Baldwin Is Hopeful That Ottawa Conference Will Yet Materialize

British Conservative Leader Stresses Necessity of Tariff for Treaty Purposes

(By George Hambleton, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent) BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Oct. 13 - In the home of tariff reform, Rt. Hon. Stanley Baldwin last night sounded the Conservative call to arms for the forthcoming general election.

One son of Joseph Chamberlain presided over the meeting. Another moved a resolution asserting the necessity for immediate protection of the home producer, "coupled with the furthest possible extension of the system of empire preference."

"A simple song of safeguarding" was sung before the speeches. And one couplet ran: "We must not be afraid to chuck free trade, and do what the foreigners do!"

As in his manifesto, Mr. Baldwin declared his readiness to examine any method proposed to redress the unfavorable balance of trade, but reiterated that he had not varied from the conclusion he reached years ago that the most effective weapon was the tariff.
