Sees Air Of Failure In Moscow Talks

An air of failure is beginning to surround the Moscow discussions. Even the Allied envoys were conferring again with Molotov and their rebuttals on how a full-fledged conference on Germany can be brought about. There are strong indications that Molotov made unacceptable demands Monday and that he was told so Wednesday.

"Leaks" from such negotiations usually contain at least some inaccuracies and may be entirely misleading. But from such information as is available it seems that the Allies were ready to resume four-power negotiations regarding Germany and other European problems, which had been broken off after the abortive Moscow and London meetings. At that time the Allies decided they might as well go ahead with organization of a Western German Government and incorporate the area into the Marshall Plan. This meant silencing Russia's voice in the great industrial areas and she wanted to call another conference.

Using currency changes in Western Germany as an excuse, the Russians instituted a land blockade of Allied-held sectors of Berlin. This was a strong lever, and the Allies sought a means of compromise.

They are assumed to have offered a new conference if Russia would lift the blockade. Russia demanded a more concrete price, and the Allies are reported to have agreed, additionally, to compromise on the currency question. Now Russia is reported demanding that the plan for the Western German Government be held up pending the conference.

The Allies say they will not do this. They apparently feel that currency agreement and an end to the blockade are the only things that can be expected from negotiations; that the main struggle is for control of all Germany with no real over-all agreement possible.

James Stewart in the role of the Chicago reporter, provides a wonderful human portrayal that adds up to the finest performance of his career. Richard Conte as the imprisoned man, Lee J. Cobb as the city editor, and Helen Walker as Stewart's wife are excellent, as are Betty Garde, Kasia Grazewski and Joanne de Bergh in other important roles of the Otto Lang production. Jerome Cady and Jay Dralter wrote the screenplay from an adaptation by Leonard Hoffman and Quentin Reynolds, based on articles by James P. McQuire.
