MEETING OF PRESBYTERY YESTERDAY

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in Zion Church Hall on Tuesday afternoon with a large attendance. After routine business a call from the congregations of Tignish, Montrose and Elmisdale was presented to Rev. E. Lockhart, late missionary of the Presbyterian Church in British Guiana. Mr. Lockhart requested time for consideration before giving his decision. It is expected that he will accept the call.

The question of the Budget for 1914 was laid before the court. The amount asked from the Synod of the Maritime Provinces for the support of the schemes of the Church outside of their own congregational expenses, is \$128,500 and the share of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island of this sum is \$15,500. The Presbytery agreed to allocate this sum to the different congregations in the same way as last year.

Dr. Fullerton's motion that hereafter in electing Commissioners to the General Assembly of the Presbytery the ministers should be chosen by rotation and the other half and all the elders be elected by ballot was adopted.

It was agreed that beginning with the year 1915 all congregations be required to pay the dues to the Presbytery Fund on or before the August quarterly on penalty of being excluded from all benefit under the fund.

After a short discussion on missionary work among the East Indians in British Guiana in which Rev. Dr. Coffin, late Principal of Naparima College, Trinidad, took part, the Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk.

CYRIL MAUD TO TOUR CANADA WITH COMPANY.

LONDON, October 31.—Cyril Maude and his company have sailed for New York by the steamer Lapland to inaugurate a world tour, lasting two years. He will open in the United States and will proceed to Canada, his itinerary including Montreal, "Grumpy" "The Second in Command," and other favorite light comedies and farces will be played. Interviewed before leaving London, Mr. Maude stated that he was looking to visiting Canada again, where so much of his youth was spent. He had been bombarded with applications from actors and actresses desiring to accompany him, as the theatrical profession is suffering acutely here, owing to the war. The institution of matinees for night performances, owing to the wholesale desertion of London for fear of aerial raids, has not proved attractive for business, and has resulted in a decrease of the already depleted patronage.

SUNDAY BATTLE FIERCE AT YPRES

LONDON, Nov. 3.—"One of the supreme battles of the war was waged on Sunday," says the correspondent of the Daily Mail in Northern France, "when the Germans concentrated their forces in a mighty attempt to capture Ypres. Under cover of a furious cannonade they hurled vast masses of troops against the Allies' lines.

"The imperial order was to take Ypres at all costs, and the German commanders were prodigal of their orders in order to fulfil this imperial command. The losses on both sides were enormous. The battle raged the whole day, but Ypres is still unshaken.

"It is reported that the German Emperor himself was present to stimulate his troops."

The tumult of battle has rolled back from the Belgian coast, and after the apparent failure of their fierce assault on the English and Belgian lines around Ypres, the Germans evidently are diverting their attack toward a more easterly point.

Much activity on the part of German mobile columns is reported from Belgium, and there is evidence to show that the invaders have not yet exhausted all the resources which are being brought to bear in the campaign to capture Ypres through to Calais.

The tremendous German assault at Ypres is believed by the London Observer to have been repulsed decisively.

RECRUITING FOR SECOND CONTINGENT

Instructions to commence recruiting for overseas service in the 2nd Infantry Battalion were received last night from Headquarters, 6th Division. Those wishing to serve their country should report at once and be ready to leave for St. John, N.B. the place of assembly, without delay. The following must obtain the consent in writing, of their parents before being enlisted:

- (1) Men under 21 years of age. (2) The only son of parents, who are dependent upon him. Married men must obtain the consent of their wives, in writing. Recruits must have a minimum height of 5 ft. 3 ins., chest measurement 33 1/2 inches over, and between ages of 18 and 45. The pay of the rank and file will be \$1 per day and 10 cents field allowance. In addition to the above, the wife and family of a volunteer will receive a monthly allowance of \$2 and also an allowance from the Patriotic Fund.

Captain T. E. MacNutt, of the 82nd Regiment, has been appointed recruiting officer for the island and will be at the Drill Hall, Charlottetown, every day from 4 to 6 o'clock and 7.30 to 9 o'clock p.m.

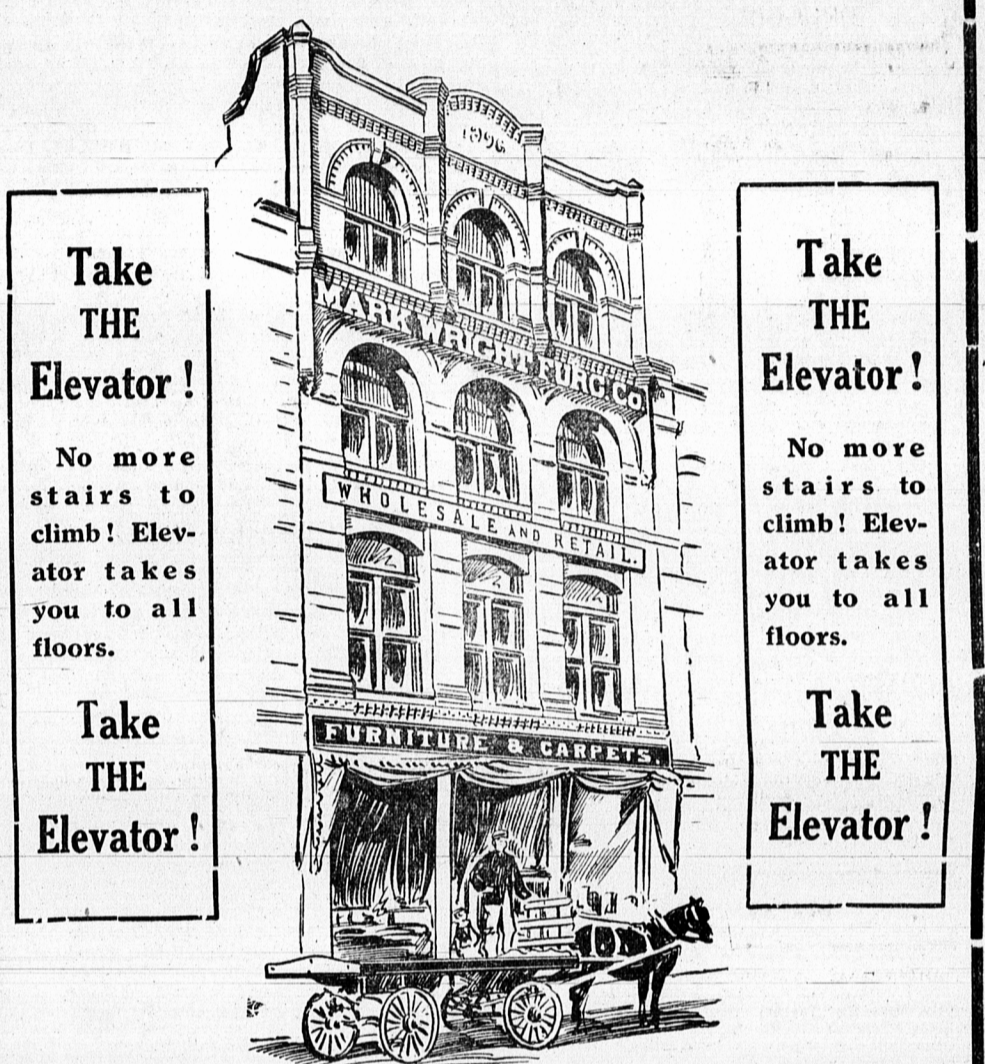
