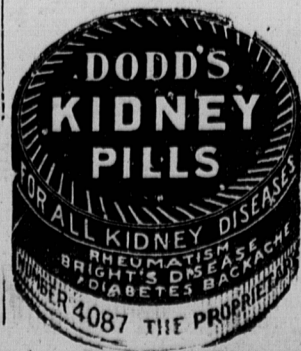

KINGFORD MURRAY, VETERAN PLUMBER DEAD

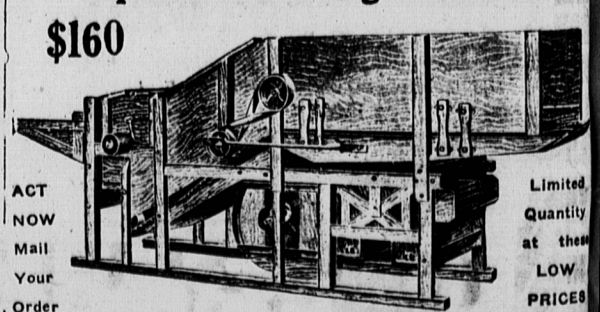
Kingford J. Murray, 35 Salem Street, Bradford district, treasurer of the firm of Murray & Dugdale, Water street, Haverhill, Mass., was a sudden death victim yesterday afternoon. He was stricken with a cerebral hemorrhage at about 1:30 o'clock while engaged in duties about his store, sinking to the floor. Dr. Leslie George was summoned and ordered commitment to the Galt hospital, where Dr. A. P. George was the attending physician. Mr. Murray never regained consciousness, dying late in the afternoon at the hospital.
Mr. Murray was a prominent member of the Masons and had held office in the order of the Eastern Star. He had been treasurer of the firm of Murray and Dugdale for over twenty years.
Kingford J. Murray was born in Cape Ereton, N. S. May 5, 1868, the son of Allen D., and Mary (Morrison) Murray. He was one of a family of two brothers and two sisters. He attended school in the town of his birth and came to Haverhill 32 years ago. He entered into business with James E. Dugdale, 49 Water street, the firm being known as the Murray & Dugdale Co.
Mr. Murray was one of the leading members of the old First Methodist church and was treasurer of

the church before it was merged with the Grace M. E. church. After the merger, he continued his church activities. He was treasurer of the church, and a trustee and superintendent of the church Sunday school for 12 years.
He was a 32nd degree Mason and a member of the Knights of Malta. He married Miss Nellie Abbott of this city, and the widow and two daughters, Ruth B., et al, Irene M. Murray, survive him. Besides the immediate family, a brother, Allen D. Murray of this city, and two sisters, Mrs. Mary Robinson Prince Edward Island, Mrs. Elizabeth Spackman New York, also survive him.
