The meeting closed by singing the National Anthem. Pte. McDonald was then given three rousing cheers. The crowd dispersed saying "For he's a Jolly Good Fellow."

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HIGHER COMMAND IS BITTERLY ATTACKED

Loval Fraser Renews his Criticism of Conduct of the War.

LONDON, Feb. 4.—Loval Fraser, whose recent article criticizing the military authorities has been the subject of Ministerial deprecation in Parliament and endless of newspaper criticism throughout the country, returned to the attack in the Daily Mail with a two-column open letter to the Secretary of War, Lord Derby. He says that the old Tory press stands for the vested military interests, its object being to prove that anything wrong in the conduct of the war cannot possibly be due "to the sublime intellects of the Staff College," but must be the fault of the politicians; therefore it attempts to throw the blame on the Ministry. The pacifist press has only one object, says Fraser, that being to overthrow Premier Lloyd George; therefore, they want the General Staff.

"If the military experts who have had unquestioned control in the last two years have not made good—and show no sign of making good, it is time they were changed."

"But they are not providing us sufficient men, is the retort of the apologetic members for the Imperial General Staff. I say they did provide sufficient men. And what was done with them?"

"Having failed to achieve their full purpose," says the Imperial General Staff, "they must have known that the French General Staff looked upon our reckless and wasteful methods with positive dismay. They attacked again and in the end failed."

"The General Staff admit 900,000 casualties last year (I quote from one of their spokesmen) in undertakings which were mostly unproductive and failed."

"The statement is made that we should have had more men."
