Ellen's Diary

By an Island Farmer's Wife

Brother-in-law was at his gardening today taking advantage of the prevailing dampness to transplant lettuce and other of the earlier plants to prepared and straight rows. I thought as I came to loiter there, watching the "green fingers" at work that James himself would be satisfied with those, so neat and true he fashions them. I said: "You would enjoy farming on The Island." His reply was characteristic of the man, "but one wouldn't call this farming—not as you people know it!" The garden land is dark and obviously rich from being annually well fed with manure that does not come from the cleaning of stables but is "pretty high to buy—about eight dollars the load!"

From the grey boulders set staunchly in uncultivated places, I fancy the lawns and gardens here are the results of a happy choice of location as well as the result of much sweat and brawn expended in hauling clay to the place. Not in all the stump field at clear it when our farmers come to see as often seen sitting unconcerned here in most unwanted spots, though what was noticeable and strange at first to me is now fitting in nicely with our scenes. Violets are blooming in a shady place on the lawn, the white and the blue, though the former have lost much of their delicate and rare perfume in their transplanting. These were brought from native haunts beside a stream. The blossoms are much larger than when found in the uncultivated state, but still modest and graceful. Peonies are in bud now, about ready at their best, brightening lawns and rock gardens. I find myself wondering about those at home, the ones that were so closely cropped by the nibbling lambs and ewes. Neither sheep nor cattle are to be found in this suburb but a saddle horse, a pet of niece to our host comes to the bars in the bushy pasture across the highway to greet her and there are dogs, that at present bay lonely into the dusk.

The weather continued damp and sunless today though a fog, which lay over the place at morning, has presently dissolved. Softly veiling it was, enfolded any distance and hiding the landscape from view. I thought of those at Alderlea, which creep in along the windings of the river at times to hide the edging trees—and even the grey of the mill and all in the valley from sight and which at a signal of brightness are lifted rosy by the sunrise. This was another day to be idled away, but pleasantly, though one may not be spent or wasted day. Books which lie in numbers and invitingly in were taken up at times but not to be read, only to ruffle the leaves and browse a bit here and there. Visiting one can not settle to read, delightful as it is, not with so much that is new and different to do and see.

I think now of a feminine pastime much enjoyed by my sisters, and I admit at times entered into personally with more than casual interest, that of shopping and visiting the stores in the city, for almost daily since we came, we have found an excuse to bring us there.

Those better acquainted with the prevailing customs can see the evening papers for "bargains" described there in detail, and then it is only a matter of noting down the location to be on the spot in time. The women we have met "only naturally" they tell me, are extremely interested in clothes and seem to be experts in fabrics and fashions. Stores at present feature white wear in the windows though of course there are also the colorful Summer things too. Any taste, conservative or extreme may easily be satisfied and costs are within the reaches of all budgets. As at home, skirt lengths are a matter of moment and while the longer lengths are featured this is left pretty much to the choice of the wearer who must know that knee lengths are of course out.

Odd times on the street one sees a piece of femininity gowned in a fashion out of an old picture, though this is not general. We were amused at one of these yesterday conspicuous among the rest and admittedly quaint and pretty—her bodice high-necked, an edge of frilled petticoat peeping out beneath her long and full skirt. While such modes have much to commend them, it is only logical to reason that a race of women, freed so long from the confinement of stays and layers of clothing will not be content to go back to these. And nowadays when time must be budgeted closely it is also logical to remember that only few would be able to give the necessary time to the washing and starching and ironing of the frills that accompany these modes, as did the mothers and grand-mothers of a bygone era, no matter how fetching the effect. However, while they tell us "this is not New York!" parades along the streets are modish and colorful, much gayer, we decided, than those at home... But company has come. One hears the "different" voices of American women. Until tomorrow... Diary... Good-night.
