## Stocks Close Higher On N. Y. Mart

 NEW YORK, Jan. 31—(AP)—  
 For the first time in nine consecutive sessions the stock market today finished with the average behind plus signs. With selected stocks in the lead, air-crafts, rails, coppers, gold mines and specialties moved grains running to 2 or more points generally. While dealings were exceptionally quiet, the associated press average of 60 stocks emerged with an advance on 7 of a point at 42.8. Transfers amounted to 757,890 shares compared with 1,189,830 last Friday.  
 Gains predominated on the Canadian list. Dome advanced 1 3/4 points to 60 and Lake Shore a point to 56 1/2 as Distillers-Sea-tram, International Nickel, McIntyre, Walkers, Massey Harris and Marconi improved slightly. Brazilian and Imperial Oil eased fractions.  
 Steel pushed up as it was announced new orders for the metal had been received from the Navy and private consumers.

## Early Gains Wiped Out By Late Losses

MONTREAL, Jan. 31—(CP)—  
 Late losses nullified an earlier wave of fractional gains in quiet trading on the Montreal Stock Exchange today. The softness failed to budge some of the interesting issues from higher levels reached in early dealings.  
 Metals showed optimism. Smelters showed a point higher at 60. International Nickel held a gain of one half and Noranda finished 5-8 higher. Hollinger yielded a minor fraction. Rails were stagnant and in papers fractional losses and gains were evenly distributed. St. Lawrence paper preferred was a bright spot with a two-point gain at 37.  
 Late weakness, cut deeply into constricted shares. Steel of Canada sold down more than a point at 63 3/4 and building products gave up a point at 51 1-2.  
 Total sale: Industrials 19,900; Mines, 133,300; Bonds \$1,350.

**Livestock**  
 MONTREAL, Jan. 31—(CP)—  
 Today's livestock receipts totalled 1,430 cattle, 712 calves, 185 sheep and lambs, 1,573 hogs.  
 Cattle were moving slowly at prices estimated to be between 25 and 50 cents lower than last Monday's sales. Good steers sold from \$5.25 to \$6, medium steers \$4.50 to \$5.25 and common steers from \$3.25 to \$4.25. Heifers ranged from \$3.25 to \$5.25 with an odd top at \$5.50. Good butcher cows were \$4 to \$4.25, medium butchers \$3.25 to \$3.75 and common \$2.75 to \$3.75. Canners and cutters were from \$2 to \$2.50. 100 more steers were sold for export to Great Britain and a couple of carloads of steers and cows for shipment to a Canadian point.  
 Calves were steady quality considered. A few good veals sold up to \$9.50. The bulk of the veals were sold in mixed lots at \$8.50 to \$9 and common light veals down to \$7. Drinkers ranged from \$4.50 to \$7.50. Grassers were from \$3.25 to \$4.25 with the bulk between \$3.75 and \$4.  
 Hogs were 25 cents higher. The bulk of the hogs were sold at \$9.50 for bacon fed and watered. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium, with the usual cut on off grades. Sows were from \$6.25 to \$7.25.

A physician with an extensive hospital practice both in private and public ward patients stated that at one time he much disliked visiting his rheumatic patients during cool damp weather as practically all of them would be feeling "low". He later found that other patients besides those afflicted with rheumatism felt worse on the damp days.  
 It was Chesterfield who said then an attack of a rainy morning could make a coward of a man who might otherwise have been a hero.  
 What about weather? Does the weather have any effect on the body?  
 Dr. J. Kuhman in an article in the Journal of the American Medical Association taken from a Leipzig medical journal says, "Everyday experiences show that noticeable reactions of the human organism take place only in case of weather changes. The manner in which weather changes influence the body or body processes is extremely complicated. A part of the effect of weather changes on the body—drastic changes of the moisture in the air, temperature and rate at which the wind blows—can be explained by the sudden demand on the body processes that regulate the body's temperature. In individuals sensitive to weather changes however there are other body processes affected besides temperature. Sensitive persons may even feel changes in the weather in advance.  
 The weather changes seem to affect that part of the nervous system not under control of the will such as the beating of the heart, breathing, and digestion. Children and slender adults are often irritable and restless in cold and damp weather but crowsy and sleepy during a warm spell.  
 The weather in these sensitive individuals affects the blood pressure, the rate at which body processes work and also affects or changes the chemistry of the blood itself."  
 The knowledge then that weather changes affect the body processes in weather-sensitive individuals should make us more patient with them. It should also help these individuals to understand that as the weather changes affect the body processes, they must expect to have some bad days.

**Currencies**  
 MONTREAL, Jan. 31—(CP)—  
 The Pound Sterling advanced 13 1/2 of a cent to \$5.01 13-32 of Montreal foreign exchanges today while the French franc advanced 1-16 of a cent at 37 15-16 cents United States held unchanged at 1-64 discount.

Ankerite and Uchi gold sold at record high prices and Dome and Pamort set new highs since 1936. Dome sold up to 59 7-8 and closed at the top for a net gain of 1 5-8 and Buffalo-Ankerite, closing 17 1-8, was higher by 3-8. Lake Shore added 2 1-8, closing at 56 1-2.  
 Interest centred in a group of the cheaper golds and some of these turned over in heavy volume at higher prices. Gains of 5 to 12 cents were held by East Malartic, Hard Rock, Kerr-Addison, MacLeod-Cockshutt, McKenzie Red Lake, Uchi and Wright-Hargreaves. Macassa lost 25 cents.  
 Base metal stocks made their best showing at the tail end of the session. Noranda netted about a point and the close was slightly higher for Pind Oreille, Eldorado and Coast Copper. Eldorado added 5 cents in comparative quiet trading.  
 From a weak start the western oils tightened up and net gains were held finally by Calgary-Eldorado, Brown, East Crest, Home and Okalla. Royaltie closed unchanged.
