SELLING WOOL CO-OPERATIVELY.—Mr. Thompson, Wool Exporter of the Dominion Government reports that Prince Edward Island's co-operative shipment of graded wool has met with wonderful success in England. It has been purchased by a mill near Manchester at an average price of 45 cents per pound, the highest price being 52 cents. In view of the fact that the present price of wool is only 18 to 17 cents this is a remarkable showing for the Island's graded product.

SPRING IS HERE.—The Guardian received by mail last night from Miss Genevieve Foley, Cardigan, a bouquet of May flowers picked by her yesterday. The colors are as bright and the perfume as sweet as in early May. This is probably a record either for early spring or a prolonged summer. Many thanks.

FOOTBALL GAME.—An interesting game of football was played yesterday at St. Dunstan's College between Queen Square School and the Junior St. Dunstan's which resulted in a victory for Queen Square school by a score of 2-0. In the first period there was no scoring on either side. In the second period, Frank Payne by a pass from Fred Joseph got the ball and scored.

VALUABLE LIVE STOCK.—Mr. James Bremner of the Department of Agriculture has been touring the Maritime Provinces, inspecting live stock conditions as to housing, cleanliness and herds. He visited some of the principal farms in this province this week and reports that the Holstein herd and condition at Banbury, the farm of Mr. J. W. Jones, are without doubt the best in the Maritime Provinces.

YESTERDAY'S MARKET.—The market yesterday was the best attended and supplied for some time. The price of meat shows quite a considerable decline, the best roasts selling at 25 cents and best legs of lamb at 25 cents. The cheaper cuts of lamb being from 15 to 20 cents and pork, best weights 20 cents per pound. There was only a fair supply of fish, cod selling at 10 cents a pound. There were no mackerels. Butter retailing at 60 cents per pound and eggs at 65 cents per pair and wild geese from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per pair. Hides have dropped again and are down 5 to 6 cents for best weights, calf and 6 cents for best weights, calves.

BEAUTIFUL PHOTOGRAPHS. It is fitting that the present beautiful autumn should be preserved in picture as well as in memory and it is fitting also that this preservation should be undertaken by the Island's laureate photographer, Mr. W. S. Louson. This duty Mr. Louson has accomplished in a series of photographs which are probably as superior to any photographic scenes yet taken of the Garden of the Gulf as the weather has been superior to that of many years past. These latest photographs were taken under the most favorable autumn conditions, half bare trees, shadows creeping over carpets of leaves lying where they fell during the past few weeks undisturbed by rain or storm. The scenes are typical of the Island autumn and show glimpses of Victoria Park, Inkerman, Mr. Louson's farm, forest and field and brook, all exquisitely beautiful. Some of these views are intended for publication, some for enlargement to grace some fortunate private library but all of them calculated to show Prince Edward Island scenery as it looks to the artist and the love of God's great outpouring to nature lovers and a valuable advertisement to the province.

SHIPPING CO-OPERATIVELY.—This week Mr. James Bremner, District Representative of the Department of Agriculture, Chatham, N. B., and Mr. Stanley Wood, Dominion Government Live Stock Representative, Moncton, visited this province in connection with the co-operative shipment of live stock by farmers to Montreal direct. The Dominion Government has undertaken to market the farmers' live stock co-operatively shipping direct to an agent in Montreal who sends them to the stockyards. This season already 115 cars of live stock have been shipped, principally of hogs and sheep although 2 head of cattle have been forwarded on trial shipment. It has been ascertained that the shrinkage in weight between here and Montreal is about ten pounds in lambs and from fifteen to eighteen in hogs. Lambs are graded in two classes, those weighing 70 pounds and over and those under 70 pounds. A cent per pound more is allowed for the heavier grade. The amount realized from these sales is divided and apportioned proportionately among the consigners.

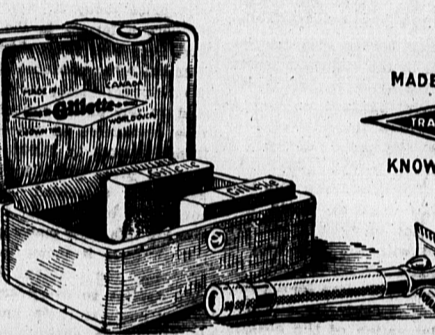

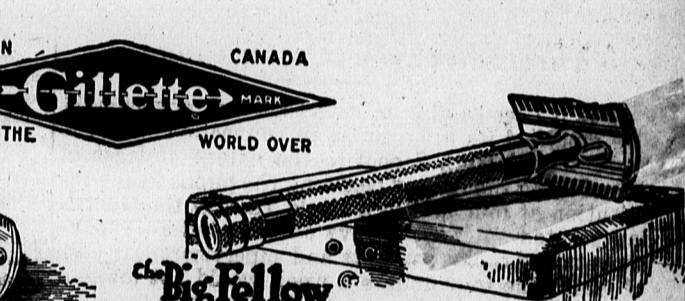
