P. W. C. Opening Last Night.

Every inch of available space was occupied in the Assembly Hall of the new Prince of Wales College last evening at the opening exercises. Many were obliged to leave. The exercises were very interesting. Promptly at 8 o'clock His Honor the Lieutenant Governor took the chair and in a brief address congratulated the Professors, Students and Government on the improved condition of affairs that obtained, now that they have a new College.

Premier Farquharson received an oration from the students, as indeed did all the speakers.—He expressed his pride in the position he occupied as a speaker on this occasion as well as pride in the building in which they were assembled. He briefly recounted the history of the P. W. College since its organization in 1880, referred to the cost of education a cost that was cheerfully met by the Government and people of P. E. I.

Dr. Anderson contested the present with the past and hoped that soon through the assistance of former students, they would have a good library and better equipped laboratory.

Rev. Father McLellan brought the congratulations and good fellowship of St. Dunstan's College to P. W. and briefly sketched the growth of St. Dunstan's from its opening in 1855 to the present time!

Attorney General McKinnon contended for the teaching of the Modern Languages and Philosophy.

Supt. McLeod compared the educational status of the teachers of P. E. Island with that of the other Provinces to the advantage of the former.

The musical part of the program was good. The singing of the College students was hearty. Miss Earle's solos in Rule Britannia and The Absent Minded Beggar were exquisite. Prof. Caven in "A Hundred Pipers One and A" was rapturously encored. Prof. Vinnicombe's violin solos were of the Professor's usual high order. Prof. Earle presided at the piano and conducted the musical part of the entertainment.

During the evening Prof. Anderson read a telegram of congratulations from former P. of W. Students now at McGill University.
