MARITIME PROVINCE PROSPECTS.

In the days when wooden shipbuilding was in vogue the Maritime Provinces were the most prosperous parts of British North America. Labor was constant and well paid; the raw material was abundant; it paid to build ships, to sell or to keep, for freights were high. Under these conditions fortunes were made in ship-building and ship-owning, and the industry contributed largely to the general prosperity.

But the time came when all this was changed. The steamship took the place of the sailing ship, and first iron, and afterward steel became the material of construction. The Provinces almost ceased to build ships, and the record of succeeding years has shown an ever decreasing tonnage on the Canadian registers. We lost our place on the ocean as the fourth largest ship-owning country, falling back to fifth and then to sixth. We no longer built ships for sale in Britain, but we saw the trade of which we were formerly the well-paid carriers pass largely into British hands, and those of the other steel ship-building countries.

Now by the development of the iron and steel industry at Sydney and other points the prospect is rapidly opening for the Maritime Provinces to regain their lost ground and become ship-builders again. On this point a writer in the Anglo-American Magazine for June says:

century to come of a greatly increased development and prosperity for the Maritime Provinces of Canada. It will not be surprising if instead of being the least prosperous they shall become the most prosperous section of the Dominion. With new profitable employment for labor, with increased development of the mining industry and better local markets, our stagnant population will increase, farmers will receive ready sale and better prices for their products and every line of production and industry will feel a new impetus. Thus after the lapse of a generation it would seem that the Maritime Provinces are to again come to the front, standing out prominently in the world's gaze and with better products of prosperous times than were ever before open to them.

According to a recent visitor Mr. Zegery, the population of Jerusalem has greatly increased in recent years and now comprises 30,000 Jews, 50,000 Mohammedans and as many Christians, making 130,000 in all. A few years ago the estimated population of Jerusalem was 40,000, and of the entire Holy Land about 400,000. We incline therefore to think the recent estimate must be in excess of the facts. There has been a great influx of visitors since the opening of the railway from Jaffa, many modern buildings have been erected and modern improvements introduced.
