The Bijou was crowded to the doors last night and the program was without doubt one of the best ever put on in the City. The marvelous feats performed by the Cowboys in bronco breaking, roping, steering and their splendid riding was beautifully shown. The following is the report of the New Glasgow cheese factory, of which Abraham Buote is the secretary. Factory opened June 30th. Number of making cheese Nov. 30th. Number of patrons supplied, 2,133,581; cheese manufactured, 206,468; gross value of cheese, \$22,307.79; to be divided amongst patrons, \$17,971.97; value of milk to patrons per 100 lbs., \$84.214; milk required to make 1 lb. cheese, 10,332; average price realized for cheese, 10,480,447; average test with two added, 5.566; average test of hauling milk, 9.09. Patrons paid by average three first and two last months as follows: Time July and August, average test, 5.5. Value, 14 2/3 per lb. Sept. and Oct., average test, 5.7. Value, 16 1/6 per lb. In every case two is added to test.

The Guardian was shown yesterday the beautiful silver medal awarded to P. C. Brown at the last Provincial Exhibition for the best stallion over four years old. This handsome medal was generously donated by the Canadian Bank of Commerce and was won by Mr. Brown's "Lord Dalmeny," and three of his get. This horse, too well known throughout this and the other maritime provinces to need any comment as to the many fine qualities by which he won for his owner this splendid evidence of his worth. The medal is of silver, engraved and embossed. It weighs three and a quarter ounces and is seven and a half inches in circumference. On the obverse side surrounding the engraved centerplate are the words "The Canadian Bank of Commerce" in relief while the words "awarded to P. C. Brown" for the best heavy stallion over four years old, Charlottetown Exhibition, 1910, are on the nameplate. This is surmounted by the emblematic shield of the bank. On the reverse side is a masterful execution in relief work in the shape of an agricultural scene, beautifully worked out in detail. The whole is surrounded by a wreath composed in relief of agricultural products. The medal is one which Mr. Brown should be proud to possess and its excellence speaks well for the generosity of the donors.
