Ray Schalk Hopes To Make Good as Boss at Chicago

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Ray Schalk, diminutive backstop of the Chicago White Sox, who will succeed Eddie Collins as manager of the American League baseball club next season, said today he expected to be working behind the bat as usual next season, besides handling the team. His contract is for one year.

"I feel that we have a pretty good ball team now," he said. "But, of course, we will try to build it up still stronger. I can see where we need some building up on the infield, and perhaps on the pitching staff, but those things will be taken care of later."

Connie Mack, manager of the Philadelphia Athletics, of whose 87 famous \$100,000 infield Collins was once a member, declined to say whether he would try to get Collins as a possible manager of the Athletics, while rumors also were current that he might become leader of the Boston Red Sox.

In 1920 Schalk hung up a record for catching 151 games, and he was behind the plate in 100 or more games for twelve years, eleven of them consecutive. He also holds the record for greatest number of games caught, topping the mark of "Chief" Meyers of the Giants.

Schalk was purchased from the Milwaukee American League Club in 1912 for \$12,000 a large price at that time. He had joined Milwaukee in 1911 after playing his first professional ball with the Taylorville, Illinois Club. He is 32 years old.

ROPOSED A. A. U. RULE WOULD BAR NON-CITIZENS FROM COMPETITION IN THE U. S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—A rule which will prevent non-citizens residing in this country from competing in sports under the jurisdiction of the A. A. U., after a certain period of grace, is one of the 74 amendments which will be submitted to the delegates at the 38th national convention of the A. A. U. at Baltimore on November 14, 15 and 16.

All the proposed amendments—and there are more than the usual number affecting track and field, swimming, boxing, wrestling, gymnastics and handball—were mailed out recently by Justice Jeremiah T. Mahoney, chairman of the A. A. U. legislative committee, to the 23 active and 20 allied associations which will be represented by 268 delegates at Baltimore.

The majority of the 74 proposed amendments affect track and field and they have been proposed in order to make the A. A. U. rules conform to the rules of the International Amateur Athletic Federation.

The citizenship rule, offered by Dr. J. J. Walsh, of the St. Anselm's A. C. of the Bronx, is a drastic one and will provoke heated discussion on the floor of the convention, according to local officials for it is feared then many athletes residing in New York and elsewhere will be barred from competition.

This rule provides that an athlete who has been in this country for a period of three years and has not applied for his first citizenship papers shall not be allowed to participate in any event sanctioned by the A. A. U. It also provides that an athlete who, having made application for his first citizenship papers, fails to procure the final papers requisite for citizenship within a period of three years following the first three-year period shall not be allowed to participate in any sanctioned A. A. U. event.

One of the most prominent athletes who would be affected by the citizenship rule is Willie Ritola, America's premier distance runner. Ritola, it will be recalled, competed for Finland in the last Olympics and won two titles, the 10,000 metre flat and the steeplechase. Under the proposed rule Ritola would be caught in the middle if he did not take out his citizenship papers he would be barred from competing in this country. If he did apply for citizenship he would be eligible to continue in competition here, but he would no longer be eligible for the Olympics, for, having competed for Finland in the Olympic games, he can represent no other country in the quadrennial sports.

To Improve Race Track Next Year

FREDERICTON, N. B., Nov. 13.—Fredericton Driving and Sporting Club at their annual meeting last night replied to a suggestion by the exhibition directors that the exhibition take over the operation of the mid-summer racing in the Maine and New Brunswick Circuits on the local track by passing a resolution urging that the five years agreement under which the Driving Club are given the use of the track for mid-summer meetings be not abrogated.

The Fredericton Driving Club look over the management of the mid-summer meetings in order to insure the capital being continually on the racing map. They have made considerable profits in their operation of the track and have staged the feature meets of Devon East summer racing. Much of their profits have been turned back into improving the track property and keeping it in shape and the fastest miles ever made by harness horses in Canada have been made on the Fredericton track—Single G, and Bessie McKillop having raced over the local half mile track in 2:04 1/2 while Guesswork paced an exhibition mile in 2:04 1/2 on it.

Doushka Wins Cup From Field of 13

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Nov. 13.—Lord Carnarvon's Doushka by Tetsuya won the Liverpool Autumn Cup from a field of 13 here today.

H. Shaw's Naldora was second and Mrs. D. Frame's Polish Patriot third. The race is at 1 mile 2 furlongs, 170 yards.

Doushka, an outsider in the betting at 100 to 8 against, won by two lengths. A length and a half separated the second and third. The odds against Naldora were 8 to 1 and against Polish Patriot 20 to 1.
