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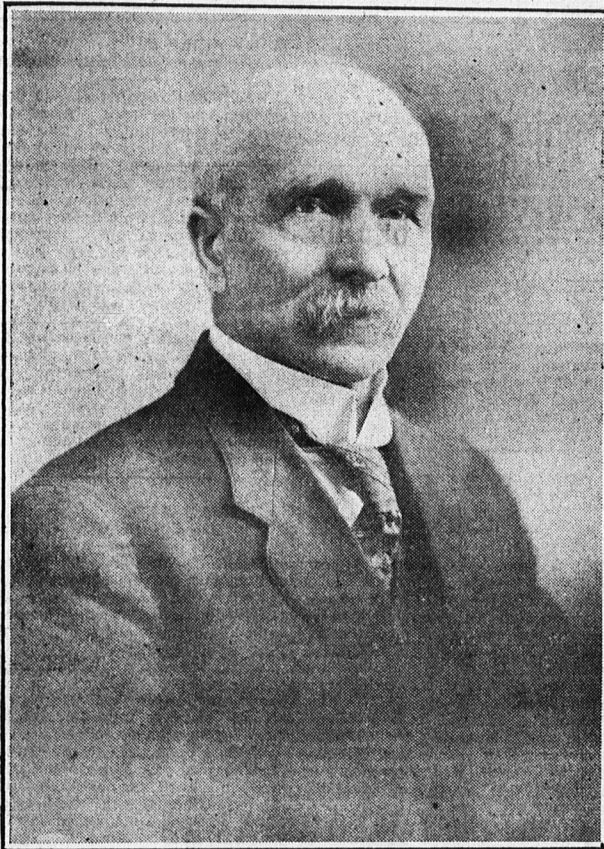

SUMMARY OF WAR SITUATION

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Aug. 26.—Brest-Litovsk, the main fortress and concentration centre for the Bug line of defences was occupied by Austro-Germans to-day. While the Russians offered a stubborn resistance to the invaders during their approach to the fortress they apparently did not attempt to defend Brest-Litovsk itself, but evacuated it as they did Ossowetz, in conformity with the intention, indicated in despatches from Petrograd, to take up new positions further east. The Germans now are in possession of the whole line of railway from Cholm to Bialystok, the Russians having already evacuated the latter city. The lesser fortresses of Grodno and Gitta are now the only strongly defended positions remaining in the hands of the Russians. Both these are being approached by German armies and probably will be given up when they have fulfilled the purpose of facilitating the retreat of the Russian armies. The Russians have not entered the vast Belovezh Forest, which runs thirty miles north and south for a width of seven to ten to thirty miles. The forest is a famous hunting centre and bison preserve. South of it are the pripiet marshes which protect the Russian left, and with plenty of roads and three or four railroads it is expected here that French Dues-Nichols will make a good retirement. If Grodno and Vilna are held out long enough, even though they should fall, military observers say the Grand Duke will be well on his way to his new positions before the Germans reach his flank.

CONSCRIPTION IS AGAIN HINTED AT

(Special to the Guardian.) LONDON, Aug. 26.—Something in the nature of conscription though the term was not employed, is foreshadowed by Earl Shelborne, President of the Board of Agriculture, in an address this afternoon to a deputation of agricultural land owners which visited him in London. "Many more men have got to join the army, whether voluntarily or compulsory," said the Earl. "The agricultural labourer has done his part nobly in this war but responses have been very unequal over the country and I forecast that during the next year men will be taken from districts and from farms, whence, hitherto they have not come."

ZEPPELIN SAILS TOWARDS ENGLAND

(Special to the Guardian.) AMSTERDAM, Aug. 26.—According to the Helvoek, a Zeppelin passed this morning over the Dutch Island Vlieland, flying from the East in a North-west direction towards the English coast. This is the second time in two days that Zeppelins have been seen over this island travelling toward England.

CHILDREN WERE MASSACRED BY TURKS

LONDON, Ont., Aug. 25.—Gus Mosweb, an Armenian, advised today that his wife and two small children had been massacred recently by Turks, at once resigned his position and enlisted, vowing vengeance.

THE WEATHER, TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

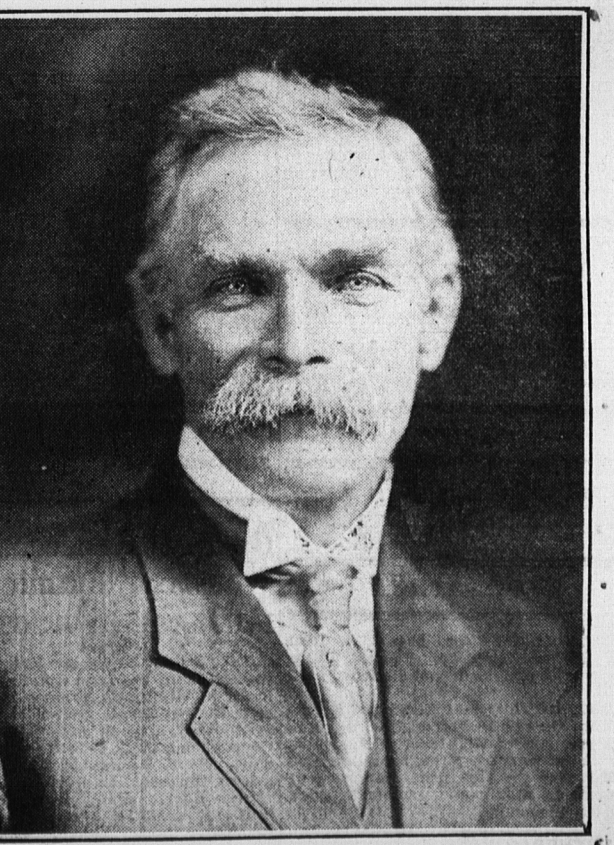
TRUE PHILANTHROPY

Hon. Charles Dalton's Sanitarium Now Nearing Completion

The greatest and most appreciated philanthropic gift the province has ever received, the Dalton Sanitarium for Consumptives, will be ready for occupation within the next six weeks. The contractors are putting the final touches and it is anticipated everyting will be in readiness for the inauguration by the end of September or beginning of October.

Few of us realize the magnitude or munificence of this gift by the Hon. Charles Dalton, who has already donated \$46,000 for the purpose. It should be remembered that until the present government came into power practically nothing had been done to fight the "Great White Plague" in our midst. When the Mathieson Government took office they found that medical officers, of health and doctors generally had been complaining of the inadequacy of the means for the segregation and treatment of tubercular patients and the utter lack of any place where those threatened with the disease could be treated. After consultation with the best medical opinion in the province, the Government made temporary arrangements for the treatment of tubercular patients in the Hospital and the Asylum, and began to plan for some special institution for the treatment of cases in the initial stages. It was at this juncture that the Hon. Charles Dalton, a member of the Government came forward and offered to provide a Sanitarium at a cost of \$30,000. The offer was gladly accepted and the thanks of the Province and the Legislature were fervently tendered to the generous donor and ordered to be inscribed in the minutes of the Legislature.

An expert from New York was appointed to select a suitable site, and after visiting several suggested places, he finally fixed upon a beautifully situated piece of land in North Wiltshire offered by the Hon. L. L. Jenkins. The expert without hesitation said it was the most ideal spot for such an institution he had seen anywhere in his travels, and it is certain that any one who chooses to visit the Sanitarium at this season of the year will heartily agree with him. The site is practically a crest of a hill overlooking Lot 65, with a magnificent belt of pine and spruce as a background and to keep off the stormy blasts of winter. The Sanitarium is some twelve miles from Charlottetown and three from North Wiltshire station. It is a delightful drive from the city, through one of the best and most prosperous parts of the province, and the panoramic view displayed is well worth the half day which it takes to enjoy it. From a great distance round the Dalton Sanitarium may be seen nestling

among the trees on the brow of the hill. It is a long, beautifully architected building, consisting of a high central block and two wings, designed and built in a semi-circular plan in grounds covering an area of fifty acres. The buildings are painted white and the roofs green and present a very artistic appearance as seen from a distance. As stated the Sanitarium consists of a centre block and two wings with a frontage of over 300 feet in concave form. The administration block is situated in the centre and on either side are two wings, to the west the men's pavilion and to the east the ladies' pavilion. The administration buildings is three stories in height from the basement, with a centre corridor with a suite of rooms on either side. The corridor is about 100 feet long. On the right are the doctors quarters consisting of main living room, study, bedroom and bathroom. Beyond is the staff's sitting room and business office. On the left is the examination room, throat room, drug room, laboratory, staff dining room and patients' dining room. There are also a waiting room, coat room, and general accommodation beyond. In a north wing attached is the servants accommodation, including kitchen, pantries, sculleries, all fitted up with the latest and most approved appliances. On the second story on the right are six patients' bedrooms while on the left of the corridor are a duty room, bathrooms, dayroom, linen room, and another patients' bedroom. On this story also are an isolation porch and two isolation rooms, and on the south east and west are balconies in which patients may sit. On the third story to the right of the corridor are two staff bedrooms, and two guest bedrooms, and a large nurses sitting room. On the left is the assistant nurses bedroom, serving room, superintendent's bedroom, and several storerooms, bath for staff and guests, and dressing room, while on the north, south east and west are "loggias" where the staff and guests may enjoy the gentle breezes. On east and west are fire escapes. From the basement to the third story is an elevator and dumb-water. Surrounding the whole of this block are three balconies on each floor. The main entrance faces due north and is nicely finished in native wood. There are eight entrances to the building reached by flights of stairs. The view from the main balcony is due south and commands an outlook of miles around unsurpassed in the Province. The patients pavilions are connected with the administration building by covered ways about 50 feet in length and each pavilion consists of eight booths and bathroom. The building is constructed of the very best quality of cedar, spruce and pine. The masonry of the main building is of maple, the corridors and bathrooms being covered with linoleum to deaden the sound. The building is set on a solid concrete base and has large basement accommodation and cellars. The basement is as well lighted as many second storey flats in the city. In the basement are situated the laundry, trunk
