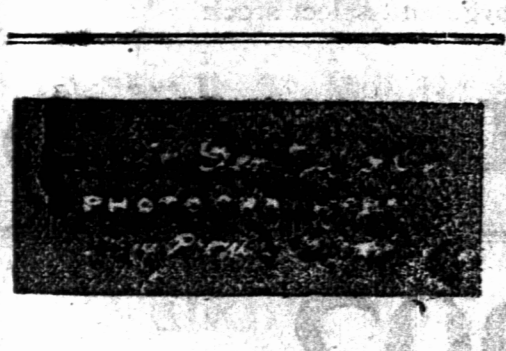

ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

Reporters and Correspondents Everywhere.

Rev. E. A. McPhee, former Baptist pastor at Kingsboro, P. E. I., is now located at Hawkesbury, C. B.

A MOVEMENT has been started by the Orange Society to establish an Orphans' Home in this province. Steps are being taken to collect funds. The members of Searle Lodge, at Searlton, are to hold a basket social, and Rev. James McDougall will deliver a lecture there in aid of this worthy object. At the request of St. George's and Lady Robert's Lodges of this city, Rev. Daniel McLean, of Lot 48, has kindly consented to deliver a lecture in Braze's Hall next month in aid of the same fund. We will be glad to record anything done along this line by any Lodges throughout the province. At this season of the year we would recommend our large hearted and philanthropically disposed fellow-citizens to aid such a noble undertaking. Rev. D. McNeill is the Treasurer, Besides \$88 subscribed by three members of the Grand Lodge of this province, a Lodge in Nova Scotia has guaranteed to raise \$50, and Lodges generally throughout the country are beginning to move vigorously in the matter. A member of a Scarlet Chapter in Ontario writes that they will assist. Miss Mary Collum, of Toronto, Grand Worthy Mistress of the Ladies' Orange Benevolent Association expects to spend a month in this province this winter, working in the interests of the Home fund and organizing Lady Lodges. These things are as they should be. There is not a more beautiful spot in Canada for such a Home as here contemplated than P. E. Island, and as its doors will be open to all the provinces, there is no doubt but we shall see a Home worthy of the loyal Orange Association. In addition to the above a young lady in Prince County has started a chain letter, and all are requested when sending their copies in to the Treasurer to be sure and insert the names of the three friends to whom they send their next numbers so that the chain will not be broken.

EASTERN NOTES.—Christmas season was dull here on account of poor roads. Our bloods did little or no driving to exercise their trotters and exhibit their stylish turnouts. Since the terrible storm of the 5th which brought us winter early and unexpected, the weather has been extremely unsettled rendering our door labor unpleasant.—Wash. Young took his trawls ashore on the 22nd, the last of those left out on the 5th and which it was feared at one time would be all lost. There were four live cod-fish on them. The results of the fisheries for the past season has been by no means encouraging. Along our north shore, the lobster fishing was fair, but furious gales seriously interfered with the catches. At the close of the lobster season, fishermen formerly turned their attention to mackerel in waters once noted for the abundance of this beautiful and valuable fish, but the purse-seine has done its work, and the business there ended in failure. Cod-fishing has never been carried on there to any great extent though the Reses of Priest Pond have generally made a success of it. On the South Side from South Lake to Red Point are a body of energetic preserving fishermen and I suppose take in all in all they have the best fishing grounds on the southern side of the Island, as from that west the fish appear to keep farther and farther outside the headlands, lobsters excepted, these being no lobster. If any consequences from Red Point to East Point. In that district this spring the cod fishing was poor and weather stormy so the best efforts of the fishermen resulted in a catch below the average. In an area of a few hundred square acres between West River and South Lake considerable mackerel were taken, and boat from long distances flocked to the harvest of the sea. The rampanant saved from the purse-seine appear together here the last year seasons. Hake, nearly always a sure thing, were this year an entire failure chiefly owing to the dog fish, that pest that is now becoming a serious menace to all the North Atlantic fisheries. Formerly almost a curiosity in the comparatively cool waters of our Gulf he has now returned to us the third season, and each year in greatly increased numbers. He is now a nuisance to the fishermen from Cape North to Cape Sable, in the American shore and in the Bay of Fundy, he has made his appearance on the Grand Banks, Western Banks and Georges. The Nova Scotia fishermen are taking his presence seriously as well they may, and as his ugly body can be used for no known industrial purpose, they are proposing a government bounty for his destruction.
