## Gehrig Returns To Form As Yanks Defeat Browns; Tribe Takes Senators 10-9

NEW YORK, May 3—(AP)—New York Yankees opened their home stand against the west today by turning back St. Louis Browns 5-1 as Lou Gehrig and Charley Giffing pitched nine-hit ball for his third victory of the year.

Gehrig's four-bagger, which came in the first with Bill Dickey on base, was his first of the season and followed a day after his demotion to sixth place in the champions' batting order. The big first baseman gave a fine sign of snapping out of his slump by also banging out a double. Joe DiMaggio got two two-baggers.

**Clouts Two Homers**  
In Washington, Ken Keltner, rookie third baseman, pounded out two home runs and drove in six tallies to help the League-leading Cleveland Indians to defeat Washington 10-9.

The Senators, trailing after the fifth inning, went on a scoring spree in the ninth which fell short by one run of tying the count. With the tying run on third base Manager Bucky Harris, his pinch hitters exhausted, was forced to let relief pitcher Pete Appleton bat for himself. Appleton grounded out to end the game.

**Sox Defeat Tigers**  
Boston Red Sox launched their home campaign against the western half of the league by nosing out Detroit 4-3 in a 10-inning battle.

The victory was veteran "Lefty" Grove's third straight. He helped set off the winning rally in the extra frame by sacrificing Leo Nonnenkamp, who ran for Gene Desautels after that catcher bounded a two-bagger off the left field wall.

In Philadelphia the Athletics jumped into sixth place by beating Chicago White Sox 7-2 behind a five-hit pitching of Buck Ross.

A six-run outburst in the third inning that sent Sugar Cain to the showers won the game for the A's.

## Canuck Owner Holds Hope Of Derby Entry

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 3—(AP)—A Canadian hog-raiser who has turned a horse-racing hobby into a thriving business figures he'll have something to say about the 64th running of the Kentucky Derby next Saturday.

He is A. C. Tarn, the Winnipeg sportsman who has his Wise Fox, son of Gallant Fox, 1930 Kentucky Derby winner, entered in Saturday's great race.

"I've got what I consider a mighty fine horse in Wise Fox," said the genial, 45-year-old owner and trainer today as he watched him cool off after a short breeze.

"He's done everything I've asked of him and if he runs his race Saturday, Stagehand, Fighting Fox and those other horses will at least know they have been in a horse race."

**Fails To Place**  
This afternoon, however, Wise Fox failed to place in the one-mile trial won by Maxwell Woodard's The Chief, stablemate of Stagehand and also a Kentucky Derby favorite.

Wise Fox caught Tarn's eye at Hialeah Park last winter. Then he was the property of William Woodward and was being trained by James Fitzsimmons, who will saddle Fighting Fox Saturday. The Canadian horseman was willing to pay \$5,000 for the colt but he wasn't sure that was enough. Much to his surprise Woodward gave Fitzsimmons permission to sell.

Since donning Tarn's black and white silks, the Fox has won three races, including the Louisiana Derby, and finished second in four starts.

"I wouldn't be willing to post that \$500 starting fee Saturday if I didn't think we had a chance," declared Tarn. "After all \$500 would keep me in betting money for some time. But if he shows anything at all in the trial today, he'll be at the post next Saturday."

## Chief Equals Record Winning "Tirla" Stakes

NEW YORK, May 3—On the eve of sailing for England, Tommy Farr accepted terms to defend his British Empire heavyweight championship in Toronto against Maurice Strickland of New Zealand and tonight only "minor details" remained to be ironed out.

**Guaranteed \$25,000**  
Farr was guaranteed \$25,000 to fight 15 rounds in Toronto the last week in July or the first week in August. Strickland was offered a percentage of a gate Galbraith figures should range between \$75,000 and \$100,000, with a crowd of between 50,000 and 60,000.

Articles for the bout will be signed, Galbraith said, as soon as a few "minor details" are attended to.

"It is just a matter of details now," he declared. "Mr. Gould has his ideas and I have mine, but we will have no difficulty over them. The minute the Ontario Athletic Commission says 'go' we will go."

**No Site Set**  
Galbraith said no site had been definitely agreed on but he mentioned Maple Leaf Stadium, home of Toronto's International League baseball team; Woodbine Park, the Toronto Exhibition Grounds and Varsity Stadium as possibilities.

Gould was happy over the prospects and so was Farr, but the Welshman refused to say anything about it, turning all questions over to Gould.
