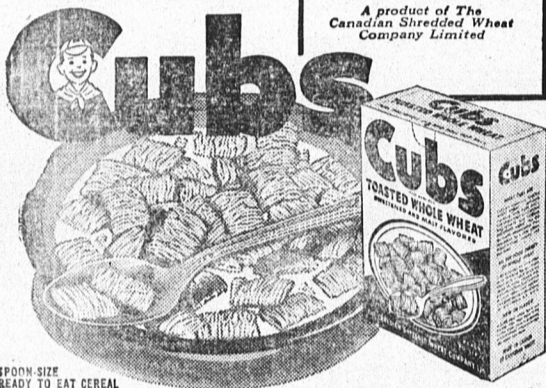

Mrs. L. MacKinnon of Fairview, P. E. I. has received the following letter which speaks for itself.

"A" Coy., P. E. I. H. C. A. Canadian Army Overseas 4-8-41.

Dear Mrs. MacKinnon—Yesterday afternoon when the remainder of our Battalion arrived in port I was both surprised and shocked when Major DesRoches informed me of Eugene's death. We had left Valcarier on Wednesday, July 23rd, and at that time, the report we had from the hospital was that he was improving rapidly, so much so that we in the Company fully expected him to arrive along with the second group.

Eugene, or L. Cpl. MacKinnon, E. Co. as he was known to us was very popular with all the boys and had a very promising career ahead of him. It is just a short while since he received his first stripe and as his Company Commander I may say that from the interest he took in his work and his ability to instruct, I would have been a very short period before he would have received his second promotion. His passing came as a shock to all his chums and fellow members of the Company as well as to myself.

It seems difficult for me personally to believe he is gone and I fully realize what a blow his sudden passing must have been to you and

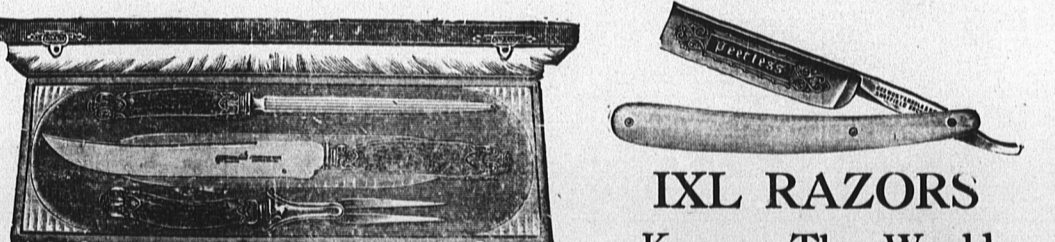

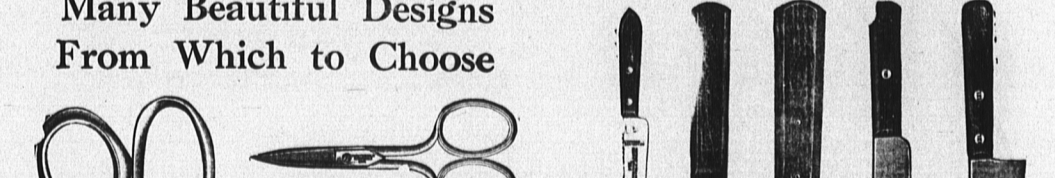

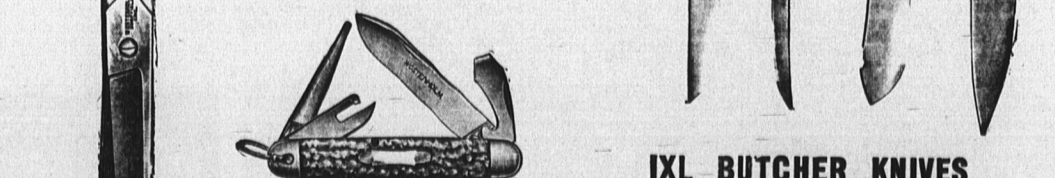
