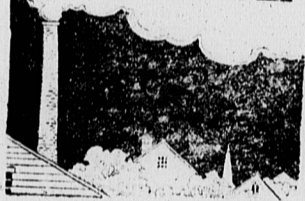

BUSY POLITICAL TIMES AHEAD.

The first of the aftermath of the political overturn in September last was the formation of the Borden Administration and the instalment of the new Ministers in office. Now they are busy seeking re-election by the people. New seats had to be found for a number of them and to that end vacancies must be created in the House of Commons. There being no Speaker yet for the new Parliament to whom those willing to give up their seats in the Commons for prospective seats in the Senate could tender their resignations, another device had to be resorted to, that of accepting official appointments.

As a result Canada has now a number of new and distinguished short-term postmasters. Dr. Daniel, M. P. for St. John is appointed postmaster for Chilliwa, B. C. and thus makes vacant a seat for Hon. J. D. Hazen. The formal nomination of Mr. Hazen took place yesterday. Other members elect who have been appointed postmasters are Gordon of Nipissing, Hazgart of Winnipeg and the veteran Conservative whip, George Taylor. These make room for Hon. Messrs. Cochrane, Rogers and White. The election nominations are fixed for the 6th and 8th of November, with polling one week later, should any of the Ministers be opposed, which seems hardly to be expected.

It has not been usual to oppose the re-election of members of a new Government at its formation, but later on in the lifetime of an Administration such opposition has been common enough. In the present case an understanding was said to have been arrived at between Hon. Mr. Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier, by which the several Ministers and also Hon. Messrs. Fielding, Graham and Fisher were to be allowed an unopposed election. This agreement rests only on a probable rumor, and may or may not be carried out. No such agreement could prevent qualified candidates from opposing either the Ministers or the Opposition lieutenants if disposed to do so.

In the meantime some recounts have been held in cases where the major-

ities were narrowed at the general election, but those have not materially affected the relative strength of parties. Next in order is the crop of election petitions which is not expected to be larger than usual after a general election, if so large, although two petitions have already filed in this Province against Messrs. J. J. Hughes and A. A. McLean respectively. The Controverted Election Act allows forty days after election for the filing of protests. The forty days will expire on Tuesday next, October 31. And after election petitions have hitherto come the "saw-offs," which are in most cases reprehensible transactions.

As Parliament is to meet on November 15 and as the testing of an election cannot be proceeded with during the session, it seems probable that every member who has been declared elected will be permitted to take his seat in the Commons and draw the indemnity allotted. Parliament itself will take on a new and interesting aspect with the Ministry at the Speaker's right, backed by a majority of fifty, while the remains of the late following of Sir Wilfrid Laurier sit in diminished number at the left.

Coincident in date with the meeting of Parliament will come the interesting bye-elections in Belfast and Fort Augustus districts in our own Province. And looking farther ahead there is the question whether there will be a prorogation of the federal Parliament at Christmas or only an adjournment. Already some Conservatives are pointing out that the Laurier Government in its first year held two full-indemnity sessions, and pleading the precedent for a like course now. Whatever may be decided as to this, there seems a prospect that the new Parliament will of itself have but a short existence. The claims of the west for additional seats in the Commons and the probable plebiscite on the navy seem together not unlikely to bring on another general election for the Dominion within two years. And yet the country needs a rest from politics.

THANKSGIVING DAY.

Monday next is appointed as a day of rest and Thanksgiving for the people of Canada. The occasion calls for general and devout observance. The Dominion has prospered beneath the smile of the Giver of All Good. The harvest has been abundant, yet all men know that the husbandman cannot command the sunshine or the rain upon which the increase of the field depends. Our national blessings otherwise have been many. We have enjoyed peace and content within our borders, exemption from pestilence and plague, the full measure of civil and religious liberty. The lines of the Canadian

people have been cast in pleasant places and they have a goodly heritage. It may be fitting and tend to our greater happiness and content if every individual will on the day appointed recount and acknowledge with thankful heart the many mercies and blessings which have come during the year to them and to those dear to them. For life, health, strength, reason, the use of limbs and faculties, for food and raiment, home and friends and all the comforts of this life—which are denied to some—let those who have received and enjoyed return devout thanksgiving. And it may be found that the measure of our gratitude has some relation to the continuance of divine favor, as it certainly has to our individual enjoyment of life. The thankful ones are seldom happy.

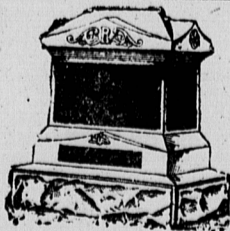

EIGHT YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

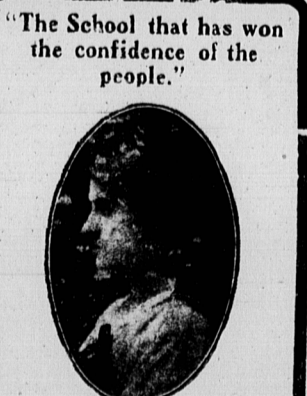
