

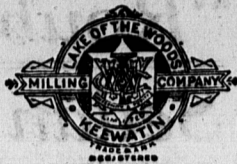

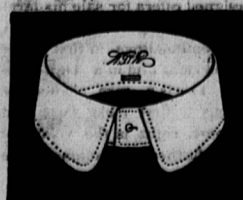

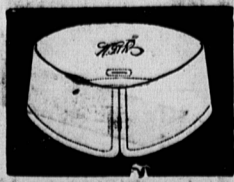

The latest news, first of all.

—Mrs. H. E. Langille and little daughter, Muriel are visiting the former's parents R. B. and Mrs. Clark, Summerside.

—Mrs. N. B. McKelvie and two children who have been spending the summer in Summerside left yesterday morning on return to New York.

—James W. Morrison will sell his business stand consisting of dwelling house, store and outbuildings; also 1 1/2 acres of land as will be seen by ad which appears in this issue.

—In Summerside dealers are paying sixteen to eighteen cents a pound for butter; thirty cents a bus for potatoes; seventeen to eighteen cents a doz for eggs, and forty two to forty five cents a bus for oats.

—The Summerside Labor Union will observe Labor Day by a good parade at nine o'clock in the morning headed by the Summerside band. In the evening J. H. Bell will deliver a lecture.

The following are the Alberton market prices:—Oats, per bus, thirty eight cents; butter, per lb, sixteen cents; eggs, per dozen, sixteen and a half cents; wool per lb, twenty three cents; hides, per lb, six cents and hay per ton six dollars.

—Frank and Mrs. Compton and children who have been visiting Mr. Compton's home in Summerside left yesterday morning on return to New York. Mrs. Compton will spend a couple of weeks visiting at her home in Moncton before returning.

—The regular weekly meeting of the W. C. T. U., Summerside will be resumed tomorrow afternoon at three o'clock. Mrs. Neil McLeod has kindly consented to give a talk at this meeting on her recent trip to Europe. A special invitation is extended to all the ladies of Summerside irrespective of membership.

—G. W. Robinson of Summerside started his wheat grinding plant on Saturday after being closed down for three and a half months as a result of the fire that completely gutted the mill. The new plant is practically a duplicate of the former with the exception of some slight improvements in the feeder. The only improvement in milling machinery since the original plant was erected. Mr. Robinson is to be complimented on the despatch with which he got under way after a serious loss.

—The benefit given by Happyland in aid of the new Prince County Hospital in Market Hall, Summerside, last evening was an immense success. The hall being crowded at both performances. The program of pictures which were specially procured by the Happyland management for this occasion were some of the finest ever shown at Happyland. The two illustrated songs were exceptionally rendered by Fred MacSween while Miss Durant played the accompaniment in her usual fine style. PANAMA CANAL WILL BE FINISHED IN 1915.

NEW YORK, Aug. 28—"Everything is fine in the Panama Canal zone and the great waterway will be finished in 1915," was the word brought here by Colonel Thomas M. Coofins, collector of international revenue and postmaster general of the canal zone. He came in yesterday on the steamship Santa Marta for a short visit. Colonel Coofins said there never was a time when general conditions were so satisfactory in the canal zone as they are today. The hospitals are nearly empty.

The wedding took place at the home of the bride's sister, Mrs. Patula. The bride's many friends in Summerside unite in best wishes for her future.

IN LOVING MEMORY.

The death of the late Peter D. Ferguson, deserves more than a passing notice. Born at West River, on the 23rd of August 1853, he lacked but two days of 57 years, and was buried on the Anniversary of his birth. He came to Charlottetown about 37 years ago, and was employed in the car works, P. E. I. Railway, where he proved himself an excellent workman. He was a member of and piper to the Caledonia Club, for over 35 years, and of the Sons of Scotland for the past 10 years. He was also a member of Boyne L. O. L. ever since coming to the City, and an orangeman of high standing for over 40 years. He was a staunch adherent of the Church of Scotland, and a most honorable man and citizen.

His death which occurred very suddenly at his home on Sabbath the 21st Aug at 4 p. m. was a terrible shock to his wife and family. He was in his usual health which was always good, and complained of no illness of any kind. Getting up from where he sat reading, he went up stairs presumably to get in readiness for evening Church Service, and had just reached the landing at the top of the stairs when he fell, and when his wife who heard him fall reached where he was lying, life was extinct.

He died as he had lived trusting in the merits of his Saviour, as he was often heard to say that he had no fear of death, but believed that he was saved through faith in Christ. He often recalled instances in which God had miraculously saved his life in times of extreme danger, and would speak of the goodness of God to him.

His funeral services were conducted at the house, by the Revs. Messrs. Fullerton and McLean. After the usual service at the grave, the Orange burial service was conducted by the Rev D. McLean. His remains were followed to the grave by a large body of citizens, the orange men and clansmen, walking in procession in full dress and regalia. The floral tributes were many and beautiful speaking volumes for the respect and esteem in which the departed was held by his fellow citizens. He leaves to mourn a widow, three sons and one daughter.

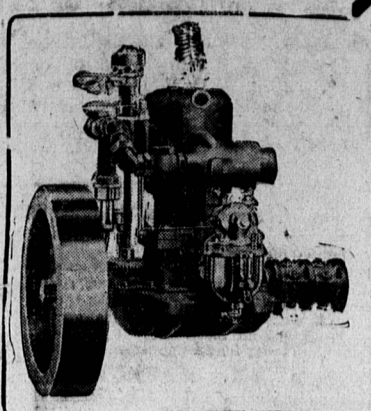
