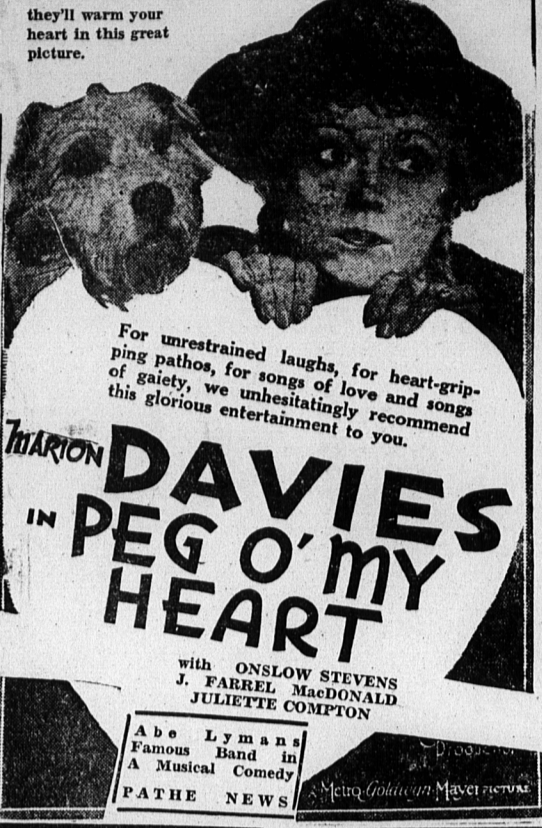

**MRS. JAMES CLARKIN**

No doubt the heavenly choirs re-  
joiced when the spirit of the late  
Mrs. James Clarkin, North Wil-  
shire, was borne aloft to receive  
that reward which is promised to  
those who are faithful to His com-  
mands during this life.

Words are inadequate to express  
the praises due to her, who was  
one of the oldest members of our  
parish, whose life consisted in  
fulfilling her duty towards God  
and man in the fullness of its  
spirit.

The sympathy of her many  
friends and relatives expressed it-  
self in an extensive list of spiritual  
and floral offerings and by the ex-  
ceptional large attendance at the  
funeral which took place on July  
11th. Mrs. Clarkin was seventy-  
six years of age and was prede-  
ceased by her husband some fifteen  
months.

The loss of these two members is  
deeply felt by the community, who  
no doubt realize the dying out of  
that generation of social spirit,  
which marked the lives of these,  
their greatest friends, who were  
possessed of a large measure of  
personal popularity, amiable dis-  
positions, and charitableness both  
in word and act.

During her illness she was fre-  
quently visited by her pastor, Rev.  
Leo Herrell, St. Ann's who adminis-  
tered to her the last rites of the  
Roman Catholic Church.

POLICE TO SALUTE  
SUPERIOR OFFICERS

LONDON, Aug. 19—(C.P.)—The  
policeman's salute—when it should  
be given, and when not—has been  
the subject of a special order is-  
sued by Lord Trenchard, Commis-  
sioner of Metropolitan Police, to  
the Metropolitan force, drawing  
special attention to the occasions  
on which the London policeman  
should salute.

It is not a new order, but as  
various police publications were  
not precisely in agreement, the old  
instruction have been cancelled and  
the official directions restated. Pol-  
ice officers of all ranks should  
salute: Members of the Royal  
Family, cabinet ministers, their own  
principal officers, and the King's  
Colour when displayed by march-  
ing troops.

Sergeants and constables should  
salute an inspector, also commis-  
sioned officers of the Services when  
addressed by them, and the salute  
should be invariably acknowledged.  
Police in plain clothes should not  
salute in military fashion, but  
raise their hats.

On special occasions when the  
King, a foreign Sovereign or a  
member of the Royal Family or  
Minister of State is present, police  
do not salute, but stand at atten-  
tion and keep a look-out for pick-  
pockets, attempts to break the  
ranks, anarchist outrages or at-  
tempts to approach the Royal car-  
riage.

CANADIAN PURE FOOD

The Pure Food Laws of Canada  
state "Canned fruits and canned  
vegetables are sound products  
made by sterilizing clean, sound,  
properly matured and prepared,  
fresh fruit or vegetables by means  
of heat, and keeping the same in  
suitable clean containers, closed  
hermetically or otherwise, and to  
conform in name to the particular  
fruits or vegetables used in their  
preparation." No adulterant, pres-  
ervative, or artificial coloring  
matter may be used in commercial  
canned fruits or vegetables. There-  
fore they contain only pure water,  
sugar and salt. Tomatoes may have  
no added water, and the juice  
must be the juice from the particu-  
lar lot of tomatoes. There are on  
the market at present over thirty-  
five sizes of cans. Only eleven of  
these are standardized. All con-  
tainers not of standard size must  
have the net weight and drained  
weight of solids plainly stated on  
the labels.—Dominion Fruit  
Branch.

Japan's Attitude  
To International  
Participation

BANFF, Alta., Aug. 19—(C.P.)—  
Classing himself neither a pessimist  
nor an alarmist, Dr. Inazo Nitobe,  
formerly Under-secretary General of  
the League of Nations and present  
member of the House of Peers, Ja-  
pan, told members of the Institute  
of Pacific Relations, gathered at the  
inaugural dinner tonight he could  
not fail to perceive on scanning the  
horizon honestly, some causes for  
morging and some signs of danger,  
looming before the world.

One was the return of intolerance  
in the realm of thought as well as  
in that of action. Drastic economic  
changes that were taking place all  
over the world at the present time  
were forcing people to think more in  
terms of economic security and less  
in those of personal liberty, he said.  
To combat the forces of intolerance  
and vindicate the human heritage  
of liberty was worthy of the noblest  
endeavors of mankind. The task of  
the Institute was to demonstrate  
this during its deliberations.

The unmistakable trend among  
great nations toward economic self-  
sufficiency was another ominous  
feature of the present-day world,  
Dr. Nitobe said. At the very time  
that modern science had shortened  
distances and enhanced possibilities  
of intercourse between nations, in-  
creasing obstacles to block the free  
movement of goods and capital as  
well as people were to be seen. Tra-  
ditional symbols of national sover-  
eignty were also being invoked with  
naval and military power as the vis-  
ible support of this tendency. This  
tendency was a serious source of  
danger to the world.

"The question," said Dr. Nitobe,  
"arises in your mind," what about  
Japan?"

"It is true Japan notified the  
League of Nations of its intention  
to withdraw from that organization.  
I will not go into the discussion of  
the merits or demerits of the deci-  
sion. I only wish to call your atten-  
tion to the Imperial rescript issued  
on that occasion to the effect that  
Japan's traditional policy to co-  
operate with the world is not affect-  
ed by this at all. Japan's with-  
drawal from the League did not  
mean her withdrawal from the fam-  
ily of nations.

"Japan is proud to think that she  
is still an inseparable part of the  
world. Her eager participation in  
all international gatherings of this  
kind as the institute is the eloquent  
evidence of her national feeling.

"From tomorrow we sit in con-  
ference. These are not the days of  
dispute. These are the days of con-  
tribution—contribution for the ac-  
cumulation of truth. As the wise  
men of yore, we will try to seek light  
by unflinchingly facing the great  
reality. We are the citizens of 10  
nations with vital interest in the  
Pacific and China and Japan, the  
dwellers of the region from the  
dawn of history, sit side by side at  
the conference tables."
