JAMES HENRY BRYAN

In the early hours of the morning of March 23rd, at his home on the beautiful banks of Foxley River, Lot 11, P. E. Island, there passed peacefully away James Henry Bryan in his 75th year.

Mr. Bryan was born on the farm where he died. In early life he spent several years in the United States, later returning and taking over the homestead where he became a prosperous and successful farmer. He was a son of the late Arthur and Amelia Bryan, who came to P. E. Island about the year 1866 from a point near Dublin, Ireland.

A few years ago Mr. Bryan accompanied by a brother the late Wm. F. Bryan, paid a visit to the birth place of their parents and met with many heretofore unseen relatives who still reside there.

A member of the Anglican Church he was one of its regular attendants and ardent supporters. Possessed with a genial sense of humor his home was a place of hospitality and good cheer for those who called from time to time and from far and near. Although in failing health for several years he helped with the work of the farm until a few months previous to his passing.

With a firm trust in God he bore his sufferings with christian patience and was often heard to express a wish to go home.

On March 1st, 1897 he took for his bride Edith Palmer of Conway, P. E. Island. And on March 1st, 1947, they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary.

There are left to mourn his wife and an adopted son Alvin at home; also two sisters and three brothers, namely: Mrs. B. J. Day and Mrs. T. G. Henderson, Dorchester, Mass. Rev. Dr. J. T. Ingram Bryan London, England; Ernest A. Bryan, Boston; Herman G. Bryan, Free-land, P. E. Island.

The funeral took place on March 25th, to the Anglican Church and Cemetery. The large number in attendance evincing a high esteem in which he was held in the community where he lived for so many years. The service was conducted by Rev. Leslie Dignan, assisted by the choir.
