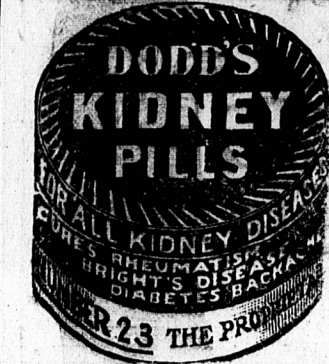
QUIT THEIR JOBS.

THE NATIONAL CONVENTION CHICAGO, June 18—Against the threats, charges and bitter invective of Roosevelt forces, the Taft supporters in the republican national convention put thru the first portion of their program by electing Senator Ellihu Root, of New York, as temporary chairman. It required more than five hours to reach a vote on the chairmanship. The calling of the roll was beset with difficulties from the very first name on the list of delegates, but in the end, when the tumult had died away, Senator Root was found to have won by a vote of 558 to 502 for Governor Francis McGovern, of Wisconsin, with 54 scattered votes and four not voting.

Tonight both the Taft and Roosevelt forces are claiming that this vote indicates that their candidate is absolutely sure to win. The advantage appears to be with the president, however, for while he is sure to lose some of the votes that were cast for Senator Root, it is claimed that he will gain, if instructions are lived up to, some of the votes independently cast for McGovern.

These leaders who have been urging a compromise candidate ever since they arrived in Chicago, are pointing to another angle in the figures, and claim that they show that it is essential to name a so-called dark horse to save the day for the republican party.

The fighting is to be renewed at eleven o'clock tomorrow, when the submission of a new list of delegates seated in the national committee is to be taken up by the unfinished business.

No committees were named tonight, and none will be until this action to "purge" the convention of "fraudulent delegates" is disposed of.

Today it was defeated on a point of order, but the Roosevelt forces declare that parliamentary practice will not be permitted to stand in their way tomorrow.

There was one promise of real trouble, when State Senator Filim completed the recitation of the call of the Pennsylvania delegates fighting the vote of one of the alternates, who, he said, was being called out of the roster order.

The point was that the man called, and who voted for Root, was the second on the list, whereas the man first on the list of the alternates from that district would have voted for McGovern.

"If you steal that vote," shouted Filim, "there will be no roll called in this convention today."

That was all there was to it. The chairman over-ruled him and the grinding voice of Secretary Gleason went on rolling out the votes.

With few exceptions the delegates from the south about whose steadfastness there has been so much speculation during the last few days, stood fast for the Taft candidate.

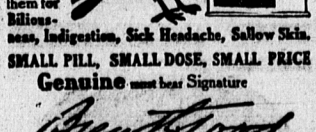
