The Public Forum

THE CONTRAST

Sir,—What is there about prohibi-
tion which causes its advocates to
forget charity, tolerance and fair-
ness? Friday night at the Liberal
meeting in Market Hall, Summer-
side, one of the candidates refer-
red to Mrs. Fallis as masquerading
under the banner of the W. C. T. U.
of Ontario. He read a telegram
from the Secretary of the Ontario
W. C. T. U. in answer to an inquiry
regarding Mrs. Fallis. In this tele-
gram it was stated that Mrs. Fal-
lis was not a member of the Onta-
rio W. C. T. U. and the speaker
bluntly accused her of masquerad-
ing as a leading member of that
body.

The leader of the Liberal party
led the applause which greeted this
accusation yet he, the preceding
night heard Mrs. Fallis state cat-
gorically that she was not a mem-
ber of the Ontario W. C. T. U. giv-
ing her reasons at the same time.
Dr. McNeill continued his attack
on Mrs. Fallis by reading testi-
mony of a whiskey salesman before
the customs investigating commit-
tee in which reference was made
to a contribution to the campaign
in Ontario. After eliminating all
the Liberals, the premier and the
president of the Conservative As-
sociation of Ontario, he leeringly
fastened the stigma of receiving
contributions from distillers upon
Mrs. Fallis without having one
scrap of evidence in his possession.

"Again the man who led the
cheers to this wanton accusation
now aspires to the premiership of
Prince Edward Island. Gallant con-
duct forsooth against a lady in her
absence. Why does prohibition al-
ways leave a trail of dirt and
changes men who are ordinarily
decent citizens into scoundrels and
maligned of women. Not one
word of argument in opposition to
Mrs. Fallis' statements but only
personal abuse.

Many in the audience recalled
the preceding evening when a quiet
refined voice stated, "We cannot
all have the same opinion on this
question so all we ask is that you
banish emotion and sentiment and
allow your God given reason to
guide you in your decision. The
contrast between the methods of
this visiting lady and those of Dr.
McNeill and Mr. Saunders will be
engraved on many minds for some-
time.

The doctor also traced his early
days when he started a drug store
in Murray Harbour and earned
thereby the means necessary to
take him to McGill. He pointed
out quite graphically the condi-
tions during the first few years of
his practice and the danger and un-
pleasantness of being jostled by
drunken men, but refrained from
stating whether the rum in this
connection came from the drug
store, or elsewhere.

THE CRIME WAVE IN CH'TOWN. RUM DID IT, SAYS PREACHER

Clean Up Your Street Corners and Wharves if You Would Lessen Store-breaking and Home Smashing Declared Rev Neil Herman in Central Christian Church Last Evening.

Text: Jude 13: "Raging waves of
the sea, foaming out their
own shame."

The following is a brief sum-
mary preached to an overflowing
congregation in Central Christian
Church last night.

Under certain conditions, we are
all apt to see "red," paint "red,"
and act "red." Certain depre-
dations take place, and the most hu-
man thing is to say the whole coun-
try has gone to the devil.

On the other hand, there are
those of us who are always heli-
ting the sins, the weaknesses, and,
even the tragedies of human life.
While "Rome burns" we fiddle.
Everything is lovely, while every-
thing is about as rotten as it can
be.

Let us avoid extremes. Let us
keep in the middle of the road. Let
us steer in between those two
danger points—Too Much and Too
Little—the rocks upon which near-
ly all our little ships are wrecked.

Church Services

ZION PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

The sermon yesterday morning
by Rev. M. Scott Fulton had as sub-
ject "When the Brook Failed" the
scripture text being from 1st Kings
XVII chapter and 7th verse. "And
it came to pass after a while, that
the brook dried up, because there
had been no rain in the land." A
drouth in this country is so rare
an occurrence and when we have
such it is of brief duration—hence
the water supply rarely gives us
any concern. It was not so in
Palestine. The water supply is
always a serious question in that
country. This story of Elijah and
the miraculous way he was provid-
ed for is one of the most interest-
ing incidents of Old Testament
herosism in danger is an example
for us to study for our guidance in
any time but particularly when
faced by difficulties of any kind.
How Elijah did his part amid priv-
ations and dangers was a case of
true manliness.

The choir was up to usual
strength, Mr. Walter MacNutt as
organist did exceptionally well.

At the evening service the min-
ister took as his text "Lord, I pray
Thee, open his eyes that he may
see" II Kings 6-17. Benhadad,
King of Syria, was at war against
Israel. He had a superior army and
was a great strategist but he failed
and he failed because God was
with Israel. The body of the
sermon was centred around the
three thoughts:—One may look
and yet not see;—The vision of
a real world;—How the unseen world
of the higher life and its forces may
be obtained. In conclusion the
pastor quoted McLaughlin's "Battle
of Lake Regillus"—B.C. 498 and
"The Vision of Heaven" by Francis
Thompson, two passages which ex-
cellently illustrated the thoughts
of his sermon.

This service was broadcasted
through C.F.C.Y.

A short service of song followed
the regular service. Mr. Alex.
Matheson of P. W. C. gave a short
address which was greatly appre-
ciated. These after-song services
winter long have been very helpful
and inspiring particularly to the young-
er folk.

Miss Barbara McNeill's solo "O
Divine Redeemer" was the gem of
the musical program. Miss Mc-
Neill's interpretation of this beau-
tiful song and the rare beauty of her
voice held the audience spell-
bound.

lars' worth of goods stolen or de-
stroyed. We have had cash regis-
ters rifled and put out of commis-
sion. We have had money stolen,
just about as ruthlessly as in the
days of the high-spirited robber, or in
the times of the Spanish buccaneer.

Yes! And we have witnessed the
hand of the robber in house break-
ing; the precious things of the
home; the relics of the good old
days, either carried away, or de-
stroyed by the marauder, in the
Garden of the Gulf.

You cannot laugh at these things.
Your houses! Your store may be the
next!

How are you going to run these
bandits down and track them to
their dens? who are they? And
where are they?

Well, first of all, there are cer-
tain places where you will not find
them!

There is one place where you
will not find them. You will not
find them at home. House break-
ers don't make homes. No man
who smashes up another man's
precious things or breaks in another
man's home, will ever make a home
for himself, and, much less, for
any woman, whom he may call his wife.
I venture to say that the fellows
who have been doing the smashing
in this old town, for the last six
months, are, first of all, young
men—most of them under thirty.

The anthem by the choir and the

TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

At the morning service yester-
day, Rev. W. M. Ryan preached on
the parable of the sower, his text
being the words "Take heed how
ye hear."

Jesus often used homely and
forceful illustrations taken from
nature. From the boat in which
he sat as he spoke to the people
standing on the shore, he probably
saw a sower at work and forthwith
uttered the parable of the sower
and his seed. Unlike most of the
parables, this one was interpreted
by Christ Himself.

The Sower is the Saviour Him-
self, who was constantly sowing
the seeds of eternal life in the
hearts of his hearers. He was a
bearer of the truth, but He was
also the Truth itself. In spirit He
still speaks to men through the
spirit's agency. He still sows the
seeds of life. Jesus Christ is still
present in our world, and all who
labor with Him in the gospel are
sowers of the truth. For the truth
is the good seed that falls into
the soil of the hearts of men. If there
is any failure, it is not in the seed
but in the character of the soil,
the condition of the heart into
which the seeds of truth are cast.
God is not partial. He will do
as much for one man as for another.
But the responsibility for the
outcome belongs to the individual
hearer. To some, the truth is a
savour of life until life; to others,
a savour of death unto death.

There are three causes of failure
in the conditions of the soil.
Firstly, there is the hard soil, that
lack of spiritual insight. The
wayside soil is deep enough, but it
is hard; and there are people
whose hearts are as hard as the
beaten track. In such hearts re-
ligion may be trodden down by the
prevalence of other interests in
life, or it may disappear as seeds
carried away by the fowls of the
air. Religion that is only a surface
impression will pass away. If re-
ligion penetrates to the depths of
a man's heart, it will find proper
lodgement there and yield an
eternal harvest.

Secondly, there
is the stoney ground, a thin layer
of soil upon a layer of rock—shal-
low soil. This is typical of shal-
low, superficial character. There
is nothing deep there. The seed
springs up quickly and then quick-
ly withers away because it has no
depth of root. So there are peo-
ple who are easily moved, but have
no depth of character in which the
seed of truth may expand and
grow. The shallow character is
close to the hard heart, as the
shallow soil lies close upon the
rock.

And thirdly, there is the pre-
occupied soil, where the thorns grow
up and choke the growing grain.
There is no room in any heart for
both the love of Christ and the love
of the world. The cares of this
life, the deceitfulness of riches, the
thirst for pleasure, these choke the
word so that it brings no fruit to
perfection. The growth, if any, is
stunted and imperfect, and so the
really great experiences of the
Christian life are never known.

So unfavorable are the condi-
tions, so unprepared are the hearts
of the majority of hearers, that the
marvel is that upon many lives any
impression is made at all.

Therefore, take heed how ye
hear. If there has been failure
look for the cause within you.
Make preparation of your own
hearts to seek and hear the truth.
The morning service opened with
the National Anthem, and Elgar's
"Land of Hope and Glory" was
played as an offertory. The choir
rendered Shelley's anthem "The
King of Love." Mrs. A. R. Gillis
singing the solo parts.
