**GROUND GLASS FOUND IN SAUSAGE SUPPLIED TROOPS IN GEORGIA**

MARCON, GA., Oct. 2.—No illness was reported today among members of the One Hundred and Twenty-second infantry as the result of ground glass in sausage served at the regiment mess. It is believed only a small part of the troops ate the affected meat.

An investigation of all link sausage at the camp is said to have disclosed that every link of entire shipment from Chicago packing house contained ground glass. The authorities withheld the name of the plant the sausage came from, but an investigation is under way.

CAMBRIDGE, MASS., Oct. 2.—Nearly 600 Harvard seniors out of 700 have joined their country's colors. It was learned here when but about 100 were on hand for enrollment.

**SEA HORRORS TOLD BY CONSUL FROST**

A tale of human suffering such as rarely has been heard by a Denver audience was told at the Auditorium last night by Wesley Frost, who was United States consul at Queenstown when the sinking of the Lusitania and eighty other ships occurred. Mr. Frost gave a harrowing description of the mental and physical agonies undergone by the survivors of the disasters, and drew a vivid word picture of the corpse-laden wharves of the Irish port.

"Every month that passes," he said, "sees loss of life almost equal to that of the Lusitania horror, and every day witnesses the death of from thirty to forty non-combatants. At this very moment the poor fellows from two or three vessels probably are struggling for life."—Denver Post.

**LAMB PRICES WILL RISE**

It is expected that the price of live lambs will be high this fall.

Toronto dealers are paying from 15c to 15½. The American market is very firm and Canadian lambs are being shipped in quantities to Buffalo.

At Buffalo and Chicago as high as 18c per pound live weight, has been paid for best lambs and good judges say that Prince Edward Island are the equal of any.

Local buyers have been offering from 10c to 12c, but it is claimed that the farmers are holding back for much higher prices.

**EASY DEATH RIGHT IS URGED**

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Members of the American Association of Progressive Medicine, in convention here, have gone on record as favoring a movement to have state legislatures legalize the administration of an easy death to monstrosities and to the hopelessly incurable and in all cases where an agonizing death impends.

The subject was brought before the convention by Dr. W. A. Guild of Des Moines, speaking on "Legalized Euthanasia." He suggested that a committee similar to that which now legislates insanity cases should make all decisions involving death.

**CAMPAIGN FOR FOOD CONTROLLER NOW ON**

Provincial Food Control Office, Brown's Block, Charlottetown, September 26, 1917.

T. H. B. Longworth, Esq., Chairman Food Control Committee, Charlottetown.

Sir.—I have the honor to inform your Committee that the campaign for food control has been started on Prince Edward Island. The programme is as follows:—

The Food Controller of Canada has asked for the special conservation of three articles of food, namely, Beef, Bacon and Wheat Flour. These three stuffs are badly needed for the armies in the field. To the end that the greatest possible conservation may be effected, a Pledge Card campaign has been planned whereby a Pledge Card will be presented in every home in the Province. This campaign will be carried out through the Public Schools and the cards will be distributed by the children. An appeal will be made to the churches, the Women's Institutes, the Red Cross and National Service, and other active organizations, to assist the children and to see that every community is represented in the best possible manner in the work. The Pledge Card reads in part as follows:—"I pledge myself and my household to carry out the advice and directions of the Food Controller, that requisite foodstuffs may be released for export to the Canadian Divisions, the British forces and people, and the Allied Armies and Nations." I expect the Pledge Card day for P. E. Island to be arranged for some date about the end of October when the rural schools are re-opened after the fall holidays.

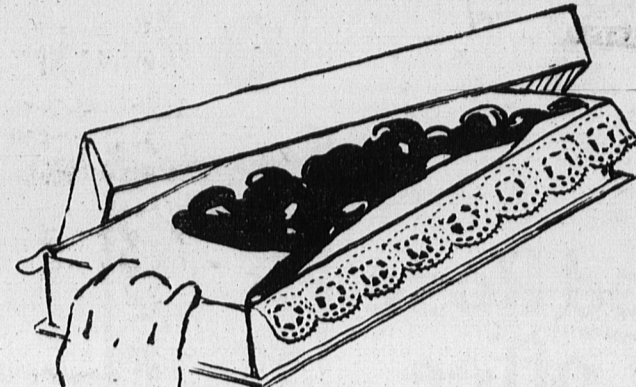

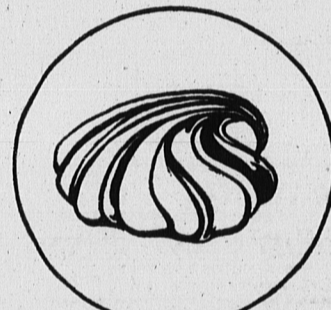

**ANTI-WAR VOICES MUST BE STILLED**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—William C. Fitts, the assistant attorney general in charge of the government's investigation of the Industrial Workers of the World, at a luncheon here of the Four Minutemen, declared that the time had come for drastic dealing with every agency aiming to hinder or hamper the government in the conduct of the war.

"The time has come," Mr. Fitts said, "when ever arm that is not willing to be uplifted in the common defense must not be allowed to be uplifted at all, when any pen capable of writing unpatriotic or disloyal sentiments must be cast into the waste basket. The time has come when every voice must be uplifted in valiant acclaim for victories by our

brave boys 'over there' and when any other voice that so much as starts to chirp any other strain must be silenced."
