FRENCH AVIATORS BOMBARD STUTTGART

(Special to The Guardian) PARIS, Sept. 22.—French aviators have bombarded Stuttgart, capital of the Kingdom of Wurtemberg, according to a French official statement of the night. They dropped about 100 shells on the royal palace and station. They also dropped bombs in different places along the way.

(Special to The Guardian) AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN HEAD-QUARTERS, via London, Sept. 22.—German and Austrian artillery are now bombarding Serbian positions along the Macva frontier, which lies in the Northwest corner of Serbia and which was the scene of heavy fighting last autumn. The Austro-German bombardment extends virtually along the entire Northern frontier of Serbia.

PARIS, Sept. 22.—The new Austro-German army on the Serbian front is continuing the bombardment of the position across the rivers which form the boundary line but so far as known have not yet attempted the invasion of Serbian territory. The latest official communication from Nish, issued yesterday and telegraphed to the Havas Agency, brings up these operations to Sunday. It follows: "The enemy threw 800 shells from field artillery and mortars across the Danube and save on the 19th, directing them at our works. At the same time the enemy kept up a violent fire with rifles and machine guns from two to six p.m., accomplishing nothing from a military standpoint. We made only a slight reply."

EXPRESS DELIVERY UNDER DISCUSSION

(From our own Correspondent) OTTAWA, Sept. 22.—The whole question of express delivery limits in Canadian cities and towns is to be heard before a commission shortly, it is announced. This re-opens a matter which has been before the Railway Board since its inception and which will now likely be finally settled. It is one of considerable importance to every community where there is express delivery, since with scanty delivery zones the companies can charge more than with zones including

more area, and thus raise their rates. In the final analysis it is hoped that an extension of the limits in many cities whose growth has made changes necessary will be the outcome, at any rate representative of all towns and cities interested as well as of the express companies will be given an opportunity to testify.

67 GERMAN SUBMARINES SUNK SINCE MAY 5

(Special to The Guardian) PROVIDENCE, R.I., Sept. 23.—The Providence Journal says: The reason why the German Government has consented to change its submarine methods is because more than 80 per

cent of its submarines have been destroyed and its overseas warfare brought to complete failure. Within the past two months it is positively known that sixty-seven German submarines, 28 of which are declared to have been of the newest and latest construction, have been sunk and their crews destroyed by the British Navy since the 5th day of May. It is stated on positive authority that the full capacity of the German shipyards for undersea boats is not more than three a month, but that even if Germany were able to replace her submarines as fast as they had been destroyed, the most grave situation she faces in regard to this method of warfare is the actual destruction of the morale of the officers and crews of such vessels.
