### Would Welcome Another Conference At Ottawa Says Premier Macdonald

### Gap Between Gov't And Union Is Narrowed

TORONTO, Sept. 2.—(CP)—The United Steelworkers (I.O.G.F.C.) in a statement today said the gap between the government and the union was narrower than it had been for some time. The statement said the government's proposals for the settlement of the six-week strike in Canada's basic steel industry, but the union statement gave no indication as to the extent of the compromise.

The statement, issued after a meeting of the steelworkers' national advisory committee, said the union would ask Labor Minister Mitchell for further discussions before making a final decision on the government's settlement plan advanced at Ottawa last week.

Prior to last week's talks the union had asked for a wage increase of 15 cents an hour for employees in basic steel plants at Hamilton, Sault Ste. Marie and Sydney, N. S. The government's counterproposal had been an increase of 10 cents an hour.

Text of the statement: "The Minister of Labor is being advised by letter from national director C. H. Millard of the United Steelworkers of America regarding the settlement plan advanced at Ottawa last week. The settlement plan is being discussed by the national advisory committee of the union. It is only fair to state that in the opinion of the committee the settlement plan is a fair one and the union with respect to the issue has been narrowed. The committee meeting today was fully representative of all local unions now on strike."

### Thousands Of Jobs In Coalfield Area

WIGAN, Lancashire, England, Sept. 2.—(AP)—Thousands of new jobs are being provided in this coalfield area where there was 30-per-cent unemployment before the war.

What is being done for 370,000 people in 108 square miles of the "south" Lancashire development area is a sample of the government's employment plan for other districts where too much reliance on a few heavy industries brought economic disaster during the depression.

Wigan lost its iron and steel industry before 1900, followed by a decline in the textile industry. Since mining had been dominant, the drop in industrial output left the town with 30 per cent unemployment. The government has established a national revival fund.

Munitions brought the district its first prosperity in a decade. This is the government's program to maintain that gain.

### Two Pilots Killed In Moncton Crash

MONCTON, N.B., Sept. 2.—(CP)—Two Trans-Canada Airlines pilots were killed at about 11:30 a.m. A D. T. today when a bi-passenger Lockheed aircraft crashed three miles from nearby Tuttle Creek while on a routine practice training flight. There were no passengers aboard.

Fatalities in the crash were First Officers Herbert E. Jones and Donald E. Malloy, both of Moncton who had taken the Airlines passenger plane up on a practice flight. Cause of the accident, which completely demolished the twin-engine aircraft, was not immediately known. T. C. A. officials here said in a statement that an investigation was being made.

Malloy and Jones had both served as pilots with the R. C. F. during the war and Jones had been awarded the Air Force Cross for distinguished service.

### Flying Boat, Missing On Mercy Flight Object Of Wide Search

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C., Sept. 2.—(CP)—A Stranraer flying boat with a crew of four and three passengers aboard is the object of a widespread search in this district today after the aircraft was reported missing Saturday night. When it made a mercy flight to this northern British Columbia coastal center from Stewart, B.C., owned by the Queen Charlotte Airlines, the flying boat tried to land here Saturday but was unable to because of dense fog and reports said the plane flew off in a northerly direction.

R.C.A. and provincial police planes have joined company planes and fishing vessels in the search. Company officials said the flying boat was in Prince Rupert Saturday on a freight charter run when the request to make the mercy flight to Stewart was received. No indication was given as to the nature of the emergency.

Airline officials said those aboard the ship—the Skowen—were: K. Wilson, pilot; George Hatch, co-pilot; J. Madson and Lloyd Douglas, engineers; a Mrs. Dempsey of Stewart and her baby; and Nicholas Killan of Prince Rupert. The plane made the run to Stewart without difficulty but fog settled over the Prince Rupert area several hours later and the Skowen was unable to come in for the landing. Several persons living on the outskirts of the city said they saw the plane circle the harbor twice and then head in a northerly direction.

EDMONTON, Sept. 2.—(CP)—The Alberta Farmers Union will call a delivery strike among its 20,000 farmer-members in Alberta at midnight Sept. 3 and will be joined by farmers of the Saskatchewan branch of the United Farmers of Canada. A.F.U. president Carl J. Stimpfle announced tonight. The farmers will withhold all their produce from the market.

### Can Not Agree To Demands Of Union

(By The Canadian Press)  
OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—Operators of three Great Lakes shipping concerns at the conclusion of a meeting here tonight issued a statement saying they could not agree to the demands of the Canadian Seaman's Union for a closed shop. The shipping concerns represented were of the Steamship Lines, Paterson Steamship Company and Sarnia Colonial Steamship Lines.

While the owners found themselves in agreement with the union on other matters, they could not accept as part of a contract "anything which detracts from the authority of a ship's master. This must be paramount for the purposes of safety."

They also could not accept "anything which restricts the liberty of a Canadian citizen by compelling him to join any particular union, or which imposes on an employer the obligation of discharging any man if he does not wish to join."

### Return of Greek Monarch Likely, Ballots Show

ATHENS, Sept. 2.—(AP)—King George II of the Hellenes maintained a commanding margin of more than two to one over the republicans in the tabulation of plebiscite ballots as republican leaders vowed to continue the fight against the monarchy.

As the majority in favor of recalling the King from his five-year exile amounted to nearly 72 per cent, officials placed the week-end vote at 20 deaths. The ministry of public order announced that two bandits were slain in a series of election-day clashes Sunday near Larissa.

The latest figures of the balloting, with about 67 per cent of votes tabulated, gave the King 649,705, and the republic 254,787.

The latest reports of violence raised to more than 40 the number of persons listed by officials as having met violent deaths in political disorders during the final week of the stormy campaign.

Even as the vote was being counted, reliable reports said an armed band of about 400 men coming from the direction of Albania or Yugoslavia surrounded and captured 40 Greek soldiers in Northwestern Greece. Fifteen members of the gendarmerie also were taken, the report said, but added the latter might have freed themselves.

Themistokles Sophoulis, 66-year-old former Liberal premier and symbolic leader of the entire Republican bloc, said in a statement he was not surprised at the margin the Greeks gave the King, and that he expected "even a greater majority in view of the terrorism which has existed in Greece for the past several months."

Sophoulis announced prior to the plebiscite that the exiled King won, he and his followers would "continue the battle for democracy."

The newspaper Eleftheria Ellada, organ of the faction made up of the K.K.E. (Communists) and the Leftist F.A.M. (National Liberation Front) interpreted the election as a victory for the republic, despite the overwhelming majority in favor of the King.

### Montgomery Arrives At Winnipeg

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 2.—(CP)—Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery arrived here today to begin the western half of his 17-day trans-Canada tour.

The program was much like that of his previous stops—honor guard inspection, visit to disabled ex-servicemen, meeting provincial and civic leaders and with officials of the western military command.

Today's long flight in the R.C. C. F. Dakota of the "Monty Flight" was the first of the Northern Ontario pulp and paper plant where he will give a 200-foot roll of paper hand issue. Passing it over to an aide he remarked that was enough to blow his nose "from coast to coast."

The election result meant the second recall from exile for the 59-year-old monarch since he ascended the throne in 1935. He was ousted by the republicans in 1947 after a military coup and regained his crown in a plebiscite in 1948. He was again ousted in 1949 when it was overruled by the Germans, and set up a government-in-exile in London. Since the war's end he has been living in England.
