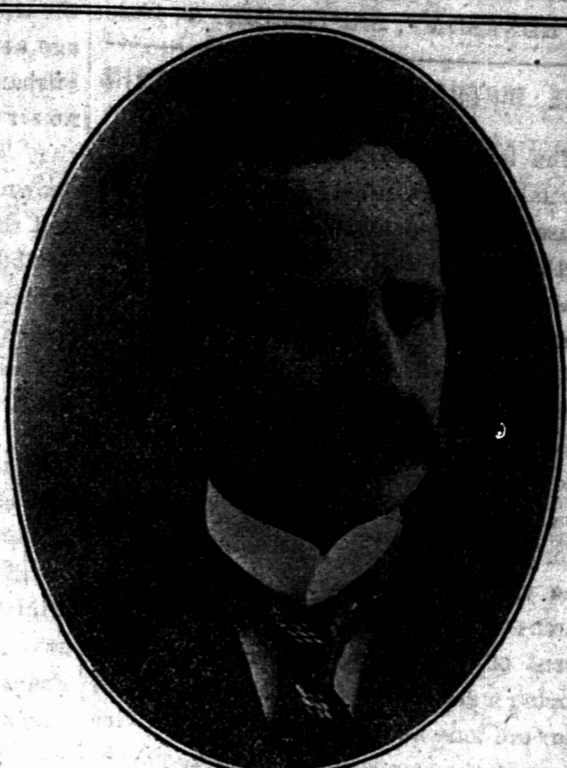

THE EXHIBITION NOW IN FULL SWING THE OPENING PROCEEDINGS YESTERDAY

The Speakers Refer in the Highest Terms to the Different Exhibits-The Fruit and Roots Unequaled in Island Shows.

THE FIRST DAY'S RACING COMMENCES AT ONE O'CLOCK THIS AFTERNOON

His Honor Lieut Governor McIntyre Formally Declared the Exhibition Open-The Fat Cattle and Horses the Finest Ever Seen in Prince Edward Island-Judging of the Exhibits Going on To-day-The Program-Special Exhibits in the Building Etc.

PROBABILITIES FOR TODAY.

Light to moderate winds, fine and warm.

The clouds that had hung heavily in the sky during the forenoon yesterday broke away about three o'clock and the sun shone forth bringing gladness to the hearts of many interested in the success of the Provincial Exhibition.

At three o'clock the President F. L. Haszard called the assembly to order. On the balcony facing the main entrance were seated beside a number of ladies and the directors, Governor McIntyre, Premier Peters, Hon. Benj. Rogers, Hon. J. H. Commusky, Mayor Warburton, Rev. Father Burke, Matthew Smith M. L. A., Hampton; James Paton, E. B. Elderkin, Amherst, representing F. W. Hodson Live Stock Commissioner and others.

The President before calling upon the Lieutenant-Governor thanked the friends from the other provinces who had come over with stock and helped to make the Exhibition a success. Even a cursory glance would show that the stock exhibit was one of the best even seen in the Provinces. This is saying much. He referred to the stock of John Richards who had carried off such high awards in Ontario. Visitors had come to the Island at great expense and trouble. He hoped all would co-operate to make the Exhibition not only pleasant but profitable. We have not only the best dairy province but one adapted for the raising of fat cattle for export. Now that direct steamers to the old country, are in view we should make an effort to produce the best. Our cattle should be models for the other provinces as here we are immune from diseases to them. There is no reason why P. E. I. should not produce the best cattle, sheep and other stock in Canada.

GOVERNOR MCINTYRE.

Governor McIntyre in rising expressed great pleasure in acceding to the request by the directors to open the Exhibition as it was the first for two years. In the neighboring provinces they have annual exhibitions, where the products of their mines and forest beside their agricultural products are shown. Here we have only the farms and thus we need Exhibitions the more. He hoped that exhibitions will be an annual feature. The people contributed the money and there is no better way for them to get it back. Exhibitions have a great educational benefit also. Ours this year is undoubtedly the largest ever in the Island. He thought everyone would be pleased and he heartily welcomed all who were here from the other Provinces. He formally declared the Exhibition open as he concluded The National Anthem

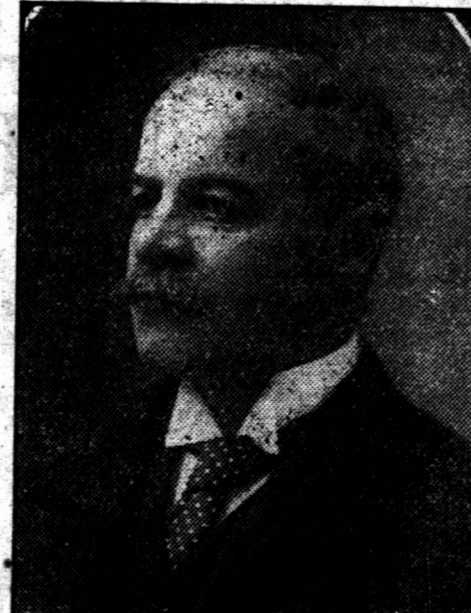

PREMIER PETERS.

Premier Peters expressed his great pleasure at being present. He discussed the preliminaries leading up to the giving of a grant by the Government, and eulogized the perseverance of the President and Directors to whose pertinacity alone was due the fact that we have an Exhibition. The Government had made up their minds that they could not afford to give the money and he had been personally opposed to it, but after he had seen the

exhibits today he was glad that the money had been voted. The \$4000 grant was well expended if only to show the neighboring provinces the possibilities of the Island. At one time he had thought England the best country in the world but now he thought no place equal to the Island. Now the farmers are prospering and their latest benefit is the grant of Sir William McDonald to consolidate the schools and better educate the farmers in agriculture. This year we have an exhibition of which we may well be proud and which will stand side by side with Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

S. L. PETERS OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

S. L. Peters, Deputy Minister of Agriculture for New Brunswick was the next speaker. He thought P. E. Island the best Province in Canada for Agriculture. He had never seen a better exhibition of fruit in his life. In this age where everything is rush we must be on top. Exhibitions are one of the best means for accomplishing that. All the Provinces are doing much for agriculture and the department in P. E. Island is not in the rear. He cited the success of the Island cheese at St. John and referred to the close competition there.

HON. BENJ. ROGERS.

Hon. Benj. Rogers, saw before him the fruit of natural resources and the fruit of industry. By our exhibits the people can judge what our province is. In the motives of the building Agriculture has justly the first place. The Island and our farms are small and so we have to follow different methods from larger places. In old times we raised potatoes and oats, now the farmers go in for intensive farming and their products are largely increased. He congratulated the farmers upon the fine Exhibition which was in many respects far in advance of Nova Scotia.

E. B. ELDERKIN.

E. B. Elderkin, Amherst, conveyed the best wishes of F. W. Hodson Live Stock Commissioner who would always do his best for the Island. He had received great benefit already from his visit. He was glad the Premier had been converted to Exhibitions. Nova Scotia had acted on the inspiration of the Island and was urged to greater effort by competition. Its benefits cannot be overestimated. He had never seen a better display of roots and fruit. In closing he emphasized the fact that P. E. I. had raw material that would place the province in the foreground of Canada. He congratulated the promoters and hoped for annual exhibitions where all can compare and compete and thus grow more and more successful.

MAYOR WARBURTON.

Mayor Warburton endorsed all that had been said and on behalf of the citizens

welcomed the visitors to our city.

REV. A. E. BURKE.

Rev. A. E. Burke, President of the Fruit Growers Association looked with pride on the great fruit show. It was said a few years ago we could not raise fruit; now we are in the front in that line. He hoped that no farm would forget the orchard. Everyone owning land should plant trees, and set them out the best way. The reverend gentleman concluded with a humorous reference to the fall of Adam by the eating of apples and was sure there would be no such result again by the assistance of the ladies.

IN THE BUILDING.

INTERNATIONAL CORRESPONDENCE SCHOOLS.

Right above the main entrance is the exhibit of the International Correspondence Schools of Scranton, Pa. Here you can see practical results from this method of instruction, as there are on exhibit some splendidly executed plates in geometrical drawing by J. P. McClosky and James Godfrey, both of Charlottetown.

Views taken from different departments of the 23 buildings occupied by the schools in Scranton gives one some slight idea of the size of the schools and the facilities they have for educating their 480,000 students.

From among the 100 different courses they teach, their method of teaching French, German and Spanish with the aid of an Edison Phonograph attracts the most attention, and every one is invited to have a free lesson on the phonograph in one of these languages.

The exhibit is in charge of J. D. Munroe, local representative, and H. C. Brown, Assistant-Superintendent.

ART DISPLAY.

A competent critic told the Guardian yesterday that the art display was far in excess of the Halifax Exhibition both in quality and quantity. Among the paintings that attract the most attention are the two entitled "A Good Year." The paintings of figures in fruit are excellent. The water colors are also high class, that of flowers being perhaps the best. A water color painting of Queen Square 50 years ago is an interesting study. The pen and ink and crayon work was also well executed.

The arrangement is far superior to that of former years and gives spectators an excellent opportunity of seeing the different pieces of work to the best advantage. Amateur photography is fairly well represented the display of W. S. Louison probably the best exhibition.

SENTER AND MOLEND.

Sentner and McLeod have their booth to the left of the main entrance of the building. It has a canopy of spruce is decorated with bunting and the floors are covered with furs and skins. The booth is filled with figures of all the latest styles in fur jackets and the walls are hung with ruffs, hats and collarettes. The display is acknowledged to be the best ever seen at the Provincial Exhibition. The famous Coisaine jacket is in evidence and the ladies jackets are of Persian lamb electric seal grey lamb and Russian lamb beside bokhara and racoon. The beauty of the room is enhanced by mirrors, animals and birds tastefully arranged.
