Bonar Law Speaks Plainly On Reparations Question

PARIS, Jan. 3.—"You can get certain amounts of money by taking immediate possession of Germany but you cannot take over Germany and re-establish her financial stability," declared Mr. Bonar Law, the British Prime Minister tonight in the course of the first direct statement he has made on British policy concerning reparations since he became head of the government.

Terms On Which Irish Rep. Army Can Have Peace

DUBLIN, Jan. 3.—A meeting of former officers of "The Tipperary Brigade" of the Irish Republican Army held in Thurles Saturday passed a resolution calling for a peace conference and forwarded a copy to Michael Cosgrove, head of the Free State Government, who replied: "Before you go further with your endeavors to secure peace, it is well that you should understand the position clearly."

The New Year Message Of The Ulster Premier

LIVERPOOL, Jan. 3.—Sir James Craig, Ulster Premier, in a New Year message to the Liverpool Evening Express, says: "My New Year message is the fervent wish that 1923 may see continuation of peace and good will in Ulster, that the separate legislatures in Ireland in their own spheres may be enabled to work for the common advancement of every-thing which advances the welfare of the people, and that Ulster in common with the rest of the Empire may enjoy renewed prosperity in the new year."
