EDITOR'S MAIL.

LARGE HOGS.

DEAR SIR: We notice from time to time a local item in your paper making special mention of hogs of from 500 to 600 lbs. being marketed. In the distant past it was no doubt a great thing to have an unusually large hog, but that time is gone by, and rather than advertising the farmer who brings such an animal to market, it would be in the interest of the industry if the production of this class was discouraged and notice taken of the more deserving farmer who markets nice, small-boned, well-finished hogs from 120 to 160 lbs.—the hog that is profitable to the farmer from a feeding standpoint, as well as from market-value to the consumer.

Unfortunately we, as packers, cannot make sufficient distinction in price between this very undesirable heavy class and the best quality of well-finished hogs as there is generally someone about who does not seem to know the difference and will pay almost the same price as he would for the best class, although we never handle them except at a reduction of at least a cent per pound from what we pay for medium weights.

We may say the larger percentage of the hogs this season have been of the desired weight, 120 to 160, although in the early part of the season the tendency was to kill the hogs until shed, that is, not sufficiently fatted.

Whilst the market demands small hogs, 120 to 160 lbs., we cannot use this hog, and naturally the most from a thin, underfed hog is not so tender as that from a well-fed and well-finished one.

We would suggest that the farmers go in as much as possible for this class of hog, 120 to 160 lbs. and not overlook the fact that they must be well-fed, thick and plump stock. To our mind, a cross between the Berkshire and York would meet this condition and we would rather be inclined to have the Berkshire strain predominate.

Interest in the regular weekly horse race, held on the ice in Summerside harbor last Saturday afternoon, was as keen as ever and the outing was enjoyed by a large number of spectators. The track was somewhat heavy but all the contestants showed good speed and made creditable time. The entries were confined to a 255 class, and finished in the following order: Paulkawa, driven by Mack Steel; second W. S. Newson's mare, driven by Fred Wright; third, Charles Sivert; fourth, Robert Baker; fifth, John L. Reid.

The annual meeting of the Emerald Dairying Association was held in the E. F. Hall, on the 16th. In spite of the severity of the weather, a large number of patrons and shareholders attended. The president J. R. Elliot, occupied the chair, and in his opening remarks referred to the past season as the most successful and encouraging to the cheese industry since it was established in this province. He also referred to the loss by death during the past summer of men who were closely identified with the Emerald factory, viz: president L. C. Haslam, James McDonald, one of the first directors, and Don Peter Steinhilf, and David Jardine, shareholders and directors. The secretary's report showed that 1,000,000 lbs. of milk had been received in the factory during the five months it was operated, and 103,922 lbs. cheese manufactured. The patrons received upwards of 95 cts. per 100 lbs. for milk. The output of cheese was sold to Dillon & Spill. The following were appointed to manage the affairs of the association for the ensuing year: Jas. R. Elliot, president; John Mayne, Vice-President; Ronald McDonald, D. N. McKay, Thos. F. Hughes, Wm. Deighan, J. T. Murphy, Directors. Then followed a resolution of condolence on the death of Louis C. Haslam, moved by P. F. Hughes and seconded by Thos. McKay, and unanimously passed.
