**WOMAN KILLED  
UNDER A TRAIN**

**She Leaves Two Brothers and a Sister in Cardigan**

**She Failed to Heed the Whistle Blasts—Eye Witness Says the Engine Wheels Were Locked and Sliding When Pilot Struck Her.**

(San Francisco Chronicle)

Mrs. Annie McLean, a widow of 51 who conducted a restaurant at 1400 Valencia street, was run down by a passenger train at Twenty-fourth and Capp streets at 6:30 o'clock yesterday evening and instantly killed. The body was shockingly mangled.

From all that can be learned of the circumstances, it seems inexplicable that Mrs. McLean did not see and escape the train. She was walking along the track where it runs through a block, and the train, the regular evening passenger to San Jose, came up behind her. As usual the gates had been lowered across Capp street several minutes in advance of the arrival of the train by the watchman. The hand going is rung at this crossing only while the gates are being lowered. But people of the neighborhood say that the engineer must have seen the woman on the track almost a block away, for the sharp blasts of the whistle were repeated for many seconds. There was nothing to prevent the woman from stepping off to either side of the track, but apparently she kept straight on and never turned her head.

Frank Cane aged 18, who lives up stairs within twenty yards of where the fatality occurred, was attracted by the blowing of the whistle and looked out of a side window. He says he saw Mrs. McLean walking along slowly. He is positive that the train brakes were set and the locomotive wheels were sliding when she was struck. The woman was lifted under the pilot, but must have rolled under it. The engine came to a standstill in the street forty feet beyond the place where Mrs. McLean was struck. The body rolled out in front of the pilot. The head had been torn to pieces, both arms all but severed and there were other wounds. Frank Cane had run down stairs as two policemen came up, and they lifted the body away from the rails. It was placed in the baggage coach and carried to the station at Twenty-fifth and Valencia streets a stone's throw from Mrs. McLean's home and a little later was removed to an undertaking parlor on Mission street.

Members of her family say that Mrs. McLean had gone to a place several blocks from her home to collect a bill. On her way back she was to visit a store for supplies or her restaurant. In turning up the railroad track she was following a practice of the neighborhood, as it is nearer than following the streets, although the track is not a thoroughfare. The sons were at a loss to understand why their mother did not manage to get off the track. They were inclined to believe that she must of got her foot caught in the cattle guards, but Cane says she was struck before she reached the slatted guards. Her hearing is declared to have been perfect. A purse which remained in the bosom of her clothing contained \$4.50. Her sons believed that she had about \$50 on her person, but they could not explain why they were sure of this.

Mrs. McLean is described as a bright, industrious woman. She was a native of Prince Edward Island, and came to the city with her family fourteen years ago. Her husband has been dead two years. She leaves nine children. Two sons and two daughters live in Boston. Those here are Dr. A. D. McLean, who was the Republican nominee for Coroner in 1899; Charles E., Chester A., Fred J. and Viney M. McLean.

The deceased lady leaves two brothers Charles and Norman R. McLean and a sister who resides in North Cardigan, P. E. I.

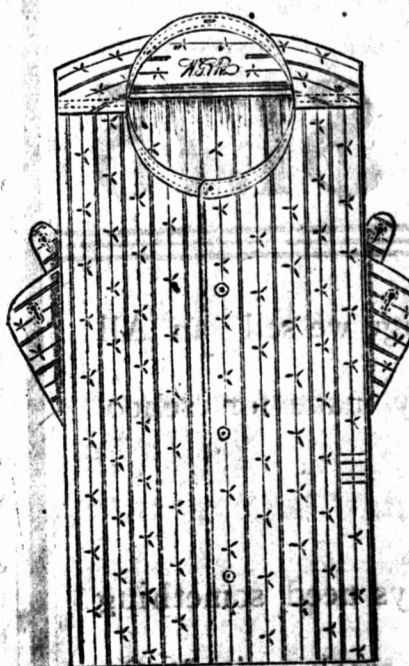
