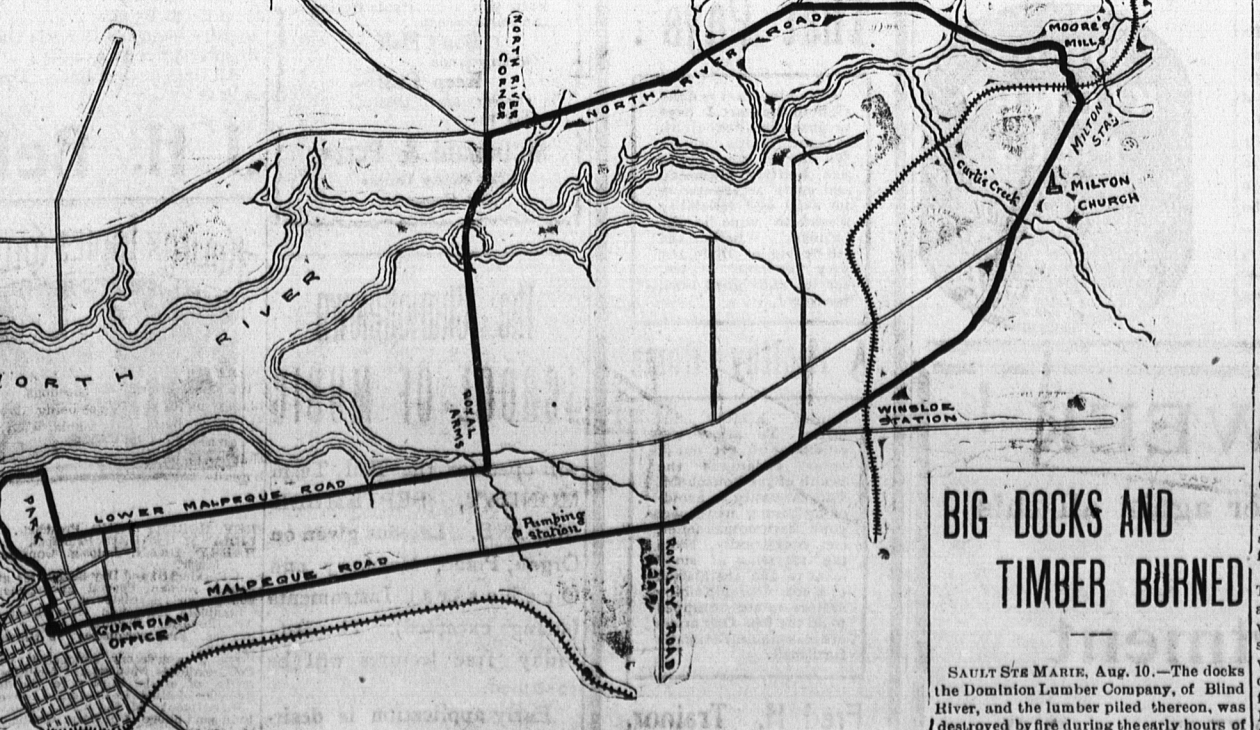
SEARCH FOR ARK IN MOUNTAINS

Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition Officials to Sift Story Told by Indians - A Most Remarkable Yarn If Anything In It.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.-(Mou Altrarat, with the ruins of Noah's Ark on it, discovered in Yukon, was the headline that appeared in a Dawson newspaper some few years ago. As a controversy may well be waged as to the meaning and original purpose of the great ruins that Indians declare exist on the top of a mountain far in the interior of Northern Yukon the management of the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition, which will be held at Seattle in 1910, intends to sift the story and, if there is any truth in it, to have photos and plans of it at the Pacific World's Fair, in order that archaeologists may be able to give an intelligent opinion.
